In Memoriam: Paul Bordeleau, Past District Governor

Paul E. Bordeleau, 96, passed away September 27 at CMC after a brief illness. . He was married to Wilma Sloan Bordeleau who predeceased him in 2010 after 62 years of marriage.

Paul was born in Lowell, MA, raised his family in Framingham, MA, and moved to Bedford, NH in 1971 where he spent the rest of his life. He was a D-Day veteran in WWII, and also served in the Korean War. He earned his BA at New England conservatory and a Masters at



BU, and was a music teacher and band director for 16 years in Chelmsford, Framingham, and Dover-Sherborn schools in Massachusetts. He moved his family to New Hampshire in 1971 and worked as a salesman at Darrell's Music Hall in the Bedford Mall until 1973 when he opened his own piano and organ teaching studio, and taught over a thousand students over the years, finally retiring from teaching in 2019. He was also a great musician and entertainer, and led a number of bands over an 80 year career, as well as being a church organist for most of that time, finally retiring from performing altogether in August 2020.



In addition to his music he was also a very active member of the Bedford Rotary Club for 47 years and served as both a club president and district governor, and was a major donor to the Rotary Foundation. He was also a member of the Washington Lodge of the Freemasons. Paul is survived by his sons Edward, a piano technician in Bedford, NH and owner of Pianoarts, and Phil Bordeleau, music director at the Cathedral Basilica of the Immaculate Conception in Denver, CO, and a daughter, Jan Bordeleau, a church organist, piano teacher, and owner of Bordeleau Keyboard Studio in Bedford, NH.

SERVICES There are no calling hours or funeral per his wishes. He will be interred at the NH Veterans Cemetery Wednesday, Oct. 7th next to his wife Wilma, also a WWII veteran. Over the years, the Rotary Club of Hollis-Brookline has consistently provided financial support to a remarkable organization known as ShelterBox. What is ShelterBox? Imagine a nightmare scenario: widespread disaster, in one of the many forms it can take, has suddenly left you and your loved ones homeless in the midst of widespread desolation where there are no social services or government assistance. ShelterBox, responding to the disaster, would give you a chance to survive. To your great joy, you are given a box containing a rugged family-size tent, as well as cooking equipment, tools, blankets, water filters, solar lights, mosquito netting - all things needed while you rebuild your life. Your despair is transformed into hope.

Through annual contributions to ShelterBox, the Rotary Club of Hollis-Brookline has provided immediate aid following disasters throughout the world. This year, ShelterBox has chosen to acknowledge this support by naming the club a 2019-2020 Bronze ShelterBox HERO.

HERO Clubs enable ShelterBox to purchase and pre-position aid in or near countries where there is often need, resulting in a more efficient, effective, and timely response. And in that response, as a Project Partner with Rotary Clubs throughout the world, it is most often Rotarians and Clubs who are the first point of contact for the ShelterBox Response Team when they arrive in a country devastated by a disaster.

Rotary Clubs Donate to the NH Food Bank Much Needed Dairy Products

Rotary Clubs donate \$21,225 to NH Food Bank for the purchase of dairy products to distribute to New Hampshire residents in need

Manchester, N.H. – New Hampshire and Vermont Rotary Clubs recently donated \$21,225 to the New Hampshire Food Bank, a program of Catholic Charities New Hampshire, exclusively to purchase dairy products for New Hampshire residents in need. Four Rotary Clubs and two Districts (representing multiple clubs) joined forces to raise the funds this summer. Milk and dairy products are among the most requested items from the local food pantries that are served by the New Hampshire Food Bank. This demand has only been heightened with the added stress of the COVID-19 situation, which has been causing more New Hampshire families to seek the services of the New Hampshire Food Bank and its network.

"New Hampshire dairy farm families are committed to addressing hunger in their local communities. Food insecurity is a heartbreaking reality for far too many families. Dairy is a nutrient-rich food that is a vital part of a healthy, wholesome diet. It is our hope that the generosity of these Rotary Clubs will lead others to make dairy a part of their future donations," said Amy Hall, Executive Director, Granite State Dairy Promotion.

The Rotary Clubs expressed an interest in doing this project based on a similar effort in Vermont by Vermont Rotary Clubs. They collaborated with the New Hampshire Food Bank, Granite State Dairy Promotion, and the New Hampshire Department of Agriculture, Markets & Food to implement the program. New Hampshire Commissioner of Agriculture, Shawn Jasper said, "This effort is a wonderful example of community partnership to benefit those in need, as well as New Hampshire dairy businesses, who have also been hit hard by COVID-19. Thank you to all involved."

The New Hampshire Food Bank is contracting with Contoocook Creamery of Contoocook, NH to bottle milk in the desired packaging. These funds will purchase approximately 7,860 half gallons of milk for distribution. Stonyfield Organic of Londonderry, NH is also providing nearly 20,000 cups of yogurt for this specific program with help from the Rotary Club donation efforts. Building on a long-standing relationship with the New Hampshire Food Bank, Stonyfield has provided more than 200,000 products this year to help the families most affected by food insecurity at this time.

"This generous donation from the Rotary Clubs of New Hampshire and Vermont is making a substantial impact on our ability to provide our partners with critical dairy products, which can be very difficult to procure," said Eileen Liponis, Executive Director, the New Hampshire Food Bank.



"These dairy products sourced locally from New Hampshire dairy farmers and manufacturers is a win-win and further helps to support our efforts to provide nutritious food to those most in need in the Granite State. We are extremely grateful for this funding."

We are pleased to be a part of this initiative to get nutritious dairy products to New Hampshire families during these difficult times and help New Hampshire dairy farmers challenged by disruptions as a result of COVID-19," said Martin Cohn, a Brattleboro Rotary Club past-president who spearheaded the project.

Since the spread of COVID-19 there are approximately 1 in 7 men, women, and children in New Hampshire who are food insecure, a projected 71,000 additional people, and more than 57 percent increase. In 2019, as the state's only Food Bank, the New Hampshire Food Bank efficiently procured and distributed more than 14.2 million pounds of food to people in need through more than 400 non-profit registered agencies. Agencies include food pantries, neighborhood centers, low-income housing sites, senior nutrition centers, family crisis centers, hospices, soup kitchens, emergency shelters, after-school programs, and daycare centers. Grand Monadnock Rotary Club Sponsors Peterborough "Community Walk for Recovery"

The Grand Monadnock Rotary Club (GMRC) is holding a Peterborough 'Community Walk For Recovery' from Substance Use Disorders on Sunday afternoon, October 18th. The Walk and an accompanying Recovery Fair in Putnam Park is a show of support for people working toward recovery from Substance Use Disorder (SUD), the mental and physical illness we used to call Addiction.

Walkers should arrive at the Riverwalk Parking Lot on Grove Street between 12 pm and 1:30 pm Sunday to register and depart in small groups for a 3-mile walk along one of three routes . Walkers will end at the Recovery Fair at Putnam Park, next to the stone bridge on Grove Street. Walkers and donors will find more info and pre-registration for the walk is at https://GrandMonadnockRotary.org.

The public is invited to the Recovery Fair between 1:00 and 3:30 pm Sunday afternoon. The region's leading Prevention, Treatment and Recovery agencies will have displays and exhibits to share information and answer questions about how to get help for the people you love – family, friends, employees and associates. Recovery help is for Substance Use Disorders of all kinds: opioids, fentanyl, meth, pills, alcohol and more.



At 3:00pm Mary Drew, CEO and founder of Reality Check in Jaffrey, will offer a keynote address, an update on the state of prevention, treatment and recovery in the midst of Covid-19, the kind of work that is being done, and the level of support that will be needed to reduce the bulge in substance misuse that we know is occurring during social isolation.

According to The Rev. Sandi Albom of All Saints Episcopal Church, Coordinator of the Recovery Ministries of the Episcopal Church of NH, "SUD is a disease of the mind, body and soul that creates compulsive behavior that circumvents our natural impulses for survival. We should celebrate those working to recover, encourage them as they do their hard work, and offer helping hands to get them back on the path to success."

SUD is a public health issue that responds to treatment and support, not a criminal justice issue. Where criminal justice isolates and marginalizes people with problems, a public health approach calls for treatment and support to re-integrate people into society. Mary Drew's definition of recovery is "having a place to live, a job, and a community to belong to."

In addition to the Club members and guests present, several Rotarians also participated virtually. There were a few technical glitches, but with patience and humor, in the end everything worked out well, so the club is planning to hold both hybrid meetings (such as this one) and virtual meetings going forward. At this meeting President David Crespo was pleased to present Past President Sue Manchester with a gift of a Rotary International clock in recognition of her dedication and service as President from 2018-2020 (see photo). David took over this leadership role from Sue on May 1, 2020. Sue had served as President for two years, and with her energy and sharp focus kept the Club on a firm footing as it engaged in the community and raised funds through the annual Cruising Downtown Manchester event. Sue has been a dedicated member of the Manchester Rotary Club since 2001. A Paul Harris Fellow, she is the long-time chair of the Club's Foundation Committee.



At this time Club members are working on a variety of community service projects, including the distribution of 2,000 masks (obtained through the Rotary Million Masks Challenge) to the Manchester School District, and making additional cloth masks for students and families in need in the local community.
