2020-21 District-Wide Membership Contest

Rotary is a great organization and a vital part of our lives. The relationships and experiences that are available through Rotary locally and around the world are amazing. The challenge we have is getting our members to reach out and invite other potential Rotary members to come join us.

Is your club up for a challenge?

Goals:

- Increase membership by inviting potential members to visit our clubs.
- Create a contest within your club to encourage participation. Offer prizes to provide incentives.
- Participate and compete for prizes in a district contest.

The Specifics:

- The Rotary Rocks Membership Contest will run from September 1st to April 1st.
- Your club will make the rules for your club's contest and decide what "rewards" can be earned locally.

Ideas:

2. Assign points for different accomplishments.

Rotary Action Opportunities for CoVID Vaccines

If you're like me, you have been wondering when and how to sign up for the CoVID vaccines. This remains a fluid situation in both NH and VT. In the meantime, there are some avenues of service available to both individuals and clubs in in our district:

- **Individuals in NH** can sign up to support DHHS vaccine efforts through www.NHResponds.org. This is for both medical and nonmedical professionals and registering will include a background check and then assignment to an area of need. Note that individuals may need to go back and specifically request contact with a “COVID TEAM” through their “Contact” section.
- **Individuals in VT** should join your local “Medical Reserve Corps”. You don't have to be medically trained, just willing to help. Find more at <http://oncallforvt.org/wordpress/>.
- **Clubs in NH** can request to help one of the 13 NH Regional Public Health Network centers who are responsible for the distribution of vaccine to the first 3 Tiers of risk groups (through 65 year old and above residents). This can be done by contacting the RPHN that serves their town. Hooksett falls into the Greater Manchester area RPHN and I've attached the overall state mapping.
- I have a dream that our NH Rotary clubs can help pharmacy chains when they become involved in distribution of vaccine to the general public (May timeframe it seems based on recent news reports on WMUR). Rotary Clubs could help with the logistics of managing

the flow of people getting vaccinated, advertising to the community, speaking to groups and the like.

UPDATE: Please note that the N.H. Governor just updated the list for Tier 1B candidates for vaccine with registration starting on 22 January. WMUR has details.

Vermont Groups Join Forces to Aid State Food Assistance Effort

VT Farmstead Cheese provides local cheddar to Vermont Foodbank with financial support from Vermont Rotary groups

January 13, 2021 | Montpelier, VT – In the ongoing effort to connect Vermont food and food products to those struggling during the pandemic, three Vermont entities have teamed up to help donate cheese to the Vermont Foodbank. As a result of a generous donation from Vermont Rotary Clubs across the state, Vermonters in need will be able to access cheddar cheese from the Vermont Farmstead Cheese Company. The Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food and Markets continues to facilitate efforts to connect our agriculture and food producers to those in need.

“We applaud our partners in the effort to assist our most vulnerable citizens with food insecurity issues,” Secretary of Agriculture Anson Tebbetts said. “Although there is a light at the end of the tunnel, we must continue to recognize the hardships many Vermonters are experiencing. Our farmers and food businesses are making important efforts to address this, including food and funding.”

Vermont Rotary groups have once again provided monetary support for a donation to the Vermont Foodbank. In 2020, Vermont Rotary groups were [part of a collaboration](https://agriculture.vermont.gov/agency-agriculture-food-markets-news/vermont-rotary-clubs-join-vermont-dairy-recovery-and-food) <<https://agriculture.vermont.gov/agency-agriculture-food-markets-news/vermont-rotary-clubs-join-vermont-dairy-recovery-and-food>> to turn milk from Vermont dairies into yogurt and butter for distribution from the Vermont Foodbank.

“Throughout COVID-19, Rotary clubs in Vermont and New Hampshire have worked with community partners to help dairy farmers and food-insecure residents,” said Martin Cohn, a Brattleboro Rotary Club past-president who spearheaded the project. “Members and clubs from two Rotary districts – 7870 and 7850 – reached into their pockets to enable the Vermont Foodbank to buy dairy products directly from a Vermont dairy producer. We are pleased to be a part of this initiative to get nutritious cheddar cheese to Vermont families during these difficult times and help a Vermont dairy farmer challenged by disruptions as a result of COVID-19.”

Vermont Rotary clubs joined forces to raise nearly \$10,000 dollars to purchase the Vermont cheddar from Windsor based Vermont Farmstead Cheese Company. The purchase supplied 1,750 pounds of cheddar cheese or 4,000 seven-ounce servings.

Vermont Farmstead Cheese Company CEO Kent Underwood acknowledged the importance of this effort for Vermonters in need, and the community effort it took to make it happen. “We thank the Rotary Clubs of Vermont for their collaborative fundraising efforts, and for the opportunity to provide our cheese to Vermonters in a time of need. Not only does this bolster the efforts of the Vermont Foodbank, but it also has a positive impact on our local employment and farm production.”

As the pandemic continues its impacts on Vermonters, causing many to face extraordinary challenges, the Vermont Foodbank has maintained a vital role in addressing food insecurity. “Hunger in Vermont has reached unprecedented levels during the pandemic, with 1 in 3 people facing hunger since the start of the pandemic,” says Vermont Foodbank CEO, John Sayles. “These extreme numbers make it even more impactful to have the assistance of Rotary clubs across Vermont helping to feed our community.”

Meredith Rotary Supplies Fire Departments with Sanitizing Equipment

When Meredith Rotary Club heard about the potential for a District managed Covid-19 Global Grant, the club contacted four local fire departments asking what supplies or equipment they needed in response to the Covid-19 pandemic. Upon learning of their need for specialized sanitizing equipment, Meredith Rotary Club applied to the District for a Covid-19 matching grant. As a result of receiving the Rotary Foundation's matching grant funds, Meredith Rotary purchased and delivered specialized sanitizing equipment to Meredith, Center Harbor, Sandwich, and Moultonborough Fire Departments. Meredith and Sandwich Fire Departments received fire code compliant cabinet washers to launder and sanitize fire fighting suits. Center Harbor Fire-Rescue received a fire code compliant gear drying cabinet that dries laundered fire fighting suits in hours versus days of open air drying. Moultonborough Fire-Rescue received an electrostatic sprayer that covers fire fighting equipment, including fire trucks, with disinfectant spray saving hours of manual hand cleaning.





Ludlow Rotary Helps Area Towns with Dog Waste Stations

The Ludlow Rotary Club (LRC) is continuing efforts to help area towns with dog waste stations in Ludlow, Mt Holly, and Cavendish.

Recently, LRC members helped Ludlow install three waste stations in Ludlow and a waste station at Star Lake in Mt. Holly. Plans also included such assistance in Cavendish.

The LRC has supported many community improvements to Star Lake over the past 5 years. It is the hope of the Ludlow Rotary Club that the new dog waste station will be another well-used addition. Visitors to Star Lake are required to clean up after their pets. The free dog waste bags will help with compliance for those who mean well but came unprepared for dog emergencies. The goal is to enhance the experience of all visitors to the Lake and protect the surrounding environment. The bags are supplied as a courtesy to Star Lake visitors whose dogs must be on a leash at the lake.

Rotary is also supplying several boxes of replacement bags for the station and will supply several more boxes of replacement bags in the Ludlow and Cavendish sites.

In Ludlow, the LRC has contributed to the West Hill Dog Park's development in addition to the waste station located there.

There have been numerous investments at Star Lake over the past 5 years with Ludlow Rotary Club support. The dam was rebuilt in 2015. In 2016 three new picnic tables were purchased for the recreation area/beach. Volunteers rebuilt a permanent bench and canoe/boat racks. Rotarians and Mount Holly Community Association volunteers built and planted a beautiful new perennial garden which local volunteers now maintain. A new swim raft was purchased in 2019 with help from Rotary. The Star Lake recreation area is popular for fishing, swimming, picnics, community events, and viewing wildlife and fall colors.

The LRC, in spite of the limitations and restrictions imposed by Covid-19, will continue to help area towns in developing similar programs for the public good and recreation. The LRC is continuing to hold its weekly meetings on Tuesdays from 12 Noon to 1 PM using the Zoom computer app. People interested in learning more about Rotary are invited to contact Kevin Barnes, LRC President, at (802) 228-8877, to receive an invitation to a Tuesday meeting.

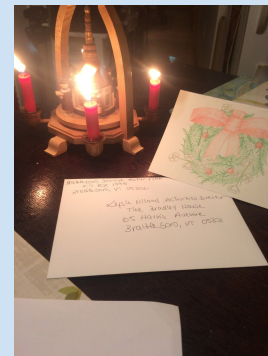
Community Service Idea: Valentine's Day Cards for Nursing Homes

KECR Delivers Meals to Families in Need

This holiday season, the Keene Elm City Rotary Club (KECR) has focused its efforts on bringing food to those in need in the Monadnock region. We worked with MUCH (Monadnock Understands Childhood Hunger), a group dedicated to alleviating childhood hunger that is funded through the KECR, to deliver 148 food boxes the week of Christmas and 136 food boxes on the Monday before Thanksgiving to local families.

We also have been working throughout the COVID-19 pandemic to deliver 48-68 boxes each week to area families in need. These boxes include fresh produce, beans, rice, pasta, canned sauces, eggs, milk, cheese, snacks, bread, cereal and are available through our schools, who identify families in need and relay that information to MUCH. The weekly deliveries will continue through the school year with larger efforts planned for the February and April school vacations.



KECR members also volunteered at the Keene Community Kitchen on the Wednesday before Thanksgiving and Wednesday before Christmas, packing and distributing more than 100 dinners each night.

With a potential end in sight to the pandemic, we are all anxious to meet again in person, but have been heartened to see so many working harder than ever to support the health and safety of those in our communities. We wish you all a wonderful 2021!
