### **Milford Rotary Learns About Pine Ridge Indian Reservation**

Marty Cohn, Springfield Vermont Rotary Club Secretary, Chair of its Public Relations Committee and co-editor of the District #7870 Newsletter, addressed a capacity crowd of Milford Rotary Club Rotarians and guests on September 3rd, 2025 of the plight of the residents of the "Pine Ridge Indian Reservation", a sovereign nation of native Americans within the State of South Dakota.

Marty described his long time efforts, as one of a line of Rotarians, including that previously of Tony Gilmore of the Hopkinton RC, on attempting to "making a difference" in the lives of those individuals who call this 2.1 million acre parcel of land their home, by donating their time and efforts helping to provide to them some of the basic modern day supplies and necessities of 21st century life.



Home of the Oglala Lakota Sioux Tribe, it is primarily inhabited by over 18,000 individuals of Native American origin and is the largest reservation of its kind in the United States.

Marked by exorbitant rates of unemployment, sub standard housing/ infrastructure, alcoholism, teen suicide, infant mortality, drug abuse, chronic illness and the lowest life expectancy in the United States, the reservation, defined by living standards of industrialized nations, is the poorest nation, outside of Haiti , in the western hemisphere.

Marty's efforts, those before him and to this day, remain a testament to Rotary's genuine humanitarian mission of goodwill...and of the immeasurable impact that simple acts of kindness can impart to one's sense of self-dignity.

## **Rutland South Rotary Club Celebrates 50 Years of Service with \$50,000 Grant to Local Non-Profit**

The Rutland South Rotary Club is proud to announce a major milestone and a bold new initiative in honor of its 50th anniversary. For over five decades, the Club has been a driving force in the community and beyond—raising thousands of dollars to support nearly 100 nonprofit organizations locally and globally.



Among some of their projects the club has:

- Distributed hundreds of dictionaries to third-grade students
- Enhanced the Rutland Creek Path for bikers and walkers
- Built an outdoor play area for students at Northwest School
- Provided essential school supplies to children in need

To mark its 50th anniversary, the Club is launching a significant philanthropic initiative: a \$50,000 grant will be awarded to a nonprofit organization serving Rutland County.

This one-time grant aims to empower a local nonprofit with the resources needed to expand their mission, improve lives, and strengthen the community.

## 26th Annual Duck Race Features Over 650 Ducks Seeking Victory

This past Saturday, over 650 ducks (rubber ducks to be certain) raced from the Depot Street bridge to Walker Bridge as the Ludlow Rotary Club (LRC) conducted its 26<sup>th</sup> annual race down the Black River.

According to the Head Duck, Sharon Bixby, the course was difficult for both the ducks and the Rotarians and friends helping them traverse the shallow and rocky waters of the river. Nonetheless, most of the ducks managed to cross the Walker Bridge finish line.



The first ducks crossing the line rewarded their owners who had “rented” them with financial awards. They were:

Duck #1 – awarded \$200, owner, Anonymous

Duck #2 – awarded \$100, owner, Theresa Southworth

Duck #3 – awarded \$50, owner, Suzanne Theroux

Corporate Duck winner – awarded “bragging rights”, owner, The Book Nook

And last (but not least) The last duck to make it across the finish line, awarded \$25 and owned by Virginia Ward

The proceeds from this year’s race will go to the Mt. Holly Fire Department so they can purchase new hoses.

Sharon Bixby, expressed her thanks to the various groups that assisted in the event, especially the businesses and those who purchased Duck tickets.

While some of the river guidance staff are still trying to dry out their shoes, Sharon indicated that the LRC is busy planning next year’s “river exercise”. 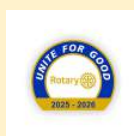

## Ludlow Rotary Celebrates Literacy Week Continuing over 30 Years of Promoting It

For the past 30 years, the Ludlow Rotary Club (LRC) has participated in a variety of programs stressing the value and importance of literacy. Its efforts were primarily aimed at providing children with the means and tools to foster this objective. Rotary International (RI) has long concentrated on this program.



In reviewing the accomplishments of these programs, Kevin Barnes, LRC President, noted, "While our club has been involved in many projects to help, none has been as consistent and rewarding as our literacy programs."



Barnes further indicated, “These programs have long been a source of great pride in the club as we continue making books available to all the children in our service area of Ludlow, Mt Holly, Cavendish, and Plymouth.”

In conjunction with the Dolly Parton “Imagination Library”, LRC has provided appropriate reading material to children from very young to five years. Dolly Parton’s Imagination Library is a book gifting program that mails free, high-quality books to children from birth until they begin school, no matter their family’s income.

The signature book of the Imagination Library, “The Little Engine That Could”, is recognized by most parents. The books are addressed and mailed directly to the children, much to their delight. To register your pre-school child or children for this program is to visit the children’s’ section of Ludlow’s Fletcher Memorial Library or registration cards can also be obtained from the Ludlow Rotary, PO Box 216, Ludlow, VT 05149. The privacy of the children is strictly honored.

LRC has a continuing program of supplying books to elementary school students in the four towns in its area. LRC has created books, personalized with each student’s name, for many years to the elementary schools in its service area as part of its Literacy Improvement Project. Interestingly, one teacher even commented that “I still have the ones created for my children more than 20 years ago and still enjoy giving them a read now and again!”

An important part of this program is the continuing program of awarding scholarships to eligible graduating residents who live in LRC’s service area. LRC funds \$9,000 to \$12,000 in awards each year. The LRC has previously awarded \$280,000 in scholarships through this program. The principal source of this funding is the annual Penny Sale.

Applications for these awards are available through the school Guidance Officer. Awards are presented at the school’s annual award night program.

In summarizing the LRC’s dedication to providing these books, Barnes said, “It is the long-range goal of Rotary and our club to ensure that every student and child in our area are served with the educational and learning tools for a successful career in whatever avenue they select.”

## Brattleboro Sunrise Rotary Club International Projects

### **Escuela Agricola de Suyapa, Merendon Mountain región west of San Pedro Sula**

For over 9 years our RC has provided a \$1000 scholarship annually to a student at the Escuela Agricola de Suyapa, a 4-year high school, in the Merendon Mountain region west of San Pedro Sula, Honduras. The school offers courses only on-site as families are too poor to own computers or connect to internet services. Core courses are offered as well as special focus in business and farm management. Successfully accomplishing these courses qualifies the students for practicums with established businesses in the San Pedro Sula (SPS) region. SPS is the economic capital of Honduras. The students come from very poor families so the education offers a critical first step to breaking the cycle of family poverty. Scholarship recipients have been wonderful about staying in touch, writing letters about their studies, dreams, and hopes for a different future.

### **Mujeres Mejorando Vidas, Women Improving Lives, Huehuetenango, Guatemala**

Our RC learned about this project this year and contributed to the funding for a retreat/education/training center. In Guatemala, abused women is a national disgrace but the government has not only recognized the severity of this issue but has collaborated with at least 10 different organizations trying to offer safe havens, training, support for kids, education, counseling, and especially job skills. The concerted level of government support has made a difference. The women we are supporting have been learning how to make chocolate and we are anxious to see their first product entering the market.

### **Work Force Development Project, Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, South Dakota**

For more than 7 years we have been working with Wendell Yellow Bull helping him realize the set of project objectives he has designed. Initially, he was determined to offer work force development skills for carpenters, plumbers, and electricians. He was able to take over use of a trailer that had been a COVID treatment center then became horribly abused by local disaffected kids. He repaired all the windows, painted the interior, replaced flooring and made the bathrooms functional. My wife & I delivered a 9' screen donated by the Rhode Island School of Design, which will allow him to enhance training through projected images and zoom meetings.

He needed a commercial grade kitchen meeting code requirements so that he can offer meals during training days. Lakota families are very poor so by offering meals, he is expanding his impact.





He has offered courses in whittling and working with clay, The whittling classes were not very successful but in contrast the kids really enjoyed were keenly motivated to be making images with clay.

Recently, Wendell felt the need to improve availability to locally grown vegetables. He secured second hand materials that allowed him to construct 2 green houses, which he did with the help of his kids and local youth. The green houses have been very successful already but he is still looking forward to harvesting all he planted.

Wendell completed college, is a Veteran, and served on EMS units on the reservation. He is a community leader.

## **Amigo de Honduras Mission Team Trip - Jan. 31-Feb. 7, 2026**

As noted previously, the 2026 Amigos de Honduras mission team is beginning preparation for their mission trip which is scheduled to leave on Saturday, January 31<sup>st</sup> and return on Saturday, February 7<sup>th</sup>.

The team roster has been filled and, under the guidance of Vice Chair, Jill Pierson, the planning for the mission is well underway.

As in the past, our team requires medical supplies and many of these items can be purchased over the counter. Attached is a list of needed supplies and if your club, or your club members, would like to donate supplies, go to the attached list and click on the item and it will tell you where these can be purchased. If you do this, we'd ask that you contact our Medical Supplies Coordinator, Jeanne Conde, at [jeannec@simpleportals.com](mailto:jeannec@simpleportals.com) to let her know which supplies you are going to acquire so we don't over purchase any items.

If instead you'd like to make a cash donation for medical supplies, but would prefer the Amigos Committee to make the purchases, that would be great. Please make checks payable to Amigos de Honduras and send your donations to my address which is noted in the header above. Whichever approach you choose, we need to have this completed by the end of September due to the documentation requirements.

Last year, my Bow club had already made a generous donation for the projects. But, then they passed the hat and members generously contributed toward the purchase of medical supplies and the club matched those donations. This resulted in a second donation being made with the express purpose of purchasing medical supplies.

However, your club and your club members decide to contribute, we very much appreciate your support.

This year's trip will have the same three areas of focus as with previous trips: medical and dental brigade, school construction, and a water and sanitation project. Typically the projects on these mission trips require funds of between \$12,000 and \$18,000.

Please know that 100% of the funds that are contributed will go to the projects, as our team members fund their own travel expenses and the administrative costs are donated.

The Rotary International District 7870 Foundation is a 501c3 charitable organization under the rules of the Internal Revenue Service. Our Tax ID is 26-0197796.
