

Wellesley Interactors Leading Way With Mental Health and Wellness

Teens from the **Interact Club of Wellesley** recently presented their Peer Leadership and Depression Prevention project in a conference session, participated in a keynote panel discussion, and staffed a Q&A kiosk about depression-prevention resources. The event was the Teen Mental Health, Depression & Suicide Conference on April 8 in Milford, attended by more than 300 educators and teen leaders.

The Interact teens co-facilitated a one-hour session during the conference titled, *Teens Leading the Way: Mental Health and Wellness in the Community.* They stated that overcoming stigma and promoting wellness are as critical to addressing teen depression with intervention for treatment.

The teens described how they share coping skills and knowledge through their peer-leadership program. They presented their project results, including collaboration with other teen mentors, and invited others to join their call for action. They explained that Interact is the short name for "International Action" and that they have teleconferenced with peer mentors as distant as San Juan, Puerto Rico. The Wellesley Interact teens co-facilitate the *Break Free From Depression* curriculum with students of middle-school ages at their local Boys & Girls Club and with sophomores at Wellesley's high school.

As the Rotary Club of Wellesley advisor to the Interact Club, I introduced the teens for their presentation. I noted that three elements for success are needed for a community depression-prevention program, similar to extended family getting together for a weekend:

- 1. Accurate information
- 2. Easy conversation
- 3. Go-to person for discussing concerns (referral)





The Interact presenters were: junior **Nathan Chiu**, a runner who plays the cello, and who also participated in the panel discussion; senior Thomas **Capozzi** who is on the sailing team; senior **Joey Kinyanjui**; home-schooled senior **David Michael**; and from Dover Sherborn's high school, sophomore **Hannah Lee**.

The Interact Q&A kiosk (shown, left) offered emotional-wellness resources suitable for different age groups.

Toss It? No Way! Get It Fixed For Free At Bolton Repair Café!

Do you have a broken toaster or some clothes that need mending? Don't throw them away.

The Rotary Club of Nashoba Valley, with help from Bolton Local, will hold the next Bolton Repair Café on Saturday, May 30 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. The event will be held in Davis Hall at the First Parish of Bolton Church, located at 673 Main St. in Bolton. Please park and enter at the rear of the building.

Bring your items that need repair, and knowledgeable volunteers will try to fix them for free. The volunteers can work on items such as

small appliances, computers, lamps, bikes, jewelry, clothing, and outdoor power equipment. They can also sharpen knives, scissors, and garden tools. You only pay for needed parts. If you know what parts are needed, please get them ahead of time and bring them to the Bolton Repair Café to save time.

The Repair Café concept was initiated by Martine Postma. Since 2007, she has been striving for sustainability on the local level in many ways. She organized the very first Repair Café in 2009 in Amsterdam. It was a great success. This prompted Martine



to start the Repair Café Foundation. In 2010, this Dutch non-profit organization was officially set up. Since 2011, the foundation has provided professional support to local groups in the Netherlands and other countries wishing to start their own Repair Café.

At Repair Cafés, everything centers on making repairs. By promoting repairs, Repair Cafés want to help reduce mountains of waste. Repair Cafés are also meant to put neighbors in touch with each other in a new way, to help people save money, and to help people discover that a lot of know-how and practical skills can be found close to home.

In Central Massachusetts, Bolton Local runs the Bolton Repair Café, which is supported by the Repair Café Foundation. Bolton Local is a grassroots group of people whose mission is "to build a strong, self-reliant community made up of people committed to living sustainably on the planet, in a way that inspires, builds friendships, and offers a hopeful vision for the future."

Nashoba Valley Club Holds 3rd Annual Reality Fair

With about 50 volunteers from the community and other Rotary clubs across the district and beyond (shown, left), the Rotary Club of Nashoba Valley held its 2015 Reality Fair on April 17 at Nashoba Regional High School. The Reality Fair was a financialmanagement event for the sophomore class of 260 students, sponsored by the

club, high school and Clinton Savings Bank. The objective was to give students a better understanding of the financial responsibilities they will face in the real world.

Students used the high school's college and career portal to select a career and salary. On the day of the fair, they got a paycheck based on the career they selected. The paycheck equaled their monthly salary and showed deducted taxes. With this money, they had to pay for housing, utilities, insurance, transportation, clothing and food.

They were also tempted with "nice-to-have" luxuries such as pets, travel, sporting events, and gym memberships, and they had to spin a Wheel of Fortune to help them understand life's unexpected expenses. Many volunteers commented on how seriously the students took this exercise.

After students visited the various tables at the Reality Fair, they balanced their budgets and reviewed their spreadsheets with a credit counselor. Additionally, the students' ledgers are being mailed to their homes, to spur conversations and a better understanding of financial management in their own households.
