# <u>The 2024 - 2025 Report on Amigos de Honduras Mission Trip and Projects Submitted By PDG Chris Parkinson</u>

Over the last twenty- five years, Rotary District 7870 (Rotary Clubs in Southern NH and Southern VT) have had 32 mission trips and provided aid to Honduras which is the second poorest country in the western hemisphere. This included twenty-six (26) trips working with the Danli Rotary Club and six (6) trips working with the Ursula Rotary Club in San Pedro Sula.

After hurricane Mitch devastated Honduras in 1999, Rotary Clubs of District 7870 formed Amigos de Honduras, which ultimately became a program of the Rotary District 7870 Foundation, a non-profit corporation. One of the trustees of the foundation, PDG Chris Parkinson, currently heads up the activities of Amigos de Honduras.

Since 2001, Amigos de Honduras has concentrated its efforts in four areas:

- Medical Care In 25 years we have seen approximately 30,000 medical and dental patients. In 2025, we saw 847 patients.
- Medical Equipment and Supplies
  - Over 14.5 Tons of Medical Supplies Transported by Team Members
  - 7 40' Containers of Medical Equipment & Supplies
  - o 3 Ambulances shipped
- School Construction & Education We have constructed 10 schools, expanded 5 schools, and converted 2 other buildings into schools. We have repaired and painted 17 schools, and we have worked on a youth center and a drug rehabilitation facility. We have also provided school uniforms to over 400 students which are required for children to attend school. In 2024, we participated in the construction of a new school building which is part of the El Pozo Bendito school campus and it was completed in 2025. In 2025, we participated in the construction of a new school building in Quiscamotes, a poor and remote section of Danli.
- Pure Water Working with another 501c3 Rotary partner, *Pure Water for the World (PWW)*, we have installed or funded over 11,100 water filters which provide clean water to more than 58,000 people. We have also provided wells and latrines to several villages. In 2020-21, we worked with PWW and provided emergency relief to restore water lines that were destroyed by Hurricanes Eta and lota. In 2022, we funded a PWW water and sanitation project in El Chaguite. In 2023, we worked with PWW at the CEB Francisco Morazan Scool in the town of Los Alamendros where we rehabilitated 3 latrines, built 4 new latrines, a hand washing station, installed a water line and cistern, and two water filters. In 2023, it was announced that PWW was closing down operations. Therefore, in 2024 we did not have a Water and Sanitation project. However, in 2025 we worked with Agua Pura, which is an NGO spawned by former employees of PWW. We funded and participated in a project in Ochoa, a community located over an hour from Danli.

## **History**

District 7870 has developed an excellent track record over the past 25 years and, as noted above, has accomplished a great deal. Amigos de Honduras (Amigos) is grateful to those that have funded and those that have participated on these Mission trips which include Rotary Clubs, individual Rotarians, friends of Rotarians, Concord Hospital, the Hampton Inn in Bow, and businesses in the NH and VT region.

One of the founders, and the soul of our Amigos program, was Mary Crooker, from Nashua, who was a member of the Nashua West Rotary Club, and served on 23 of the mission trips. In 2015, Mary unfortunately died of ALS and the Rotarians in Danli named a school in her honor. Mary's spirit lives on in everything we do.

In 2022, another dedicated member of many mission teams, Henry Swierczynski, passed away. Henry, and his wife Nora, were from Springfield, Vermont, and Henry was a member of the Springfield Rotary Club. It was truly an honor to have had the opportunity to work along side them.

The contributions of Mary and Henry over the years were a key factor in the success of Amigos de Honduras, and they inspire us to continue our efforts in our mission to improve the lives of the people of Honduras.

#### **2025 Mission Team**

In 2025 a team of 27 members, which included 12 Rotarians, traveled to Danli. The trip was made more difficult because the airport was moved to Comayagua from Tegucigalpa, and the highway between Tegucigalpa and Danli is under construction. In addition to this, the team was delayed at the airport for two hours by Honduran officials because of the medications they were transporting. This was despite having made a significant effort to correctly file the new required documentation in advance of the trip. This resulted in the team not getting to the hotel in Danli until after 9:30 at night, with most of the team having traveled for approximately 20 hours. It should be noted that Henniker Rotarian, Nicole Lang, and Danli Rotarians, Andrea Merlo and Raul Sevilla, had done significant work in completing the documentation process, and we sincerely thank them for their efforts.

Dave Lawrence, who has extensive experience in leading teams shared the leadership responsibilites with Bow Rotarian, and the Chair of Amigos, Chris Parkinson. Dave also led the construction efforts with respect to the School Construction Project. Dave is a Rotarian from Lancaster, Pennsylvania (but was formerly a member of the Springfield Vermont Rotary Club). Nurse Practioner, Nicole Lang, of the Henniker Club led the Medical team. Shannon Mills a Dentist and a Rotarian from Concord took the lead with respect to the Dental brigade. Jeanne Conde, a Rotarian from Bethel Vermont, led the Pharmacy efforts. As noted previously, 12 Rotarians were on the team, as Bethel, Bow, Concord, Henniker, Keene, Nashua West, Rotex Alum Rotaract, as well as, Lancaster, PA, and Belafonte, PA, all had team members participate.

## The El Pozo Bendito School 2024-25 Project

The 2024 project was the construction of a new school building on the El Pozo Bendito school campus. It had been held up due to some documentation issues between the community and the city of Danli. However, these issues were resolved, thanks to the efforts of Danli Rotarian, Roldan Echeverria. Dave Lawrence and Chris Parkinson visited the construction project in January of 2025 and were very pleased to see that it was nearly completed. The building is a multi-purpose facility and is another example of a wonderful project done through a partnership with Amigos de Honduras, The Danli Rotary Club, and The City of Danli.

#### The El Pozo Bendito School 2024-25 Project (Cont.)

The 2024 team members that worked on the school were Dave Lawrence, Steve Neuhof, Dave Ament, John Bob Siemienowicz, Tosh Stickney, and other members of the team from time to time. The project was led by a maestro that was a member of the El Pozo Bendito Community and other members of the community also assisted each day. The team also installed two white boards in two other school buildings. As noted previously, Roldan Echeverria, was the Danli Rotarian overseeing the project.

It should be noted that, in 2013 Amigos had worked with the El Pozo Bendito Community to replace the rooves on 5 school buildings, and we painted and repaired those buildings where needed. This is a great community and we have very much enjoyed working with the members of the community on these projects. ## Reflections from the 2025 Team (Cont.)

Chris,

Thanks so much for your dedication and hard work organizing the complex travel and logistical arrangements to make the 2025 Amigos mission another resounding success. We also could not have been successful without Nicole's attention to detail with ARSA to get our medical supplies through Honduran customs. These efforts enabled the dental team to brake new ground with a I-pad based digital record that allows us to collect and analyze population health data. We also offered more effective patient education and expanded use of direct preventive services, especially for our youngest patients. As always, there were lessons learned that we can apply to help improve the program going forward.

After you left Danli on Thursday, the dental team met, and we discussed the possibility of returning to Honduras next year with or without the medical or construction teams. We recognize that the highway construction poses a serious challenge, but team members were unanimous in support of investigating the possibility of having a dental team visit in 2026. Missing a year greatly limits the ability to build on the prevention focused programs we are now working to implement. We would of course welcome the medical, construction and water teams if they were interested in joining us.

When I spoke with Raul, Victor, Roldan, Dr. Varela, and other Danli Rotarians, they were supportive of us returning. I am hoping we can also use the visit to meet with public health officials and members of the local dental community to discuss how we provide support to create locally managed programs supported by Rotary. Dr. Varela is going to try to set up some virtual meetings with key players in the near term to see what may be possible. These meetings should inform us on how we approach future visits.

We know that we will need the support of Rotary District 7870 and the Rotary Club of Danli going forward. We recognize that your experience and hard work have been essential in planning and organizing the Amigos trips for the last 25 years. We respect your choice to take a year off and are not expecting you to organize or execute a dental only mission. We would, however, be deeply grateful for your mentorship and guidance if we try to make this work.

Laural Dillon has agreed to take over as dental team lead, with me serving in a supporting role. Andrew Cirrone's skill sets include being a travel agent and he is willing to take lead on setting up the logistics and travel component. Mike Apfelberg, Brian Ruede, and Lorrie are maybes for next year, but Jill, Esdras, Bruce, Laural, Andrew and I are very much on board. Todd Blomerth has also expressed interest in joining us again. One thing that may make it easier next year is that Esdras was able to keep our dental chairs and sterilizers reducing the volume and weight of baggage we will need to carry.
