
Miss Daisy's Reign Nearing the End


It is hard to believe that my term as District Governor will be coming to an end in less than a month. It seems like only yesterday when I became District Governor.

The District Conference: These Are a Few of My Favorite Things

We really did step back in time -- in mind, body and spirit – during the three days we savored the old world charm and service of The Balsams. The accompanying pictures capture the learning and the high spirits of the 2009 district conference.

Attendance was high, with 357 of us gathering for the weekend conference. Fifty-one out of District 7870's 59 clubs were represented, for a participation rate of 86%. We also had Rotarians from North Carolina (former 7870er Al Kerr), from The Balsam's district, 7850 (District Governor T. Tall, who welcomed us), and from England.

The president of Rotary International, Dong-Kurn Lee, unable to attend, sent, as his personal representative, John Hockin from England, one of RI's foremost trainers for senior leaders in both Rotary and the Rotary Foundation. John's messages brought us RI wisdom on membership and the foundation.

Did the novel ticket system contribute to the high punctuality? Exchange students handed out attendance tickets at the door just until the session began. Then tickets were drawn at the session's close and prizes given away. Clubs donated the terrific array of prizes.

Clubs also brought non-perishable food, which was donated to the Colebrook Food Pantry, and book, which went to the local library.

Another innovation was the sprinkling throughout the conference of brief descriptions of ways in which different clubs carried out this year's theme to "Make Dreams Real" -- Deerfield Valley's garden of hope, Bennington's high school radio show, Derry's World War II veteran reunion, Ludlow's blankets for senior citizens.

We danced away Friday evening in the Switzerland of America Room to the groovy music of DJ Andy Pratt. Saturday night was left suspiciously blank on the program, and we found out why when Governor Alley surprised us with an invitation to go outside to The Balsams veranda. Suddenly, the big sky lit up with spectacular fireworks – and continued to hundreds of ohs and ahs. It was an exciting end to a satisfying day and our thanks go to the anonymous donors who underwrote the show.

To ensure that we, our children and our grandchildren won't forget this conference or The Balsams, each participant received a little balsam fir seedling to take home with a label instructing us to "Plant Me To Remember Gov. Alley's District Conference."

Governor Alley's sweet 15-year-old granddaughter Samantha sang to us during Saturday's dinner.


Rotarians Help Save Lives

Matching Grant 60086 has been completed and closed by TRF. The project was made possible by contributions from Rotarians in New Hampshire and Texas. A total of 165 biosand filters were

deployed in five villages in La Moskitia, Honduras. The villages were recommended by the Health Dept of Gracias a Dios, the state/department in which La Moskitia is located. Rotarians personally confirmed a major problem with diarrhea from drinking contaminated river water in each of the five villages. Rotarians also personally confirmed that in each village after filters were implemented, the incidence of illness either was dramatically reduced or eliminated. Based on the technology and our verification that the villagers are able to properly maintain the filters, their impact should be indefinite.



In addition, 8 shallow water wells were drilled in two villages. We also verified they are working and these initial wells paved the way for another 64 wells that were later drilled on a

Rotary Clubs in Rutland Area Donate \$4,400 To Buy Mosquito Nets to Combat Malaria in Togo

On April 17, in the rural African village of Mire, Dapaong-Togo, 422 insecticidal mosquito nets were distributed free from Rutland area Rotarians to school children, their teachers, pregnant women, the aged and the rest of the population, who were gathered and waiting at the school playground. Every child that belonged to a family in Mire received one net. Some were held in reserve for the sick that could not make it to the distribution site.

Insecticide-treated mosquito nets are the principal way to protect children from nocturnal Anopheles mosquitoes that feed indoors. Mosquitoes stick to the nets and die before they can bite and infect a human. Nets cost about \$10 each and last approximately five years.

Prior to the distribution there was a speech by the Rev. Charles Sakpani Tchankoume, who coordinated and executed the purchase and distribution of the nets. He made clear to the eager audience that the nets were a gift from the Rotary International Clubs of Rutland, Vermont, USA in order to assist them to stop the deadly disease that was especially killing children in their village. He added that, "they were running out of words to express their gratitude and they were thankful for choosing their village, far away and almost lost and forgotten about."

Where is Togo? Actually, it is a small country in West Africa bordering Ghana to the West, officially the Togolese Republic. It gained its independence from France in 1960.

What is important to Rotarians is that in Africa a child dies of malaria every 30 seconds and they are compelled to take action to alleviate the suffering through the many programs of Rotary International, or in this case by a locally coordinated direct effort with a small village in Togo.

The Rotary Club of Rutland has a long relationship with Mire, Togo. One of its members, Bob Miller, whose son-in-law was a missionary serving there over 14 years ago saw the need for equipment to draw clean drinking water. Bob called the Club's attention to the need and it responded with the funds to purchase the needed pumps. A few months ago, Bob seized the initiative once again, this time to take action to halt deaths from malaria and together with fellow Rotarian Barbara Giancola, visited all the Rutland area Rotary clubs and invited them to participate in this worthy project.


Rotary Club of Rutland president George Ambrose said, "We are proud to change lives for the better, one at a time; across town or in this case, across the world."




