#### Hi everyone

Where does the time go?! Looking back on the first five months, Rotary has been at the forefront of almost everything we've done. Lynne and I have completed our round of Official Club Visits. We will be back to see many of you in the second half of this Rotary year.

What have we learned? The diversity of the 43 clubs is really quite marvellous. It's great to see plans put into place and working well. The innovation of Rotarians never ceases to amaze me.

The autonomy of clubs means that each is able to operate the way it is best for them, with many clubs working together across the District. Some clubs have projects with clubs in District 9520 and others have joined forces with other Service Clubs. Many have forged partnerships with their local councils. Almost all have international projects, the scope of which is quite astonishing.

#### Some highlights

- The visit by RI Zone 8 Director Guiller Tumagan a good initiative but very rushed
- Interest from Clubs regarding forming new Interact and Rotaract clubs; some have already begun planning
- The strong interest in Lynne's "Donate Life" Project
- The innovative ways clubs are working with their local communities
- The warmth with which we were greeted at every visit

#### Ongoing issues

- Attracting new members and younger members and the aging population of Rotary
- Little or no interest in the RI and District websites and social media. I estimate around 65% still need to address this item
- So few members have signed on to My Rotary
- The cost (in financial terms) of being a Rotarian
- Frequency of meetings, changes to meeting formats and traditions
- Attracting Rotarians into Club and District leadership roles, especially candidates for President and District Governor
- Getting clubs to prepare for grants well in advance of implementing their projects
- Getting clubs to understand how their contributions to The Rotary Foundation will come back to them for use as Grants.

## Challenges that I was not prepared for

- Members' lack of interest in My Rotary. Around 25% signed
- The lack of understanding of the role of or assistance available from District and RI representatives.

# The Rotary Foundation

We hear about The Foundation quite a lot. We hear about how important it is to participate in giving to our own Charity. So why am I telling you about it again?

During our visits, it was evident that many of you are not aware that the money you give to The Foundation comes back to the District in the form of District Grants. Every three years, money donated to the Foundation is set aside with 50% coming to the District and 50% to The Annual Fund. It makes perfect sense to make your donation to "our Charity" the first on your list when you are deciding where the funds you have raised will go.

Early planning with projects for which you will apply for Grants is really helpful. The money set aside for District Grants that is not distributed goes back into the Global fund, so apply! If you have a project which is needing, say, \$3,000, apply for \$3,000, which effectively doubles your funds for your project. Think of what those extra dollars can achieve!

Global Grants, on the other hand, start at around \$30,000. Just imagine what your \$40,000 plus a Global Grant of \$40,000; even up to a combined total of \$100,000 could accomplish when embarking on an humanitarian project in another country, or even our own country!

Make your list of giving early in the next half of this Rotary year, and put The Rotary Foundation at the top of your list. For further information contact PDG Ed King: <u>edward.king3@bigpond.com</u>

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# <u>Predators on our Doorstep</u> Wild dog problem ~ Rotarians can help

The Rotary Club of Somerton Park Community Service committee member John Yard has brought to our attention the problem of wild dogs getting through the dog fence in the north of South Australia. This is causing problems for graziers and farmers with sheep in the north of the state. Wild dogs have been seen as far south as Eudunda.

Stock losses will continue unless something is done to stop the migration of these predators. Both District 9500 and 9520 border the dog fence and both District Governors are in favour of assisting.





It was decided the best way to go about this is to make a video. Wellknown Rural Reporter Ian Doyle has offered his services free to make the video, however the cost would still be approximately \$4000. This would give us access to archival photos owned by Ian and his photographer. The video would be of professional quality and be available to Rotary Clubs individually, for District Conferences and to anyone else interested. The objective of producing the video is to create awareness of the problem to the general public and to our politicians.
