District Governor Donna Deos Visits Concord Rotary Club

The Concord Rotary Club was honored to welcome Rotary District 7870 Governor Donna Deos for her official club visit on September 23. The meeting drew an especially strong turnout of members eager to hear Governor Deos share her vision and priorities for the year ahead.

Governor Deos spoke passionately about the Rotary International theme of "Uniting for Good." She emphasized that when Rotarians come together in service, across clubs and communities, the impact is multiplied many times over. Her



remarks underscored the importance of collaboration and fellowship at every level of Rotary.

An active and thoughtful discussion followed, with Concord members contributing ideas about how the district could unite behind a major activity to serve the wider community. Among the potential areas of focus were pressing challenges facing New Hampshire and Vermont today, including workforce housing, the opioid epidemic, and other critical issues that touch the lives of families across the state. Members expressed enthusiasm about the possibility of district-wide service that would not only address urgent needs but also strengthen ties among clubs.

The meeting reflected the energy and spirit of Rotary at its best: leaders listening to one another, bringing forward bold ideas, and committing themselves to the shared values embodied in the Rotary Four-Way Test. Governor Deos praised the Concord club for its ongoing projects and its dedication to service above self, encouraging members to keep building on their strong foundation of community involvement.

JR Rotary Gets a Lecture on Effects of Alcohol

Dr. Lara Ingram, Professor of Psychology at Franklin Pierce University, joined the Jaffrey Rindge Rotary Club for a breakfast meeting and presented an excellent academic review of the consequences of alcohol consumption and how to recognize when one gets close to reasonable limits. The meeting on Thursday September 18 at the University stimulated considerable discussion about the many psychological, medical and behavioral issues related to alcohol.



Springfield Rotarians Learn About Upcoming Medicare Changes

Tirah Brothers, State Health Insurance Program Coordinator for Senior Solutions, spoke with the Springfield Rotary this week about upcoming changes to Medicare programs and how they may impact both individuals and their employees.

Brothers, who guides seniors through the often-complex world of Medicare, emphasized that it is never too early to start exploring coverage options. "Medicare is complicated," she said, adding that her role is to help people balance affordability with the coverage they need. The shift from employer-based health insurance to Medicare is already a stressful transition, and federal-level changes are now making it even more difficult.



The biggest impacts, Brothers explained, will be felt in Medicare Advantage plans, which are offered by private, for-profit insurers. These plans, which help cover gaps in traditional Medicare, come at an added cost. But starting in 2026, many Vermonters will no longer have access to them.

Because Medicare Advantage insurers focus on profitability, they are pulling out of unprofitable markets. Already, two major insurers have announced they will exit Vermont in 2026, leaving an estimated 25,000 Vermonters with gaps in their coverage. While Brothers is working with affected individuals to find alternatives, she cautioned that it will be impossible to fully replace all of the benefits they are losing.



There is some good news, however. Vermont has expanded its Medicare Savings Program, which helps residents pay their Medicare premiums.

Brothers also reminded Rotarians that the Medicare Open Enrollment period is approaching soon. Vermonters seeking assistance with reviewing or changing their coverage can contact Senior Solutions through their Helpline at 802-885-2669.

A Baker's Dozen Trex Benches in Claremont

When the Claremont-Sugar River Rotary Club decided to join the NexTrex Recycling Challenge in April 2024, we did not know how successful the project would be. Eighteen months later there is no doubt that the community has fully embraced the opportunity to recycle plastic. Today, the club has completed its 13th bench, representing 13,000 pounds of plastic removed from the waste stream. Plastic that has been turned into Trex benches that are circulated throughout the city, offering a comfortable place to sit and promoting community.



We first learned about the NexTrex Recycling Challenge from Marty Cohn, member of the Springfield Vermont Rotary Club. It is amazing what happens when clubs learn from each other and develop projects that are well received by communities. Not only are we making strides in protecting our environment, but we are also lowering waste disposal costs and creating a more welcoming place to live.



Please mark your Calendars for our next International Coffee with JB at 8:30AM on Friday morning on November 7, 2025. Rotarian Steve Young will be joining us from Swellendam, South Africa.

In October 2022 Swellendam Rotary was asked by the mayor of Swellendam to help build a pre-school/nursery and a daycare center to support 388 households. The club raised local funds to build the facility. They arranged a global grant to equip the school and train the teachers. The Western Cape Education Department will take over paying teachers' salaries in one year's time. In the meantime, many Rotarians and Rotary clubs are donating \$25/month for one year to fund the salaries. District 9350's PDG Stephen Young will talk about the project, Friendship Exchanges, and other Rotary activities in Swellendam South Africa

Steve and Jackie Young are members of the Rotary Club of Swellendam, South Africa. Jackie was a career civil servant with the UK Ministry of Defence, starting at Woolwich Arsenal in 1976 and working in Equipment Procurement, Contractor Assessment, Financial Management, Personnel Management, Army Resources and Programmes, Honours and Awards and Defence Export Services, where she met Stephen in 1999. Stephen was a career Artillery officer, specialising in Field Artillery and Target Acquisition on operations and as an instructor at the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst. Graduating from the Army Staff College in 1987 he worked in a NATO Headquarters devising systems and processes with 3 US Corps. He commanded a close support artillery group on Operation Desert Storm and was awarded the US Bronze Star; he instructed on artillery tactics at the Royal School of Artillery and remodelled British Artillery officer training. He was headhunted from the Army in 2001 by BAE Systems Avionics and spent 10 years in industry before buying The Hideaway and moving to South Africa where he joined the Swellendam Rotary club and was President in 2014/15. He was an Assistant Governor in Rotary District 9350 for 2019 to 2021. Jackie and Stephen married in Malaysia in 2004 and Stephen has 2 daughters aged 44 and 40 from his first marriage and 1 grandson. Hobbies include skiing, rugby, Formula 1, wine appreciation, Rotary and people; Stephen enjoys cooking and Jackie is a wonderful baker.

Rotary Short-Term Youth Exchange Program

The Rotary Short Term Exchange Program offers students to be matched up with an overseas family and student, and then during the summer, the students visit each other's family - typically 3 to 4 weeks at each location.

This past summer District 7870 had three students who participated in Rotary Short Term Youth Exchange.

Claire (Meredith Rotary) did her exchange with Mae in France. Anna (Woodstock Rotary) did her exchange with Cecilia in Italy. Lia (Henniker Rotary) did her exchange with Freia in Austria.



Any student, age 15-19 as of July 1 of the exchange summer, of good character who possesses a warm personality and a desire to live abroad and host in return is eligible for Rotary's Short-Term Exchange. Children of both Rotarians and non-Rotarians are eligible. Foreign language proficiency is not required. Many countries throughout the world teach English as a second language and most participating students are quite proficient in it. The cost of the Rotary application fee, Rotary medical insurance, travel, clothing and personal expenses are the responsibility of the participating students and their families. The application fee and medical insurance fee are less than \$300.

Amigo de Honduras Mission Team Trip - Jan. 31-Feb. 7, 2026

As noted previously, the 2026 Amigos de Honduras mission team is beginning preparation for their mission trip which is scheduled to leave on Saturday, January 31st and return on Saturday, February 7th.

The team roster has been filled and, under the guidance of Vice Chair, Jill Pierson, the planning for the mission is well underway.

As in the past, our team requires medical supplies and many of these items can be purchased over the counter. Attached is a list of needed supplies and if your club, or your club members, would like to donate supplies, go to the attached list and click on the item and it will tell you where these can be purchased. If you do this, we'd ask that you contact our Medical Supplies Coordinator, Jeanne Conde, at jeannec@simpleportals.com to let her know which supplies you are going to acquire so we don't over purchase any items.

If instead you'd like to make a cash donation for medical supplies, but would prefer the Amigos Committee to make the purchases, that would be great. Please make checks payable to Amigos de Honduras and send your donations to my address which is noted in the header above. Whichever approach you choose, we need to have this completed by the end of September due to the documentation requirements.

Last year, my Bow club had already made a generous donation for the projects. But, then they passed the hat and members generously contributed toward the purchase of medical supplies and the club matched those donations. This resulted in a second donation being made with the express purpose of purchasing medical supplies.

However, your club and your club members decide to contribute, we very much appreciate your support.

This year's trip will have the same three areas of focus as with previous trips: medical and dental brigade, school construction, and a water and sanitation project. Typically the projects on these mission trips require funds of between \$12,000 and \$18,000.

Please know that 100% of the funds that are contributed will go to the projects, as our team members fund their own travel expenses and the administrative costs are donated.

The Rotary International District 7870 Foundation is a 501c3 charitable organization under the rules of the Internal Revenue Service. Our Tax ID is 26-0197796.



Springfield Rotary Club's 71st Annual Penny Sale Set for October 25


The Springfield Vermont Rotary Club's 71st Annual Penny Sale will take place on Saturday, October 25, 2025, at Riverside Middle School in Springfield. Doors open at 5:00 p.m., and the event begins at 6:00 p.m.

More than 300 prizes—donated by local businesses and individuals—will be up for grabs, with each chance costing just a penny. The event features three prize series—red, white, and blue—with each series offering at least 100 prizes. A \$1 series ticket provides 100 chances to win, and many attendees purchase multiple tickets to increase their odds.

Rotary members are currently out in the community collecting prizes and selling tickets for the Grand Prize drawing of \$5,000 in cash. Each \$1 Grand Prize ticket also includes entry into a \$500



The Penny Sale is the Rotary Club's largest annual fundraiser, generating the majority of funds the Club invests back into the community. Each year, the Club awards \$6,000 in scholarships to graduating Springfield High School seniors and supports a wide range of community projects and organizations.
