

We are also spearheading a drive to get more Major Donors, Bequest Society Members, Benefactors, Every Rotarian Every Year clubs, and 100-percent Paul Harrris Fellow Clubs. Currently, we have more than 70 Major Donors, with 63 members in our district who are more than halfway there.

With the New Year upon us, District 7910 is making the transition from a monthly to a biweekly Rotary *District 7910 Newsletter* starting with this issue, and from a biweekly to a weekly *Newsletter* starting April 9. The submission deadline for the next biweekly issue on January 22 is Monday, January 19 at 5:00 p.m.

The primary reasons for this change are two-fold: The *Newsletter* had become too long – the December issue was 12 pages; and, the *Newsletter* had been published too infrequently.

One of the results has been that when a contributor is unable to submit an article and/or images by deadline, for whatever reason, that content must be held for an entire month. Another result has been that some readers may be overwhelmed by the amount of content, and as a consequence may be failing to read some of it.

With the move to a biweekly *Newsletter*, and then to a weekly edition, such content "holds" will initially be reduced to at least two weeks, and eventually to at least one week. And, those readers turned off by 12-page *Newsletters* will find the amount of content in each issue to be less daunting – as well as fresher.

During January, February and March, 2015-'16 District Governor **Jim Fusco**, also of Rotary Nashoba Valley, will continue to send the weekly *District Bulletin* on Mondays. The latest *Bulletin* will then be incorporated in the next *Newsletter*.

Please keep these three guidelines in mind when submitting content to me, to consider for publishing in the *Newsletter:* 1. All articles *must* be submitted in Word format, and must be unlocked so they can be edited, or they will be held until they are; 2. at least one image *must* accompany each article, or the article will be held until it is; and, 3. all images *must* be submitted in either JPEG or PNG format, and in focus, or they will be held until they are. ### **District 7910 Getting Its First Exchange**

District 7910 of Central Massachusetts and <u>District 2060</u> of three regions of northeast Italy – Friuli Venezia Giulia, Trentino Alto Adige, and Südtirol Veneto - are planning an exchange. Known as Rotary 7910 Exchange, it will be our district's first such effort.

The goals of the Exchange are three-fold: to enhance friendship and understanding between two districts; to share education and

knowledge by providing educational and cultural opportunities; and to understand cultures and ways of life for people in participating clubs.

We will be welcoming a team of five people - one Rotarian team leader and four other Rotarians and non-Rotarians – from D2060. To reciprocate, we will also send a team of five people – one, being a Rotarian team leader – to D2060. Each member will pay his or her airfare, and some incidental expenses. The teams will consist of professionals from either the same or related profession. Rotary members will provide hosting, meals, transportation, and some sightseeing. We will try to provide them with cultural, vocational and educational experience. Incoming and outgoing teams will also attend District Conferences.

The tentative dates for the Italian team to visit D7910 will be this May 9 to 30. Our team will be going to Italy this June 6 to 27.

# WPI Rotaract Rainwater-Harvesting Project Completes Funding Requirements

Without Borders USA, and Katie Picchione (shown, center), president of the brand new WPI Rotaract Club, presented their new Rotary Global Grant project in Guachtug, Guatemala to the Rotary Club of Westborough. Jim Stone (shown, right), president-elect of the Rotary Club of Nashoba Valley, and Rita Newman, treasurer of the WPI Rotaract Club (not shown) also attended in support of the project.

The WPI Rotaract initiative, being done collaboratively with the WPI Student Chapter of EWB-USA, is a rainwater-harvesting project to install rooftop rainwatercollection units on individual homes, freeing them from

polluted ground water and making it possible for each one to have lavatories. The Global Grant Project is sponsored by Rotary Nashoba Valley on behalf of WPI Rotaract.

The happy news is that the Rotary Westborough will provide \$4,000 to this great effort, completing the fundraising requirement to be eligible for matching funds from <u>The Rotary Foundation</u>. Other clubs that contributed to the project are <u>Acton-Boxborough</u>, <u>Bedford</u>, <u>Littleton</u>, **Nashoba Valley**, <u>Shrewsbury</u>, and <u>Worcester</u>.

In her letter of thanks to Rotary Westborough President **Bill Domings**, Katie wrote that the outcome will be far more than \$4,000. "The \$4,000 donation from your club completes the initial money needed for the Global Grant," she stated. "Matched by the district and Rotary Foundation funds, your donation multiplies to \$14,000. ... This can cover the cost of all the additional storage tanks needed in the community, or the cost of all logistics and the on-the-ground support needed to complete the project. It is the largest single donation that has been put into this project since its beginning in 2009, and it ensures that by May 2015, every family in Guachtug will have improved water security."

Katie also had kind words about the work done by Westborough Rotarian Dr. **Jorge Yarzebski** to establish Rotary relationships that guarantee on the ground support. What is also exciting is that WPI now has a Rotaract Club to help drive the effort and bring young people into collaboration with Rotary. It is a perfect example of how collaboration and The Rotary Foundation programs can enrich and expand club contributions.
