Greetings From Your District Governor

Every Sunday morning I take a walk around a pond near my home. Every time I walk there I see the same elderly woman sitting at the water's edge with a small metal cage sitting beside her.

This past Sunday my curiosity got the best of me, so I stopped and walked

over to her. As I got closer, I realized that the metal cage was in fact a small trap. There were three turtles, unharmed, slowly walking around the base of the trap. She had a fourth turtle in her lap that she was carefully scrubbing with a spongy brush.

"Hello," I said. "I see you here every Sunday. If you don't mind my nosiness, I'd love to know what you're doing with those turtles." She smiled. "I'm cleaning off their shells," she replied.



"Anything on a turtle's shell, like algae or scum, reduces the turtle's ability to absorb heat and impedes its ability to swim. It can also corrode and weaken the shell over time."

"Wow! That's really nice of you!" I said.

She went on: "I spend a couple of hours each Sunday morning relaxing by this pond and helping these little guys out. It's my own strange way of making a difference."

"But don't most freshwater turtles live their whole lives with algae and scum hanging from their shells?" I ask.

"Yep, sadly they do." She replied.

I scratched my head. "Well then, don't you think your time could be better spent? I mean, I think your efforts are kind and all, but there are fresh water turtles living in ponds all around the world. And 99% of these turtles don't have kind, people like you to help them clean off their shells. So, no offense...but how exactly are your localized efforts here truly making a difference?"

The woman giggled aloud, she then looked down at the turtle in her lap, scrubbed off the last piece of algae from its shell, and said, "Sweetie, if this little guy could talk, he'd tell you I just made all the difference in the world."

If I can do one thing this year, it is to ensure Rotarians in this district feel good about being Rotarians, knowing you can and do make a difference.

Committee comprised of Jim McElroy, Jan's husband, and Mary Krotzer from the Henniker Rotary Club, Peter Powers from the Hopkinton Rotary Club, Jay Burgess from the Concord Rotary Club, Dave Saturley from the White River Junction Rotary Club, and Sandra McGonagle from the Gilford Rotary Club are pleased to announce the third recipient of the Janice H. McElroy Scholarship. Jan was a Past District 7870 Governor and Past President of the Henniker Rotary Club. Prior to her death in 2014, she requested that any donations in her memory be dedicated to establishing a scholarship fund for non-traditional students.

The 2019 scholarship recipient is Chelsea Ogden, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Brattleboro. Chelsea Ogden has a goal of becoming a registered nurse. She



completed the LPN Program in 2013 at Vermont Tech in Brattleboro. Only 19 years old at the



time, she decided to take a break from education so that she could gain some experience as a nurse before she continued with her education.

Chelsea admits that there have many times that she has regretted her decision, because getting back into school has been difficult when the rest of her life seemed to engulf her time and energy. It has taken five years of working hard and climbing the ladder as a young nurse. But, she feels she is ready to take the next step and complete her Associate's Degree in Nursing.

When Janice H. McElroy dreamed of a scholarship fund in her name, Chelsea was exactly the candidate that Jan had in mind. She wanted to help students who had completed high school or earned a G.E.D. and, for whatever reason, had been away from education for at least 3 years. She wanted to give students the opportunity to return to school and fulfill their educational dreams.

For the past five years, Chelsea has been working in geriatric and palliative care, and she shares that she really loves it! She is quoted as saying, "There is no greater feeling that kneeling next to my 90 year old resident, holding their hands and intently listening to the stories of the life they have lived, the things that have seen, and the people they have loved."

Chelsea works as a Resident Assessment Coordinator at Thompson House Rehabilitation and Nursing Center in Brattleboro. She runs weekly care meetings with residents, their families, and their interdisciplinary teams.

Chelsea shares that her personal qualities that make her a great nurse are her attention to detail, her compassion, and her 13th generation Vermont work ethic. She shared with us that this scholarship could be the difference between going back to school at Vermont Technical College or putting it off for another year.

We have no doubt that Janice H. McElroy would say, "You go, girl! The time is now." It is with great pleasure that we present to Chelsea Ogden the 2019 Janice H. McElroy Scholarship, and we wish her continued success in her chosen career path of nursing.

Brattleboro Rotary Club Awards 18K in Scholarships

The Brattleboro Rotary Club recently awarded a total of \$18,000 in scholarships to six local high school students who will attend college this fall. The Gateway Foundation, an affiliate of the Brattleboro Rotary Club, funds the scholarships.

This year's recipients include Julia Barton of South Newfane, VT, who will attend the University of New Haven; Alexis Johnson of Hinsdale, NH, who will attend Keene State University; Alexis LeClair of Hinsdale, NH, who will attend River Valley Community College; Malick Mane of Brattleboro, who will attend the University of Vermont; Lucas Newton of Townshend, VT, who will attend the University of Vermont; and Jack Price of Brattleboro, who will attend the University of Vermont. Each student received \$3,000.

"We are happy to be able to offer these scholarships each year, and hope the assistance will help lead each student a step closer to his or her goals," said Scholarship Committee Chair John C. Mabie. The Brattleboro Rotary Club established The Gateway Foundation in 1986 to create a fund to support scholarships awarded annually to local students pursuing college. The Foundation, which is a nonprofit and tax-exempt organization, has awarded close to \$500,000 in scholarships to area students. It is funded by the Brattleboro Rotary Club and individual contributions Applications are accepted each spring from graduating seniors at Brattleboro Union, Hinsdale, and Leland & Gray High Schools. Criteria for the awards are academic achievement, financial need, and community service, all of which are weighed evenly.

Earlier in the year, Community College of Vermont student Sandra Sherman received the \$2,500 Jesse M. Corum IV Scholarship from the Brattleboro Rotary Club Gateway Foundation. Sherman is the fifth recipient of the scholarship created to help students complete their medical assisting degree.

Laconia Rotary Announces Winner of Harley Davidson Raffle

John Goewey of Schenectady, New York is the winner of the 27th annual Motorcycle Raffle, the major fundraiser put on by the Rotary Club of Laconia. This year, the prize was a 2019 Harley Davidson FLHX Street Glide. The bike has the color of 'Wicked Red', has ABS braking, security, cruise control, GTS Boom Audio with GPS, and has a manufacturer's suggested retail price of \$24,482. Goewey bought winning ticket #0295 in the opening hours of sales on Bike Week from the Rotary's raffle booth on Lakeside Avenue in the Weirs while attending with his son to celebrate his son's birthday. The winning ticket was drawn by a member of the Laconia Police Department at the close of Bike Week.

When he received the call, Goewey was attending a gathering of around eighty relatives. They were celebrating the uniting of previously unknown family members who were discovered through an ancestry program. "Hey everyone, I won a Harley!" he yelled to the crowd and was promptly answered by cheers. "It's been a weekend full of surprises, all of them blessings," he said later during the call.

Although he's been riding for over 35 years, this was only Goewey's second visit to Laconia's Bike Week. His first visit was in 2014 in order to put some miles on his first Harley Davidson, purchased after decades of riding on import models.

Goewey is an active member of his church and frequently supports charitable causes like Rotary, though when he bought the ticket, he was largely unaware of the work that Rotary does. After hearing that he had won the bike, he did some research about the club and learned more about their charity work and volunteerism.

"I'm very thankful to the Lord for this gift, and really appreciate the charity work that Rotary supports," Goewey said as he was picking up his new bike at Heritage Harley Davidson in Concord, who sponsors the raffle and assists the club with getting the bike ready for the winner. "I'm especially happy to learn about their international work helping people in need in third world countries, because as a member of my local church, we recently built an orphanage in Haiti."

In addition to supporting sustainable International projects, Laconia Rotary uses the funds raised through the Motorcycle Raffle and other fundraisers to provide approximately \$25,000 to support scholarships for Laconia students and grants to several Laconia charities. They also give back through volunteerism.

White River Junction Donates 60 Backpacks of School Supplies for Kids in Foster Care

WHITE RIVER JUNCTION -- Last month White River Junction Rotary Club members, led by P.J. Skehan, embarked on a drive to purchase or get donated backpacks and school supplies for children in foster care. This is the fourth year that White River Rotary has participated in the backpack drive, which also included area churches and other community organizations. Rotarians donated a total of 60 backpacks plus school supplies to the effort. The backpacks were delivered to Deanna Rounds, Family Services Resource Coordinator for the Vermont Department of Children and Family Services (DCF), at a recent Rotary Club meeting.

Rounds offered an update about the number of children in DCF custody this year, a differentiated from last year. "Last year we had 120 kids and now it's down to sixty. A lot of children have been adopted and we've had a lot of kids go home," she said. The ratio of children that go home to those that get adopted is 60:40, she said.

A backpack filled with school supplies makes a difference to a child, Rounds said. "We have so many kids that have never had backpacks. Their faces light up and they say, "This is so cool," she stated.



Rounds also disclosed that she is planning to retire next year, after forty years of working with DCF in New Hampshire and Vermont. "I retired once, from my job in New Hampshire. That lasted about a week," she said.

Rotary President Jeremy Greeley symbolically handed Rounds a carton with two backpacks in it, and at the conclusion of the meeting, co-president-elect P.J. Skehan helped Rounds to load the remainder of the backpacks into her car.

ShelterBox Delivering Aid in Flood Ravaged Paraguay

ShelterBox is helping 3,000 families displaced by flooding with the tools and training they need to

rebuild their lives. Our partners; Rotary Club of Asuncion (D4845), Habitat for Humanity, Red Cross and local government officials helped to assess the need for shelter and begin the response process.

Families are being provided trained on the use of ShelterKits, mosquito nets, solar lights, thermal blankets and cotton blankets to assist through the cold season in their emergency shelters while they wait for the river to recede so they can return home. Each ShelterKits contains: Tarpaulin (2), Hoe (1), Shovel (1), Hammer (1), Nails (1 Bag), Rope (1), Tie Wire (1), Bag (1). The total cost to support 3,000 displaced families (12,000 children, women, and men) is \$760,100. Help fund this response:

Syrian Displacements Increase with New Violence in Idlib

Since 2011, 13.1 million people have been forced to flee their homes as a result of the Syrian civil war. ShelterBox has been responding to the Syrian crisis for seven years, providing over 50,000 families with life-saving shelter and the essential aid they need to survive the continuous displacement.

Until recently, Idlib governorate had been the last haven for the 3 million civilians living there. But, since April, ceasefire agreements have been broken. It is estimated that upward of 700,000



children, women, and men will be forced to flee their shelters in Idlib governorate and flee to the Turkish border to the northwest in the coming months.

ShelterBox's goal is to implement two responses in the area in the coming months.

Conflict and Natural Disaster Displacing Families in Somaliland

Somaliland is the fourth poorest region in our world, with a per capita GDP of \$347. Located in semi-desert on the Horn of Africa, the children, women, and men who call Somaliland home are primarily pastoralists and subsistence farmers. In 2017, ongoing drought killed 85% of all livestock in the region. The continuing drought has forced communities to move increasingly large distances to seek fresh food for their animals.



Consequently, these communities are now displaced and destitute.

With an estimated 2.7 million people internally displaced across the region, there is an enormous need for humanitarian assistance. Government and humanitarian agencies are struggling to respond. ShelterBox is responding to this crisis.

Pure Water for the World

Pure Water for the World Celebrates 20 Years of Improving Lives with Safe Water

Pure Water for the World, Inc. (PWW) hosted an event to celebrate 20 years of bringing life-changing safe water and sanitation programs to children and families across Haiti and Central America.

PWW began as a project of the Brattleboro Rotary Club. Founders included Peter Abel, Dart Everett, Jesse Corum, Phil Huber and Tristam Johnston. Ken Grabeau, past Director of Rotary International, was PWW's initial financial benefactor.

Peter and Ken joined PWW board of directors, staff, volunteers, donors, supporters, and partners for the celebration. Senator Patrick Leahy and his wife, Marcelle, long-time friends of PWW, also attended.

Bob Mohr, PWW Board President, thanked supporters who helped PWW reach this milestone. "Without you, there is no 20 years of changing lives. This is a celebration of you and Pure Water for the World."

He talked about the evolution of the organization over the past 20 years, from simply providing access to clean water, to empowering communities with comprehensive WASH (water, sanitation and hygiene) solutions.

"But the mission remains the same," Bob explained, "improving the health and livelihood of children and families living in underserved communities."

This was also an evening to honor PWW's Executive Director, Carolyn Crowley Meub, who retired after 17 years. Bob presented Carolyn with a proclamation for PWW and a certificate of congratulations from Governor Philip Scott.

Senator Leahy called PWW "one of the great success stories in the world" and offered words of gratitude to all who have supported PWW. "You'll never know the people you save. They'll never know who you are," he said. "All they know is their lives are better, and their lives have been saved because of what you've done."
