

Conflict and violence displace millions of people each year. Half of those killed in conflict are children, and 90 percent are civilians.

CHRISTOPHER MOORE is someone that leads by example, volunteering his time to the community day or night, and is a very worthy recipient of the City of Salisbury Citizen of the Year award.

Christopher has also been involved in a wide range of other community groups and organisations as he encourages them to work cohesively to achieve shared goals. He has been involved in school councils, church and local charities, advisory boards, Salisbury's Sister City delegation to Mobara in Japan, and he is currently the President of the Salisbury Rotary Club.

MIKE MUNRO, President of the RC of Port Lincoln is a tireless community worker helping those less fortunate. His passion for helping the youth of the city have earned Mike this year's Port Lincoln City Council Citizen of the Year award.

Mr Munro said when he was told he had received the award, he was "a bit taken aback". He said he never expected to receive the award for his contribution and considered it a Rotary award. "I just do what Rotary does, we try to make the community a better place for everyone," he said.



Returning from their 12-month exchanges to Europe were seven students who and now settling back into home and school. If you would like one to two of them to come along to talk to your club about their experience, please contact the RC's Golden Grove, Gawler Light, Port Lincoln, Roxby District, Whyalla or Port Augusta.

We've just seen six local students sponsored by the Rotary Clubs of Northern Yorke Peninsula, Port Pirie, Port Lincoln, Whyalla and Whyalla Norrie jet away to start their exchanges.



Currently there are <u>20 Expressions of Interest</u> from students to go on overseas exchange from our District in 2018. Interested students still have three months to place their applications. The Youth Exchange Committee will direct these students to their local Rotary Clubs, seeking their club's sponsorship as the initial step. You are asked to seriously consider sponsoring these students.

The students are enjoying their hospitality, the Aussie culture and way of life. These students are also available to come and talk to your clubs. They will be here for another six months and will also be with us at the District Conference in March.

There will be new arrivals in July who will need hosts for their stay. If your club would like to host a student or are interested in hearing more about the details and 'costs' of hosting an international student, (or even co-host with sharing with another club) the District Committee would love to hear from you.

Finally, our District Committee is composed of a number of Rotarians who are keen to sponsor the youth within our District in these educational and cultural exchanges. They too, are available to speak at clubs about Student Exchanges. We are always looking for new members to join our committee and if you or any of your club members are interested in joining us I would be pleased to hear from them. It does not involve a lot of time or money, but an interest in the wellbeing of our youth is essential.


