

Greetings From Your District Governor Steve Puderbaugh



It is hard to believe our Rotary year is over half over. While it is nothing like I envisioned when I agreed to be your District Governor, it has still been amazing to see all we are accomplishing across the district. I hope you and your club are staying healthy and engaged. It looks like we can see an endpoint to this pandemic so we can get back to hugs and live fellowship in our local meetings.

I want to share several thoughts:

District Conference

First I want everyone to Save the Dates of November 12-14. This is the new date of our District Conference at Church Landing in Meredith. We felt the original May date was not feasible to have a live event due to the slow rollout of the Covid vaccines. We have a lot planned for this conference and a great location. Stay tuned for more details around July 1st when registration opens.



Masks

Between all the masks coming in as part of the Million Mask Challenge, we have distributed around 350,000 masks throughout our district. Between our District-wide Covid grant and these masks, our Rotary clubs have made a lot of new community connections.





Membership

This hopefully allows some of our clubs to go back to live or hybrid meetings which certainly helps with recruitment.






Rotary Virtual International Assembly Experience

Rotary Distributes Masks for the Second Time

As part of the Rotary Million Mask Challenge "Take 2" tour, well over 400,000 surgical, children's, and N95 masks were distributed to area first responders, health care organizations, schools and needy community organizations by Rotary clubs in New Hampshire and Vermont at the end of January.

According to Rotary District 7870 Governor Steve Puderbaugh, the Rotary Million Mask Challenge was the brainchild of Connecticut Rotary member Ted Rossi and his Rossi Family Foundation. In October



they secured a million mask shipment from China and worked with Rotary clubs to distribute them to first responders, health care organizations, and needy communities in the Northeast.

Puderbaugh said, "Rotarians in two districts, 7870 and 7850, throughout New Hampshire and Vermont organized and participated in the distribution of over 300,000 masks." "This second distribution allowed us to deliver another 400,000 surgical masks along with a large supply of children-designed surgical face-masks and an important supply of N95s for first responders," Puderbaugh added.

Jeff Philbrick, co-owner of Colonial Poplin Nursing Home in Fremont, NH, was greatly appreciative. They have been having trouble keeping enough masks stocked as they go through over 50 each day.

Puderbaugh concluded, "This is another story of how Rotary Districts and local clubs can respond to a crisis, rally resources to spread goodwill, and, most importantly, save lives."



Rotary District 7870 consists of 59 Rotary Clubs in southern Vermont and southern New Hampshire. Rotary District 7850 consists of 43 Rotary clubs in northern Vermont, New Hampshire, and southern Canada.



Love Your Neighbor Food Drive A Success

Like so many projects this past 12 months, the Goffstown Rotary Club's annual Love Your Neighbor Food Drive had a different look this year. Normally, club members meet up at a local Hannaford supermarket to pack bags with non-perishable food suitable for school kids to take home over weekends. The bags are sold for \$10 and delivered to an area food bank for distribution. Then, the members usually meet up on a Saturday morning (and ALWAYS the most bitterly cold day of the winter) outside the store to collect other goods and donations from shoppers. This year, however, COVID precautions kept us from packing the bags and the food collection. Fortunately, Hannaford stepped in, packed and sold the bags and allowed a cash donation station to be designated for the food drive. Over \$1000 in food and cash was collected and distributed to local food pantries thanks to our partners at Hannaford and the generosity of our community. Where there's a will, there's a way! The club is now looking at holding a traditional food drive this summer if our community's health allows it.

Ludlow Rotary Receives 2,000 Masks for Covid-19 Use

Recently, the Ludlow Rotary Club (LRC) received a donation of 2,000 masks for use during the Covid-19 crisis.

According to Ludlow Rotary Club President Kevin Barnes, 300 masks will be donated to Mt Holly groups while 800 will go to the town of Ludlow. Previously, Ludlow Rotary has been able to provide masks to Ludlow first responders, Fletcher Memorial Library, Mt Holly Rescue, Mt Holly Fire, Mt Holly Town office, and Mt Holly road crew.

Lake Rescue Milfoil Problem Discussed at Ludlow Rotary Meeting

The co-Presidents of the Lake Rescue Association (LRA), Barbara Silver and Bruce Zanca, recently spoke to a meeting of the Ludlow Rotary Club (LRC) to discuss the problems facing them due to Eurasian Milfoil and river sediment.

The LRA, formed in 1933 and incorporated in 1954, is, according to Silver, "facing a crisis right now". She was referring to the rapid build-up of milfoil, a non-native, invasive aquatic plant that can grow from 4 to 6 inches a day in full sunlight.

The milfoil invasion of Lake Rescue and Lake Pauline was "rediscovered" in the lake system in 2014 following tropical storm Irene. It has become an on-going problem that, if not addressed, could turn the "lakes into a swamp".

Over the years since Irene, the LRA, in conjunction with state agencies, has spent thousands of dollars to remove the milfoil from the lakes. It was estimated that the LRA would spend about \$48,000 next year on removing milfoil.

Zanca noted that they would probably never be able to totally eradicate milfoil from the lakes but would be able to reduce it to a controllable situation with constant maintenance care. To this end, the LRA is constructing a "Dash" boat that will be able to literally vacuum the milfoil from parts of the lake and its floor.

In addition to this problem, the LRA is also addressing the impact of sedimentation caused mainly by the Black River.

One area of concern is the channel between Lake Rescue and Round Pond. Over the years, the sediment build-up has resulted in the creation of "islands" of sediment and raised the floor of Round Pond so that the depth of the water has been severely reduced.



The LRA has about 150 members. There are approximately 250-300 individual lake properties involved.

Bethel Rotary 2020 Community Hero's Named...

Bethel Area Rotary honored our 2020 Community Hero's at our last meeting for making significant contributions to our community during this difficult year. We selected Gary Burt and Ellie Griffin for their tireless work maintaining and expanding the reach of the Bethel Food Shelf. Rotary's motto is "Service Above Self" and our members are inspired by the many people who volunteer for so many essential but unflashy tasks that make our community supportive and caring places to live. Bethel Area Rotary has focused on the needs of the area food shelves this year to address food insecurity with volunteers and contributions.

From that perspective, it was impossible to miss the quiet but significant contributions of our two 2020 Community Heroes.

Gary Burt assumed leadership of the food shelf the week before the Covid shutdown and continued despite adversity and uncertainty. We were fortunate he had training in emergency preparedness and engineering as he constantly provided innovations and updates that made this community resource safe for patrons and volunteers alike. His problem solving has allowed this service to expand and grow with a new roster of volunteers and procedures. How many people would have had the ingenuity and foresight to build a pulley system to bring supplies to patrons from the basement to the first floor of the White Church to avoid dangerous stairs. Calmly shopping, ordering, and manning the food shelf during 2020 are just the latest of Gary's contributions to the community he has been a tireless volunteer at Chandler Center for the Arts and as a Boy Scout Leader.

Ellie Griffin also worked throughout the shutdown to help her neighbors. She worked every shift at the food shelf from March to September when her duties at a local daycare were suspended. Ellie credits her community service ethos to her early days as a Peace Corps volunteer. She certainly has embodied their current motto "Work for The World- Resilience Required -Heart Is Essential' in her 30 years of volunteering for the Bethel community. Beyond the food shelf when there was a




community need, Ellie was at the forefront. After Hurricane Irene, she was part of Citizens Plus making sure people had the supplies and skills they might need in natural disasters. When a group of people started the Bethel Revitalization Initiative and Bethel University Ellie supported that as well with time energy and optimism. Many of her projects have supported the young people in our community through work with the Girl Scouts and then The Bethel Recreation Committee. Have you seen our Bethel Skate Park? Much of the energy behind that came from Ellie.

Holiday and Winter Projects - A Busy Time for Derry Village Rotary

We are passing along some news about what we have been doing this winter, some information better late than never! The holiday season is a busy time for Derry Village, this year was even more so:

2020 NUTFIELD HOLIDAY PARADE: Due to Covid issues, the annual Holiday parade sponsored by DVR and the Greater Derry Chamber did not happen. What we did was substitute a Virtual Food Drive to augment the food and money donations we would have normally collected. Both online and with a very visual setup in downtown Derry on Small Business Saturday, and with help from our Interact club, we ended up surpassing donations in both food and cash than we ever did during the Parade. This year we collected approximately 1000 pounds of food and over \$3000 which when matched by the club totaled \$6000 which was presented in equal shares to three Derry Food Banks to assist neighbors in need.









- 2020 SECRET SANTA SHOPPING: Another annual tradition, the club coordinates with three local charity organizations, the Derry Community Fund, the Upper Room, and the Greater Derry Salvation Army, to purchase items for individuals and families that could use a little help during the Holidays. Wish lists were drafted by the groups and Derry Village contributed \$5000 and the labor to track down and purchase everything on those wish lists.
- 2021 DONATION DRIVES Coats and Diapers: When the traditional sponsor was not able to support this year, DVR member Susan Ochoa and the Interact club stepped up to the plate and lead the effort to collect new and slightly used coats for needy kids in the Derry School District. Those same great people are taking a large part in the 8th annual Diaper Drive supporting the Upper Room of Greater Derry and their TIPS (Teen Information for Parenting Success) program, collecting all sizes of diapers and wipes for mothers and needy families in need of those expensive, but critical items.



MEDICAL MASK DISTRIBUTION: Derry Village has been very active with the district and RI Million Mask program. Since the program began last summer we have received and distributed over 22,000 masks to 14 local nonprofits, day care centers, dependent living facilities, Pinkerton Academy, The Derry School District and the Derry Fire Department to proactively improve the safety of the community.









Manchester Rotary Club Engages in Community

In its recent weeks the Manchester Rotary Club has continued to hear from local nonprofit leaders and city officials on a regular basis through virtual and "hybrid" meetings. These have proven to be effective in maintaining connections within the club and with our friends who are on the front lines of social service and education initiatives in Manchester. The Club has continued its involvement in the Million Mask Challenge Tour, donating 6,000 disposable masks to Camp Allen in Bedford, NH and 2,000 to Amoskeag Health in Manchester. In addition, it donated 500 cloth masks for children to Amoskeag Health which were hand-made by generous volunteers, and also donated \$800 to this organization's Welcome Baby Bag program. Additional cash donations included \$1,000 to the New Hampshire Union Leader Santa Fund to benefit the Salvation Army and \$500 to Holy Trinity Cathedral PNCC which has been hosting our weekly meetings. Club members' service activities included serving meals to the homeless at Families in Transition in downtown Manchester. Additional service projects are being considered for the coming months.

Currently, the biggest item on the Club's agenda is planning for Cruising Downtown 2021 which is tentatively scheduled for Saturday, September 4. This is one of the biggest car shows in New England, and it serves as the Club's major fundraiser. The annual event was cancelled in 2020 due to the pandemic, and the Club is seeing the 2021 event as an opportunity to explore innovative ideas on how we can work creatively with our partners to hold a safe and fun event that will best benefit the community.
