#### Alina's essay:

I have always tried to live life the fullest. I try to never take anything for granted; never let a day slip by without fully appreciating it. Although my life has been wonderful I have never appreciated anything as much as my junior year which I spent in Hungary as an exchange student.

I knew that I would have to make every day special. I knew that I'd only be there for 10 months and that to experience and take in all that I could I would have to make every moment count. I wanted to be immersed in the culture and to become as Hungarian as I possibly could. At the beginning of my year I never wasted time when I was alone at my host families' house; I always studied the language. I knew that to understand the culture that I would have to understand the language. I wanted to be able to understand the conversations and the people around me. I studied and studied and by the end of the year I was fluent in one of the hardest languages for English speakers to learn.

I took all the opportunities for travel that I could get. I was so lucky and saw more of Europe than most people will ever see. I saw all different cultures up close and met so many interesting people. I spent as much time as possible with people from my Hungarian high school making social connections. By the end of my trip, I had dozens of close friends and so many amazing relationships with people. I made every moment with my host families count because I never knew exactly when I would be moving to a new family. I got to know them so well, that they became like a real family to me. In the last few months of my exchange I never took a day for granted. There were people I met and I never knew if I would see them again. I said goodbye to them every time as if it would be our last meeting, our parting of ways. Every place I went I made sure to take it all in, to remember every detail because I didn't know if I'd ever be back again.

Everything and every person that touched my heart over the course of my exchange, were so special to me. I encourage everyone to live life to the fullest and make the most of each day. I believe that "We ought to make every moment count, because it may be the last."

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#### Kenneth (Ken) W. Grabeau Rotary International Director Nominee – 2010-2012

Ken is the nominee for Director of Rotary International from the newly constituted Zone 32 for the Rotary years 2010 to 2012.

Ken was governor of District 7870 in 1997-98. Since that time, he has represented two Rotary International presidents at district conferences, served as the District 7870 delegate to two Councils on Legislation, served as a National Advisor for the Permanent Fund for four years, was a member of the International Multi-district PETS Committee, is a charter member of the Water and Sanitation Rotary Action Group and sat on the 2004 Nominating Committee that selected the 2006-08 Rotary International Director. In January 2009, Ken and Ruth will serve as Discussion Leaders training incoming District Governors at the International Assembly in San Diego.



Ken is the only Discussion Leader to have participated in every one of the New England Multi-district PETS since its inception in 1994. He served as General Chair of that committee in 1998 during his year as District Governor. He has been a member of the Zones 31-32 Rotary Foundation Training Team and coordinator of the Public Relations and Rotary Image Task Force, Foundation Alumni Resource Group and Brisbane Convention Promotion Committee for Zones 28, 31, 32, 33 and 34.

Ken and Ruth have participated in National Immunization Days in Cameroon in 2002 and Ghana in 2005. They have traveled twice to Russia where they held organizational meetings for a new Rotary club in Petrozavodsk and founded the first drug treatment center west of the Urals in Tver. They have made multiple trips into Central America, initially providing relief from Hurricane Mitch and ultimately organizing a multi-district committee that continues today to provide equipment, supplies and human services to areas of greatest need. Ken is immediate Past President of Pure Water for the World, an independent 501(C)3 not-for-profit that he took from a single club project to a successful Rotary partner that has provided clean water to over 125,000 people in six countries in Central America and the Caribbean.


Ken is the recipient of Rotary's Service Above Self Award and The Rotary Foundation's Citation for Meritorious Service. Both he and Ruth are Major Donors, multiple Paul Harris Fellows, charter members of the Bequest Society, Benefactors and charter members of the Paul Harris Society.

Ken is founder, President and CEO of Monarch Instrument, a 32 year old manufacturer of industrial instrumentation. Ken and Ruth have lived in Nashua, NH for their entire 42 years of marriage and are parents of Glenn and Meridith and grandparents of four beautiful granddaughters. Ken has served on and chaired the boards of United Way and Girls Inc., and has been a member of numerous other not-for-profit boards. **PROGRAM:** Our distinguished District Governor, Alice (Alley) Boucher joined us this morning to talk about her vision, platform, and direction for this year. Representing the Central and Southern sections of both Vermont and New Hampshire, Alley and her husband, Charlie, are traveling around to her clubs to visit, meet and greet, and spread her message of hope. Her theme this year, "Make Dreams Real", befits her passion for change. After hearing RI President DK Lee, it is clear that Alley has taken on the challenge of being a District Governor with a purpose.

Her major goal is to make the club contributions to the Bill and Melinda Gates challenge to eradicate Polio in one year rather than 3. That said, we as a club are now tasked with educating our community about Polio and to raise our \$3000 contribution to help Alley "Make Dreams Real." "As Rotarians, we have dreams both internationally and for our communities. It is up to us to make those dreams real." In her plea to help with the eradication of Polio, Alley reminded us that, "it is only a plane ride away,

and the 1300 cases last year represent four countries." With the number of immigrants to the United States, we must be vigilant not only about our own children but about those from other countries as well. To raise the matching portion, our District is being asked to contribute \$180,000....not unrealistic considering that the '93 campaign raised \$500,000....LET'S GO!!!

#### Food, Glorious Food

We'll eat splendidly in the majestic 19<sup>th</sup> century dining room bay at The Balsams Grand Resort during the coming district conference. Rotarians will be interested to know he was chef instructor at The Culinary School at Kendall College in Evanston, Illinois.

Chef de Cuisine Steve Learned is a second-generation employee who grew up in The Balsams kitchen. He graduated from the Culinary Institute of America, has been Executive Chef in a number of US hotels and returned to The Balsams in 1998. He was named Chef of the Year by the Northern NH Chapter of the ACF in 1999 and is currently President of the Balsams Culinary School, Inc.

Garde Manger Patricia Tallmadge graduated from The Balsams Culinary Apprenticeship Program in 1997, after which she traveled to Switzerland for special studies in chocolate making. In 2001, she received the Chef of the Year Award and in 2002 the Charles Carroll Award.
