He even invited Darragh and his family, together with the Rotary singers, to come up behind his bench for the photo that accompanies this article. We don't think Darragh will forget this day for a long time to come!

As we prepare for this month's district golf tournament, we are reminded of what noted golf pro Stewart Marden -- who taught Bobby Jones to play the game -- said, about The Balsam's Panorama Course, "I've played golf all my life, in Scotland and American, but never in such a setting as this. It's the most beautiful course I've ever seen."

The Balsams boasts two golf courses – the 9-hole Executive Coashaukee and the celebrated 18-hole Panorama, designed and built by legendary golf architect Donald Ross. The Panorama is set in

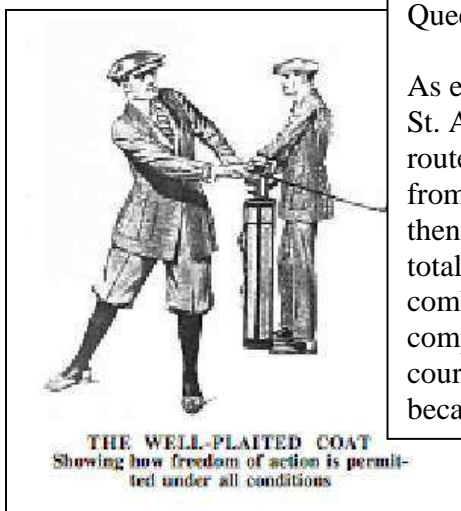
in the side of Mount Keazer, with breathtaking mountain views and a challenging course that has been played by the likes of Teddy Roosevelt, Frank Sinatra, Babe Ruth, John Philip Sousa and Will Rogers.

To celebrate 100 years of golf at The Balsams, and the earliest traditions of the game, names for each of the 18 holes were chosen by a diverse group of longtime players of the course. Samples: Giant's Grave, Tamarack Knolls, Slippery and Slipperier.

There is no truth to the rumor that the word “golf” originated as an acronym for "gentlemen only, ladies forbidden." The word Golf, according to Wikipedia, was mentioned in 1457 writing as *gouf* in a Scottish statute on forbidden games. Possibly it derived from the Scots word *goulf* -- to strike -- which may, in turn, be derived from the Dutch word *kolf*, meaning "club," and the Dutch sport of the same name. Got it?

Although a game similar to golf was first mentioned in an 11th Century Chinese book and in 1297 in the Netherlands, golf is generally agreed to have originated from Scotland in the 1100s. Scotland records the first golf club memberships, the earliest permanent golf course, the first written rules, the first formalized tournaments and competition between Scottish cities. And Mary, Queen of Scots reputedly played in 1567.

As early as the 15th century, golfers at Scotland's St. Andrews Links played an 11-hole end-to-end route laid out through narrow, undulating terrain from the clubhouse to the far end of the property, then turned around and played the holes in, for a total of 22 holes. In 1764, some short holes were combined, reducing the number to nine, so a complete round comprised 18 holes. All other courses followed suit and the 18-hole course became the standard.

**The Henniker Chili Fest** was attended by 2,000 people who consumed 180 gallons of chili prepared by 49 Chili Makers.

Had she attended, Paris Hilton would have exclaimed, “That’s hot!”

Hot day, hot chili, hot rods, hot crowd! Everything about the 2008 Henniker Rotary Club Chili Fest at Pats Peak, August 24 was hot...hot...hot.

“With an estimated 2,000 in attendance, 49 Chili Makers and 60 Classic Cars competing, a perfect summer day and plenty of activities to keep everyone happy, it was the most successful fundraising event in the club’s 22 year history”, noted club President, Paul Trocki.

And the final tally: 180 gallons of chili devoured, 1,700 hot dogs and hamburgers served, 1,600 cold drinks consumed and over \$25,000 raised for local and international Rotary service and humanitarian projects.

The following winners were announced when all the ballots were counted: In the Restaurant category: First Place: Harvester Market, Second Place: Que Pasa, Third Place: Idlewild Restaurant and Best Presentation: Harvester Market, all of Henniker.
