70th Annual Springfield Rotary Penny Sale A Success

The 70th Annual Springfield Vermont Rotary Club Penny Sale was held on Saturday, October 19th at Riverside Middle School in Springfield with an enthusiastic crowd of 500 in attendance. 340 prizes with values from \$15 to \$500 were distributed.

Recycled Plastics Challenge Nets Club Community Benches

Part of the joy of Rotary for me is learning about successful club projects and figuring out how to replicate them. Last year, I read about a project conducted by the Capital City Sunrise Rotary Club in New Hampshire. The club collected plastic film and received a



recycled bench. The Capital City club president readily agreed to give a presentation to our club.

That was the beginning of our community recycling challenge.

Beginning in February of 2023, we partnered with <u>Trex</u>, a manufacturer of wood-alternative decking products, which has a program aimed at encouraging the public to recycle their grocery bags, bread bags, produce bags, cereal bags, ice bags, case overwrap, bubble wrap, dry cleaning bags, Ziploc and other re-sealable bags. For every 1,000 pounds of plastic film an organization collects, Trek will donate a four-foot long composite bench through its furniture line, <u>Polywood</u>. The Polywood benches are made out of milk jugs and water bottles, while the collected plastic is upcycled into Trek decking products.



We placed a bin in our town library, and also collected plastics from a local manufacturer, hospital, and food Co-op. Residents gladly pitched in, keeping more than 6,143 pounds of plastic film out of the waste stream.

Weekly posts on social media keep the community apprised of the progress. To date, eight benches have been installed around the Springfield community, with another challenge launched for a ninth bench. Each bench has a plaque that acknowledges our club and is dedicated to our 95th anniversary.

One of the most significant benefits of the challenge has been increased awareness. I have become more mindful of the pervasive presence of plastic film in everyday life. This has sparked me to have conversations with friends, family, and colleagues, igniting a ripple effect that has increased awareness of plastic waste throughout our community.

This has truly been a rewarding project, as we reduce plastic waste, promote financial savings, empower personal responsibility, and foster community engagement. We are helping people embrace sustainable practices in our daily lives.

As we strive towards a cleaner, healthier planet, each of us has the power to make a difference—one plastic-free choice at a time.


Cornhole Competition Between Neighboring Clubs
