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Greetings From Your District Governor Steve Puderbaugh

I want to congratulate our clubs across the district on their resilience and innovation as they respond to our current Covid-19 situation. Most of our clubs are meeting regularly via Zoom or other platforms and in the case of some small clubs, are meeting live. While some clubs are "hunkered down", we have others that are doing great community service projects and even some successful fundraisers.

Some (including me) are getting a little tired of the amount of time we are spending in front of a computer screen doing Zoom meetings and webinars. This is especially true when we are doing it for our profession too. That being said, there is no doubt that the rapid rush

to embrace technology to stay connected is going to be here to stay in some form going forward.

During my meetings with clubs and their boards, I am encouraging clubs to develop a hybrid model for club meetings as we move forward. This means having both a live portion when we can "safely" have in person fellowship and at the same time have a virtual component online. With that



in mind, we are developing a Technology Advisory Team. We want to have a resource where clubs who are trying to figure out technology options for their clubs and club meetings, can go for advice. Some will need basic advice on doing a Zoom meeting while others will want to develop a YouTube channel and post videos of their meetings and speakers.

In other news I want to report that the District-Wide Covid-19 Global Grants have been approved and all the donor funds and associated paperwork has been submitted as of August 11th. We are expecting the funds which total over \$340,000 will be coming back to our district around the end of August. This has been a huge effort that we will be celebrating soon.

As we were putting the disaster response grant and these Covid Global Grants together, one of our incoming club presidents said "I am proud to be part of this Rotary district!". Those are certainly my sentiments too.

Jennifer E. Jones Makes History, Becomes First Woman Named Rotary President-Nominee

Jennifer E. Jones, of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland, Ontario, Canada, is the selection of the Nominating Committee for President of Rotary International for 2022-23.

Jennifer E. Jones, a member of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland, Ontario, Canada, has been nominated to become Rotary International's president for 2022-23, a groundbreaking selection that will make her the first woman to hold that office in the organization's 115-year history.

Jones will officially become president-nominee on 1 October if no other candidates challenge her. Jones says she sees Rotary's Action Plan as a catalyst for increasing Rotary's impact.

"As we reflect upon our new strategic priorities, we could have never envisioned that our ability to adapt would become our North Star during what is inarguably the most profound time in recent history," Jones said in her vision statement. "Silver linings rise out of the most challenging circumstances. Using metric-driven goals, I will harness this historic landscape to innovate, educate, and communicate opportunities that reflect today's reality."

As the first woman to be nominated to be president, Jones understands how important it is to follow through on Rotary's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Statement. "I believe that



diversity, equity, and inclusion ... begins at the top and for us to realize growth in female membership and members under the age of forty — these demographics need to see their own reflection in leadership," Jones said. "I will champion double-digit growth in both categories while never losing sight of our entire family."

Jones is founder and president of Media Street Productions Inc., an award-winning media company in Windsor. She was chair of the board of governors of the University of Windsor and chair of the Windsor-Essex Regional Chamber of Commerce. She has been recognized for her service with the YMCA Peace Medallion, the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal, and Wayne State University's Peacemaker of the Year Award, a first for a Canadian. Jones holds a Doctor of Laws (LL.D.).

A current Rotary Foundation trustee, Jones has been a Rotary member since 1997 and has served Rotary as RI vice president, director, training leader, committee chair, moderator, and district governor. She played a lead role in Rotary's rebranding effort by serving as chair of the Strengthening Rotary's Advisory Group. She is the co-chair of the End Polio Now Countdown to History Campaign Committee, which aims to raise \$150 million for polio eradication efforts.

Jones recently led the successful #RotaryResponds telethon, which raised critical funds for COVID-19 relief and was viewed by more than 65,000. Jones has also received Rotary International's Service Above Self Award and The Rotary Foundation Citation for Meritorious Service. She and her husband, Nick Krayacich, are members of The Rotary Foundation's Arch Klumph Society, Paul Harris Society, and the Bequest Society.

How does my club earn a Rotary Presidential Citation for 2020-2021

Every year the incoming Rotary International President sets his/her theme and goals for their year. The RI President also defines the requirements for Rotary, Rotaract and Interact clubs to receive a Presidential Citation.

This year the citation process is quite different but more straight forward. President Holgar Knaack has set 25 goals for clubs and will award a citation to clubs that complete any 13 goals. These goals are set out on the my rotary org website:

A club officer (president, treasurer, or secretary) can set goals on Rotary Club Central (my.rotary.org) and update your club's progress. RI will review your goals and your self-reported progress towards those goals to determine if you should be awarded a citation. A review of this year's 25 goals shows that many clubs in the district could obtain a citation.

So why do a Rotary Citation? It is a benchmark to determine how your club is performing with respect to the goals of Rotary International. It might highlight an opportunity to strengthen your club, for example completing a club strategic plan. It can also be used to align your Interact or Rotaract club with your club goals. Are you doing Service Projects? Are your members involved with Rotary Action Groups or Rotary Fellowships? Does your club give to the Rotary Foundation: Annual Fund and/or PolioPlus? Does your club have an online presence? These goals are straight forward and some of them can be fun and enrich your club's membership.

Past Rotary International President Ian Riseley (2016-17) said "As an organization, Rotary has always had a difficult time conveying the scope of our work: not just what we do, but how we do it, and the value of what we contribute to the world." The setting and tracking of goals on Rotary Club Central allows RI to be able to accurately measure and communicate the scope of the humanitarian work we, as a global organization, are already doing.

To quote Assistant Governor Gary Dehnel "Let's make DG Steve Puderbaugh proud of his DG year by having a whole lot of our clubs achieving the RI Presidential Citation this year." District 7870 Receives 28,000 Masks; More to Come

Rotary Districts across New England received thousands of surgical masks in the last couple of months, promptly distributing them to small hospitals, first responders, homeless shelters, schools, Boys' and Girls' Clubs, homes for the elderly, senior centers, and police and fire departments.

Last month, District Governor Steve Puderbaugh announced that Jack Solomon, a past Rotary District Governor from East Hampton, Connecticut, was arranging for the free distribution of flat, surgical masks to Rotary Districts in the six New England states, thanks to a generous donor in his district.

The next effort is going to be much bigger. There will be as many as 1 million masks coming in. Robert Friend, The Public Image Chair of Rotary District 7980 says that "discussions with The Rotarian Magazine are underway and my hope is that they will engage. Meanwhile, we are looking to emblazon the tractor-trailer journey, dubbed the Rotary "Million Mask Tour" with the Rotary logo and our Campaign. In the next several weeks, as the schedule comes together, we will roll this out and look for your help in generating awareness in your District and surrounding areas."

PDG Nancy Russell, of the White River Junction Rotary Club, coordinated the distribution of masks in our district and put out the word that Rotary Clubs needing masks to distribute should contact her with their requests. Fifteen Rotary Clubs in Vermont and New Hampshire responded.

District 7870 received 28,000 masks that we distributed in July, Russell said, "and we have requests for an additional 100,000. The next shipment is due in September." The average distribution of masks per club was 2,000, she said.



To date, the following Rotary Clubs in the District have participated: Keene, Brattleboro, Brattleboro Sunrise, White River Junction, Poultney, Meredith (NH), Guilford (NH), New London, Queen City, Bedford, Derry Village, Milford, Barre and Wallingford.

Additionally, 120,000 masks were sent to Soloman's district; 24,000 to District 7910; 6,000 to District 7950, and 6,000 to District 7890.

White River Rotary distributed 3,000 masks to LISTEN, a local non-profit, and to the Hartford Area Career and Technology Center (HACTC), Russell said.

The Derry Village Rotary distributed 1500 face masks to area organizations that expressed a need.

Helpful Hints for Meetings during COVID

- 1. Continue with "HAPPY DOLLARS" comments every so often, so everyone at your meeting gets their "minute of fame" and is able to participate. Go down your list of participants to give everyone a chance to speak.
- 2. Contact members who never show up to Zoom, by PHONE for a friendly chat. Some members may not be comfortable with technology but will appreciate a phone call to know they have been missed.
- 3. Think about having Board meetings in person. Small groups can socially distance.
- 4. EMAILS: discourage long, lengthy emails to members from yourself or from other members in the club. People are getting tired of having to be on the computer all the time and tend to disregard or ignore lengthy communications. Group Texts are an option.
- 5. Record your meetings and send the link. Members who do not attend, may want to listen to the meeting at their leisure rather than read through the minutes.



- **6.** Encourage members to invite GUESTS! It is much easier for guests to attend zoom meetings and have an opportunity to see what Rotary is all about. Recorded meetings can also be sent to guests.
- 7. Consider HYBRID meetings: Those who are comfortable meeting in person can meet, while you activate Zoom for other members at the same time.
- 8. Consider socially distanced socials...BYOB/BYOF in large areas such as parks, etc.




Milford Rotary Club Annual Passing of the Gavel 2020/2021

White River Rotary will be Watching as Sixteen-Year-Old Open Water Swimmer to Attempt the English Channel

DOVER, ENGLAND – When 16-year-old Vera Rivard attempts to swim the English Channel later this month, her coaches at the Upper Valley Aquatic Center (UVAC) and the members of the White River Rotary Club will be among those cheering her on – long distance.

The UVAC, based in White River Junction, first approached the White River Rotary Club last spring as Vera and her family were working to raise the funds needed to qualify her for the attempt – and then to travel to the United Kingdom to perform the challenging task. White River Rotary agreed to help sponsor the teen, who lives in Springfield, NH, and spends summers on Lake Memphremagog, in the Northeast Kingdom town of Derby, Vermont. Other sponsors include Allen Pools and Spas and TYR Swimwear.

Then came Covid-19, and the question: would this have to wait? Luckily, the answer was no. UVAC Executive Director Joe Major, a Rotarian, kept the club apprised of her progress and Vera addressed the club by telephone just before she and her family left for the UK in early August. She talked about her upcoming English Channel swim challenge and her recent swimming around Manhattan Island in the 20 Bridges Around Manhattan Island in July.

Vera, whose specialty is open water swimming, has been a member of the UVAC swim team since she was five years old. She has dreamed of swimming the English Channel her whole life. She'll get that opportunity the last week of August; her "swim window" is Monday, August 24 through Saturday, August 29. Captain Peter Reed, skipper of the boat Rowena, based in



Folkestone, will decide when – or if – her swim will happen. Vera will get only a few hours' notice and weather can sometimes interfere with a swimmer's success.

Vera, her sister Margaret, 13, and her mother Darcie arrived in Dover, England, on August 8 and will be quarantined for the next two weeks. Her father, Kevin, was unable to make the trip because of all the time commitments due to the quarantine restrictions, her mother said.

Vera is happiest in the water and excited to try this newest challenge of the English Channel to test her limits, her family says. In preparation for the English Channel attempt, she traveled to attend Cork Distance Week in Ireland.

"I am constantly being asked why I do this? Why are you trying this when you are so young? Why swim so far, or why swim in such cold water? I only have one answer. Because I love it! I feel it is what I am meant to do. I feel completely 'me' when I am in the open water," says Vera.

Although unable to come outside, Davis was visibly touched, and so were the Rotarians, seen in this picture (with Peter in the middle). Regardless of their background or any difficulty they have faced in their young lives, every child in the community is empowered to believe that positive change is possible. HEAL:Raising Our World One Child at a Time is a non-profit organization which recognizes that poverty and disease have forced innocent children to live in unbearable conditions. It seeks to design and implement progressive models for orphanages that encompass HEAL:



Health, Education, Ample nutrition and Love.
Jen's presentation described the projects on the
12-acre Community Center in the central highlands of
Kenya. In each of the images of the Rapha Children's
Home, Secondary School and Sustainability Project,
the smiling faces of the children touched our hearts.

The project that resonated with our club was the Cow Project, in which the school is working to establish a dairy to milk for the children and offer the surplus for sale at the local market, making the center more self-sustaining. This certainly passed the Four Way Test.

We began collecting funds from club members with the hope of raising enough money to purchase a cow for the project. The following week we had a contribution jar decorated with cow spots labelled "Cash Cow" on the reception table. When our meetings went virtual, so did the playful "Cash Cow." The project, originally intended to be a one-month drive, stretched out until early May. In the end we collected \$830, which was supplemented by our club with \$670 so that HEAL was able to purchase TWO cows.


