## **Greetings From Your District Governor**



The work of Rotary begins in the community. Economic and community development is just one area of focus that Rotary has asked all clubs to focus on. Here are some ideas:

1. 190 million people are funding their business endeavors through micro finance. Partner with a local micro lender to improve access to financial services and provide financial infrastructure in the community.

2. Develop mobile banking resources in partnership with a micro lender. Cell phones which can be used to make deposits and transfer funds, can

increase access to banking systems in developing communities.

3. When supporting service projects in a developing community, purchase goods and supplies locally to stimulate the economy and avoid unnecessary shipping fees. 1.4 million people nearly half of which are employed live on less than \$1.25 per day.



4. Expand vocational training opportunities, including job placement programming at local nonprofit organizations. Send a vocational training team to teach business leaders in developing communities how to create a business plan and maintain accurate financial accounting.

5. Partner with a cooperative that provides training, joint economic ventures and ownership of assets to its members through a democratic structure. Provide equipment or supplies to a cooperative to increase production and sales in the local market.

6. Support entrepreneurs and small businesses in developing communities. The success of local business leaders can multiply employment opportunities in the community.

Rotary brings together a global network of volunteer leaders who dedicate their time and talent to tackle the world's most pressing humanitarian challenges. What is your club doing to tackle these challenges?

# There is Help in the District if Planning a Project

No matter what your project is, no matter what size or focus, you can get help from experts. Project planning & design are not inherently simple as there are many variables that can affect the outcome. There is a team of Rotarians who have had years of experience developing, designing, implementing and evaluating projects and they are available to help.

Projects need some sort of initial assessment that confirms the need and allows those who will benefit the chance to identify what will be most helpful, most useful. Observing that there are hungry kids does not necessarily require the gift of food. Instead, it may be more useful with greater impacts if the kids are involved in gleaning, harvesting fruits or vegetables from cooperating farms. Noting the lack of a playground may gain rich guidance if kids or users are involved in the design and construction.

You may also assume that your project will create substantial impacts and long-term benefits but without involvement of those who will benefit, the project may simply fall apart, lack maintenance, lack supervision, lack ownership. A small rural hospital may need equipment, but without local expertise to maintain or guide use, the equipment might quite easily be left in storage.

Project elements require support to keep them running. If you project plans to provide clean potable water by the installation of a pump, it may be vital to determine whether repair parts are available and how easily accessible. Someone in the area needs to be able to conduct routine maintenance and, ideally, repairs when required. Also, if the pump requires a power source, electricity or fuel, an assessment should determine whether the power source is reliably available. Both may require a payment, and the project design needs to determine how that payment can be sustained.

Right, so who are these experts? They are members of the Cadre of Technical Advisors, some of whom live in our District, but most are spread around the world. If you have a domestic project, there is someone to help. You can also have access to an Advisor if your project is international. Get in touch with me, tristamjr@gmail.com, and I will connect you with an expert. ## Jaffrey-Rindge Rotary Launches Project Nicauragua

Inspired by the potential for a Rotary Foundation grant, the Jaffrey-Rindge Rotary Club has been planning a project for many months aimed at making structural improvements to the 13 schools in the rural Nicaraguan community of Chacraseca. These repairs include roofs, windows, doors,

floors and ensuring adequate number or latrines as well as building hand hygiene stations.

With an estimated cost for all repairs between \$60-70,000, the club is encouraged by such local support as the Jaffrey-Rindge Lions Club's significant contribution pictured. The Keene, Peterborough and Milford Clubs have also committed funds to this Chacraseca Schools project. International Committee member John McCarthy is





shown with Lions' members Dianne Phillips and Rich Comeau , who have supplemented the club, district and foundation to help meet a sixty thousand dollar goal. The upcoming J-R Raffle on November 1 will also show the communities' support for this project.

In partnership with FNE International whose co-founder and current board chair is Jaffrey club member Travis Kumph, the foundational support has been laid to support logistics and on the ground efforts. With the grant application essentially complete, we are hopeful for early approval by the Rotary Foundation. There will be opportunities for area folks to travel to Nicaragua and support the effort, with a possible trip via the Jaffrey Chamber of Commerce starting March 14, 2020 open to any and all!

The club is committed to the goal of developing and strengthening the relationship between our communities which will pave the way for future collaboration and projects together.

# When Dr. Adrian Levesque, Jr., Dreams, He Dreams Big

After visiting Guatemala on a vacation, he saw a need, and has taken steps to make life better for the woman and children of that country

Dr. Levesque is a member of the Rotary Club of Nashua. He followed his father's footsteps when he joined the family's dental practice and made weekly Rotary Club meetings a priority.

While planning a Southern Caribbean cruise vacation with his wife in 2015, Dr. Levesque booked an excursion to a Mayan village. He researched the destination and found that they would be visiting a vocational school and Rotary had an involvement. Dr. Levesque and his wife Jane made the trek by boat from the cruise port to the base of the location in an hour and a half. They made their way to the top of a steep hill where there were individual thatched round classrooms. He noted many healthy looking children and Rotary water filters were abundant.

The Levesques were greeted by smiling students and teachers. Although language was a barrier, he told them he was a Rotarian. He was quickly embraced by the teachers who hugged him and kept repeating, "Gracias Rotario." The teachers were very aware of the generosity of Rotary who



supported their school for more than two decades. The school is part of Ak 'Tenamit, which means "New Village" in the Q'eqchi' language. It is a Rotary development project in Eastern Guatemala on the Dulce River. The project includes a teaching restaurant, classrooms, healthcare clinic, etc. The students range in age between 14 and 18. They graduate with a skill in many fields that can pull them out of the chain of poverty.

This trip changed Dr. Levesque's life. He learned about the lack of quality health care in Guatemala. Guatemala is one of the most dangerous countries in Central America to give birth, particularly among the indigenous populations who make up the majority of the country. He specifically learned about the high death rate of women who lack access to healthcare and who experience complications during childbirth at home. Sixty-five percent of Mayan women give birth in homes on dirt floors. Two women die needlessly every day giving birth, with hemorrhage being the most common cause of death. He knew he could help. And he knew he could start with the International Committee of the Rotary Club of Nashua.

The midwives in question are students and graduates from three midwife schools that are part of universities in Guatemala. Upon graduation, these students go back to their respective villages to practice. Their biggest needs are basic medical supplies, stethestoscopes, blood pressure cuffs, hemoglobin meters, urinalysis testing kits, suture kits, baby dopplers, etc. These women live on \$2 USD per day, and cannot afford a \$100 stethestoscope. Dr. Levesque and his committee saw the key to helping these women would be to hold two 5-day roundtable weekends a year, provide the students with travel vouchers, hotel and food, training and birthing supplies and diagnostic tools to take home to their villages.

The Rotary Clubs of Nashua and Hollis, individual Rotarians, and Rotary District 7870 provided funds that were matched by The Rotary Foundation that provided a Global Grant to fund the project.

First they created an NGO (a nonprofit organization that operates independently of any government). It was set this up as a co-op to support the midwives both student and graduates. (Asociacion Para La Promocion de la Parteria en Guatemala). (ASOPAR) It now has 75 midwife members and an 8 member board of directors.

Rotario Ciudad de Guatemala, the oldest Rotary Club in Guatemala, has assisted us as the host club. Additionally, Jeffrey Sullender, Ph.D., CCN, has worked closely with the midwives for many years in Guatemala teaching nutrition and helping them deliver services to the Mayan women. The friends he made in Guatemala have become the cadre of Guatemalans who organize and help them with the roundtable week-ends.

Four years ago, Dr. Sullender, addressed the Rotary Club of Nashua, regarding the plight of pregnant women in Guatemala. Dr. Sullender has worked closely with Dr. Levesque, and Nashua,



NH, Rotarians Lyn Marino, Dr. Ernie Marino, and Rick Manganello. He spoke of the overarching goal of alleviating a high incidence of maternal and infant deaths among the indigenous Maya. He said that Guatemala is a challenging country to work in. There is a lot of discrimination against the indigenous population and there is the language barrier, as there are many languages that are specific to villages. For example, of the 26 midwives who attended the first roundtable week-end, there were 6 different Mayan languages spoken among them and they did not understand each other, except for Spanish that is a requirement of the midwife schools.

The indigenous people have a hard time trying to get any health care. The most common reason for death in women during child birth is hemorrhage. He said the midwife is a trusted and respected part of the community. Dr. Sullender said that being a midwife is a calling, not something you normally train for as a profession. The government regulates what a midwife can charge for examining a woman, following her for 8+ months, delivering and caring for the baby at Q500, or \$68 US dollars. Most of the time they get a chicken for compensation.

Very often in clinics a Mayan women who speaks no Spanish may be turned away or be left to die without treatment. Some of the students face retaliation by their families because, as a woman, they pursued an education. Dr. Levesque explains that it is against the culture of some villages for girls to get an education. It is the hope with the NGO that was created, that more midwives can be trained and it will help expand the political, economic, social impact of their work.

"I have a purpose, that is to save women and children's' lives in Guatemala" said Dr.Levesque. My ultimate goal would be to build a maternity clinic in Chichicastenango dedicated to the Maya. He calls this his "pie in the sky" goal. "The midwife graduates need a place to practice their profession, an environment where Mayan traditions and modern medicine can be available to the indigenous population. This would be a maternity clinic manned by a physician who is sensitive to the Mayan culture and the midwives would serve as interns," he said.

Many of the midwives have reported that lives were saved because of the training they received in diagnosing early problems. Other midwives have held training sessions for midwives in their villages teaching in turn what they learned at the roundtable events, and most have accompanied and advocated for a pregnant woman at hospitals and clinics.

#### **Organization Profile & Vision**

#### Introduction:

Pure Water for the World, Inc. (PWW) is a Vermont-based nonprofit organization that currently operates in the Caribbean and Central America delivering sustainable water, sanitation and hygiene solutions to children and families living in underserved communities. This year, we celebrate our 20th anniversary of making a difference in the world.

PWW has grown from a small Rotary Club project, serving people in El Salvador, to an engaged player in the global Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) community. Today, PWW has a budget in excess of \$1,000,000 annually, and 40 employees located in the U.S., Honduras, and Haiti.

PWW's programs are driven by our vision and mission. We envision a world in which all people have safe water, proper sanitation, and the knowledge to sustain it for future generations. Our mission is to improve lives by empowering people with access to life's most basic necessities - safe water and sanitation. We accomplish our mission by partnering with people in underserved communities and providing these communities with the tools and education to establish and sustain safe water, hygiene, and sanitation programs, effectively changing behaviors.

In Fiscal Year 2018, PWW reached more than 14,000 people with safe water, sanitation and hygiene programs. Since its inception, PWW has reached more than 750,000 people in Haiti and Central America.

The following highlights key activities that PWW has undertaken:

• PWW has supplied schools, households, and entire communities with clean water systems and latrines; and has empowered families, teachers, medical personnel and others with critical education regarding healthy hygiene practices.

• PWW has been an implementation partner of leading international NGOs, such as Save the Children and UNICEF.

- PWW has developed a successful program for WASH training and consulting services.
- PWW has received construction grants for community water systems.

• PWW team members have made presentations at global WASH conferences and have led and published technical studies.



• PWW Country Directors are actively engaged with local, regional and national government and international actors to support the development and implementation of country-specific WASH initiatives.

PWW is focused on growing and expanding our current work in the countries where we now operate as well as reaching additional Central American and Caribbean countries. We have already begun some expansion by virtue of our WASH training and consulting programs in countries where we are not implementers. We see much potential to continue this growth and reach of our WASH program through our training portfolio.

The PWW Board of Directors is looking for an Executive Director who will help lead the organization in expanding its impact and effectiveness. The organization is well poised for expansion, having established a successful model for helping communities create sustainable WASH projects.

#### Organizational Structure

The Executive Director of Pure Water for the World oversees an operation with a total staff of approximately 40 people who live and work in the United States (primarily in Rutland, Vermont), Haiti and Honduras. Most of the staff is currently located in either Haiti or Honduras. The international staff delivers programs, in varying locations, across each country. The Haiti and Honduras teams are each managed by a locally based Country Director. The Country Directors report to the Executive Director.

The US-based staff, reporting to the Executive Director, is comprised of a Deputy Director, an Office Manager, and an Office Assistant. PWW also employs contract staff for grant writing, marketing communications, and other specialized services.

PWW has a strong, supportive Board of Directors that is well connected, diverse and experienced in the relevant WASH technologies and needs in the targeted geographies. The Board has the ultimate responsibility for the organization. The Executive Director reports to the Board and is the face and voice of the organization. The Board oversees PWW and approves the annual budget, major administrative policies and fundraising initiatives, financial decisions and strategic directions - working in collaboration with the Executive Director. The Board looks to the Executive Director for leadership, guidance, fundraising, and the overall operational responsibility for PWW.
