# **Rotary Foundation Named** World's Outstanding Foundation For 2016

The Association of Fundraising Professionals has recognised The Rotary Foundation with its annual Award for Outstanding Foundation. The award honors organisations that show philanthropic commitment and leadership through financial support, innovation, encouragement of others, and involvement in public affairs.

"We are honored to receive this recognition from the AFP, which gives us even more reason to celebrate during our Foundation's centennial year," says Rotary Foundation Trustee Chair Kalvan Banerjee. "The continued strong support of Rotary members will help us keep our promise of a polio-free world for all children and enable the Foundation to carry out its mission of advancing world understanding, goodwill, and peace. We look forward to another 100 years of Rotary members taking action to make communities better around the world."

AFP's committee of judges cited Rotary's comprehensive campaign to eradicate polio as a major driver of the selection. They also mentioned that Rotary applies a methodical, purposeful approach to support a wide variety of causes, from providing clean water to educating the next generation of peace professionals.



The announcement came on 15 November, known to industry professionals since the 1980s as National Philanthropy Day. The award will be presented in early 2017 at the AFP's annual conference in San Francisco.

# Australian Rotarian Stephanie Woollard One Of Six To Receive Global Award

Stephanie Woollard, Member of The Rotary Club of Melbourne, Victoria, has been recognised on the global stage with a prestigious Rotary Responsible Business Award. Stephanie is one of only six honorees worldwide, applauded for her ground-breaking work establishing the Seven Women project, which supports disabled women in Nepal.

After meeting seven illiterate craftspeople during a visit to Nepal, Woollard founded Seven Women to help Nepalese women make products to sell abroad. The program, which has trained and employed more than 1,000 women in the last decade, also teaches basic bookkeeping and computer skills.

Stephanie is dedicated to education and empowerment, believing a realistic understanding of the causes of poverty is a crucial ingredient for bringing peace and tolerance to our globalised world. "My key to a better world is as simple as finding your passion and dedicating your life to using that passion to bring hope to the lives of others."

What Youthoria Cinema has developed into over the last five years is a business model that provides a much needed cinema to the community of Port Lincoln, providing block busting movies for all age groups, but also provides a "drop-in" space for young people throughout the week. It is also a venue for people to hire for Fundraising events.

The Cinema itself continues to be run by Port Lincoln youth, with an intensive training program for work experience continuing to run, providing local youth with practical experience for the workplace.

The cinema is a joint project of the Rotary Club of Port Lincoln and the West Coast Youth Support Group. The club recently installed 'new second hand' seating in the cinema which is located in the Flinders Theatre in Port Lincoln.

Mr Pohl said 2016 was not over for the local Rotary Club, with the group set to hold the Roxby Downs Christmas Pageant on Saturday, December 3, and also play a part in the Roxby Downs Area School Parents and Friends Twilight Markets this weekend.

Next year, the club will continue to be busy, having already committed to feeding hundreds of participants visiting the area for the annual Shitbox Car Rally.

Mr Pohl arrived on Tuesday, November 1, and was taken on a tour of Roxby Downs' facilities before making his way out to Andamooka and having a look around the old cottages, as well as going under the Post Office to see Peter Taubers' opal mining display.

A Rotary Club of Roxby Districts meeting was then held at the Tuckerbox that night, where new member Ross Wilson was inducted and the group held its own Melbourne Cup race.

Whilst volunteers were having lunch, the Chairs of the Central Region RAWCS programs gave brief presentations on the work done by their respective groups to assist Rotary Clubs in carrying out successful international and local humanitarian projects.
