







#### Status of elimination of trachoma as a public health problem, 2018



### The S.A.F.E. Strategy

















#### Surgery

is needed to reposition turned-in eyelashes so they do not scrape against the cornea.

#### **Antibiotics**

treat the infection and decrease transmission in endemic regions.

#### Facial cleanliness helps to reduce transmission.

#### Environmental Improvements

such as access to water and basic sanitation, reduce risk of exposure and infection.





### Our main aim:

To prevent infectious diseases, like Trachoma, by enabling communities to practice good hygiene.



### Pilot Project: Mirrors

Providing acrylic mirrors to homes.

Being able to see one's face will help them to be healthy.

Cost: \$15 per home



### Pilot Project: Face Washing



Aim: To providing each child the ability to wash their face and avoid further contamination.
