

RI PRESIDENT'S MONTHLY MESSAGE

In October 1914, Jonas Salk was born – a man who would change world history by inventing the first effective vaccine against polio. When the vaccine was introduced in the United States in the 1950s, polls indicated that polio was one of the nation's two greatest fears, second only to the fear of atomic war. And with good reason: In the 1952 U.S. polio epidemic, 58,000 cases were reported, with 3,145 deaths and 21,269 instances of permanent, disabling paralysis. Globally, polio paralyzed or killed up to half a million people every year.



Soon after the Salk vaccine was created, Albert Sabin developed an oral version, allowing tremendous numbers

of children to be immunized quickly, safely, and inexpensively. In 1985, Rotary's PolioPlus program was born, with a simple goal: to immunize every child under age five against this crippling disease. Thanks in large part to the initial success of PolioPlus, in 1988 the 166 member states of the World Health Assembly unanimously set the goal of global polio eradication.

At the time, the idea was breathtakingly ambitious, and many called it impossible. Today, we are closer to this goal than ever before, with only a few hundred cases of polio reported per year, and just three remaining endemic countries. We are on track to achieve full eradication by 2018 – if we can keep up the momentum that has brought us this far.

And this month, we will mark World Polio Day on 24 October, and celebrate the 100th anniversary of Dr. Salk's birth.

I ask you all to Light Up Rotary this month by doing whatever you can to shine a spotlight on our efforts to eradicate polio. Call your government officials and let them know that polio eradication matters to you. Go to endpolionow.org for inspiring stories about Rotary's work, and share them on social media. And make the best investment you'll ever make, by donating to polio eradication right on the endpolionow.org website and earning a two-to-one match on your contribution from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

When we eradicate polio – and we will – we'll have brought the world into a better future, and Rotary into a better future as well. We will have proved ourselves, as an organization, capable of great things. And we will have given our children and grandchildren a gift that will endure forever: a polio-free world.

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TWO SECRET WORDS AND FIVE STEPS TO INCREASE CLUB MEMBERSHIP 10%

- More members assures the club will be able to continue to serve those in need
- Clustering membership growth generates a momentum of camaraderie that unifies the club as a fighting force for good and that spirit creates further growth
- New younger members are essential; it defines our success and assures our survival
- Most Rotarians are leaders yet only 15% sponsor new members
- Challenge leaders to do what they do at their vocation: lead by example

STEP ONE: Look in the Mirror

If you are Membership Chair it is imperative that you set the example Develop a three year new membership and retention goal Make your tactics *personal* with face-to-face and personal email contacts Use the Two Secret Words: JUST ASK

STEP TWO: Challenge the Members of the Membership Committee

Convene your committee and communicate goals
Ask each member when or why they have not sponsored a new member
Get each to think about potential candidates at the meeting
Follow up each with regular email communications and build prospect list

STEP THREE: Dare the Members of the Board of Directors to Lead by example

Present your membership plans at a board meeting
Ask them to participate as the *leaders they were elected to be*Follow up each with regular email communications and build prospect list
If you meet with resistance, review a member's Face Book page for prospects

STEP FOUR: Rifle Shot Personal Messages to High Profile Club Members

You know who they are. They may not be current leaders but they are influential.

These Rotarians are active in the community and serve on boards

Consider searching popular Boards of Directors and look for a Rotarian's name. There may be good prospects on the board they serve on.

Be sure and review members who may have left the club in recent years

STEP FIVE: Encourage New Members to Propose New Members

The most enthusiastic members in your club may be the newest members.=
If they are younger than the median age they are likely to propose one in that age group Active Rotarians stay Rotarians. New members want to do stuff. Engage them.

All Rotarians are leaders. They will almost always accept a challenge. That's what makes them leaders. Give them the opportunity to demonstrate leadership. Challenge them with a personal appeal. All I did was ASK, and membership increased 25% in eight months. All you have to do is JUST ASK.

COUNCIL ON LEGISLATION

2016 Council on Legislation

Every three years Rotary International's Council on Legislation meets to debate and vote on legislation submitted by clubs, districts, the RI Board, and the general council or conference of RIBI. The Council has the authority to amend RI's constitutional documents, as well as adopt resolutions. Every district sends one representative to the Council, and District 7870 has given me the honor of representing our district in 2016.

Every club and district may propose legislation. If your club is considering proposing legislation for the Council, please follow the guidelines below.

How to Propose Legislation

All proposed legislation should be submitted through the 2016 Council Legislation online form by clicking on the following link: https://rotary.qualtrics.com/SE/?SID=SV-86x9bQkfU8vwXIh

As part of the form, a Word version of the constitutional document with the proposed changes will need to be uploaded. The Word documents can be found on the governance documents page of the Rotary <u>website</u>.

Legislation proposed by a club must first be endorsed by the clubs of the district in order to be presented to the Council. So please contact me at cep617@comcast.net if your club is interested in proposing legislation.

Legislation from clubs and districts for the 2016 Council must be *received* by Rotary International on or before **December 31, 2014**. There are <u>no exceptions</u> to this deadline.

For a club to propose legislation:

- 1. The club's board of directors must first submit proposed legislation to the club members for adoption at a regular club meeting.
- 2. If adopted, the proposal must then be forwarded to the district with a letter signed by the club president and secretary certifying that it has been adopted by the club.
- 3. The proposal must then be endorsed by the district. This will take time so a club should provide enough time, at least two weeks, prior to the deadline of **December 31, 2014**.
