What Are The Benfits?

Direct Club Benefits

They <u>engage</u> your members, their friends, family, & colleagues.

They <u>connect us</u> to the communities we serve.

They're <u>FUN</u>.

They <u>can</u> help grow your club.

Indirect Club Benefits

GREAT <u>exposure</u> for the club & members in the community.

Networking, baby!

Grow <u>collaborations</u> with other community groups – including other Rotary Clubs.

What Do Volunteers Want

Successful volunteer engagement requires projects and an environment that are attractive to volunteers. Good planning is essential to make service projects successful. What do volunteers look for?

Doing good work. The work must be worthwhile.

A good use of their time. Time is precious to everyone. If they reserved a block of time for the service project, ensure most of the time is spent doing service.

Low commitment levels. Asking someone to make long-term commitments or to sign up to be on a team as a first step usually fails.

Time-bounded. Make sure that they can leave when they plan to, or as advertised, even if the work is not complete.

Doable. Find projects that people can do without special training and that they can succeed at quickly.

Family-Friendly. Volunteers do not want to be away from their families as they do service, and parents want to pass values on to their children.

Fun and Fellowship. Volunteering should be enjoyable.

Seasonal decorations (valentine's day, 4 th of July, Thanksgiving, etc.)	Assisted living facility, senior housing	Create items to brighten up the living spaces of disadvantaged people	Craft items	Low-moderate
Other crafts, such as party favors, materials for school projects,	Hospitals, veterans hospitals, schools, others	Raw materials, some times sewing machine or other machines, craft items	Depends on craft	Low-moderate
Card writing	Senior facility, hospital, veterans org	Write notes of encouragement, possibly decorate envelopes	Cards and pens and markers	low
Comfort kits for a cause	Red Cross, Kits for Kids, local human services group	Assemble items into bags to give to people who are facing disasters and hard times.	Personal hygiene items, new socks, toys, first aid, snacks	Moderate-high
Book preparation for donations	Schools, literacy agencies	Place Rotary placards in books; pack books for distribution or shipping	Books, labels, etx.	Low-moderate

Service Saturday

The PURPOSE of Rotary Service Saturday is to:

Increase Rotarian engagement in service and service leadership.

Forge or strengthen community partnerships between the club and local organizations.

Provide a way for future Rotarians to "try out" Rotary.

Increase awareness of Rotary.

THE MOST IMPORTANT GOAL OF A SERVCE SATURDAY IS TO GIVE NON-ROTARIAN VOLUNTEERS A SERVICE EXPERIENCE THAT WILL MAKE THEM WANT TO COME BACK.

Collaborating with Partners on Sustainable Service Projects

Working with <u>partners</u> can strengthen club & district service projects by ensuring sustainability, providing access to expertise, and fostering local networks. Rotary's service partners join us on specific projects that support our causes. Consider partnering with one of the following organizations on your next project:

- <u>Ashoka</u> to create positive social and economic change
- Habitat for Humanity to provide safe and affordable shelter to families in need
- International Agency for the Prevention of Blindness (IAPB) to design and implement projects that improve access to quality eye-care services
- Mediators Beyond Borders to build local skills for peace and promote mediation worldwide
- <u>Peace Corps</u> to promote peace and community development
- <u>ShelterBox</u> to provide disaster relief
