Bow Rotary Book Program and Read-In Event

In the month of May for the past 30 years, the Rotary Club of Bow, NH has coordinated and sponsored a program known as "Personalized Books for First Graders" for the students at Bow Elementary School and more recently for Dunbarton Elementary School students as well.

The program's purpose is both simple - to encourage children to develop a love of reading - yet significant, yielding enduring benefits for the students. As a Rotarian who has participated in the



event numerous times, my favorite part is as the books are read, the students realize that his /her name is a character in the book along with the names of family members, friends, and pets. The expressions and sounds of surprise fill the room and the excitement builds! The success of the program is immediately apparent not only in the huge smiles from the students, teachers, and Rotarians alike but also in watching the children sit down after the presentation and start reading the book to themselves and to each other.

The process of producing the books requires some advanced planning usually starting in late January. Communication and coordination between Bow Rotary, the reading specialists at the schools, parents, and the vendor occur. The book is chosen, parents fill out forms naming significant people and pets in the student's life, these forms are sent to the vendor who creates the books and mails them to the schools.

The vendor Bow Rotary uses to make the books, Debbie Quandahl at My Create-A-Book Publishing (mycreateabook@aol.com), website: mycreateabook.com has been creating and selling personalized books for over 25 years. She gives us personalized service, produces quality books and is responsive and easy to work with.

We would be happy to share our experience and assist any clubs who are interested in learning more about or starting a Personalized Book program in their community. LRC has been creating similar books, personalized with each student's name, for many years to the elementary schools in MT. Holly, Ludlow, Cavendish, and Plymouth as part of its Literacy Improvement Project. Interestingly, Lora Miele commented that "I still have the ones created for my children more than 20 years ago and still enjoy giving it a read now and again!"

In addition to this part of its project, the LRC is also involved, along with Dolly Parton, in the Imagination Library. Dolly Parton's Imagination Library is a book gifting program that mails free, high-quality books to children from birth until age 5, no matter their family's income.



The unique Dolly Parton Imagination Library program mails a new, age-appropriate book into the homes of children every month. Dolly's Imagination Library is designed to inspire the love of reading in children by spending time with family and friends sharing these wonderful books together.

An easy way to register your preschool child or children for this program is to visit the children's section of Ludlow's Fletcher Memorial Library, where there is a display of Imagination Library books and lots of registration cards. Registration cards can also be obtained from the Ludlow Rotary, PO Box 216, Ludlow, VT 05149. The privacy of the children is strictly honored.

Springfield Rotary Club Donates Twelfth Trex Bench to Community

The Springfield Rotary Club has once again demonstrated its commitment to environmental stewardship and community service by donating a Trex outdoor bench to the Springfield Conservation Committee. The bench was installed near the pollinator habitat hillside at Springfield Hospital, following the successful collection of 1,000 pounds of thin film plastics by local residents as part of the Trex Thin Film Plastics Challenge.



This marks the twelfth bench awarded to Springfield through the Trex Recycling Program. The latest collection effort included contributions from several local sources: 45% from the Springfield Town Library, 17% from the Springfield Food Co-op, 13% from Bibens Ace Hardware, and the remainder from Magee Office Products, Springfield Hospital, Casey CDJR, Waterbury's Factotum Design, and Springfield GMC. Since February 2023, the Springfield Rotary has collected more than 10,146 pounds (over five tons) of plastic film—the approximate weight of an African Elephant. The Trex Challenge encourages the recycling of materials like grocery and produce bags, bubble wrap, cereal bags, and similar plastics. Once a group collects 1,000 pounds, Trex awards a 48" Yacht Club Bench, made from recycled materials such as milk jugs and water bottles. The collected plastics are upcycled into Trex decking, supporting a circular economy.



Plastic pollution poses serious risks to the environment and wildlife, and thin plastics often can't be processed through standard curbside recycling due to their tendency to damage sorting equipment. The Trex Challenge offers a creative and impactful alternative.



This latest bench joins others already placed at The Common, Park Street School, North Springfield Bog Trailhead, Main Street, the Springfield Town Library, Elm Street School, and the Springfield Community Players Theater.

Volunteers from the Rotary Club and the Springfield Town Library manage the collection, weighing, and delivery of the plastic to Shaw's Supermarket, Trex's nearest participating drop-off location. The Trex collection bin will remain at the Town Library.

Looking ahead, the Rotary Club has already begun work toward earning its next bench, which will be donated to Springfield Parks and Recreation in celebration of the Rotary's 95th anniversary. Founded in 1927, the Rotary Club of Springfield is a vibrant organization of more than 40 members dedicated to service at both the local and global levels. Learn more at springfieldvtrotary.org.


