

APRIL DAY of SERVICE - Second Place



In high school there are many different clubs to choose from. There is no shortage of available groups that offer students an opportunity to express themselves in a multitude of different ways. The Interact Club provides students an opportunity to learn about Service Above Self, Rotary's motto. Interact also teaches Leadership. Partnering with the sponsor Rotary Club, a local non-profit or in this case a non-profit on the other side of the world opens young minds to issues and challenges in our backyard and far from home. The **Taunton High School Interact Club** hosted a coin drive fundraising operation for a international non profit called **Water for Cambodia.** Water for Cambodia builds and installs biosand water filters in Cambodia to provide clean drinking water, they also build latrines, water wells and provide hygiene education. Club members enlisted support from students, faculty and their sponsor the Taunton Rotary Club to collect gallon jugs, which were then labeled and distributed. The club also designed posters and flyers along with creating announcements and social media posts to get the word our. The containers were distributed throughout the school. During the two week drive the club raised \$423.70 for their nonprofit. The winning classroom received a prize for each student.
