From my desk.

Hello Readers -

As with proposed change, there is always trepidation and fear.

The formation of the new district D9510 is not immune and within this some people may believe that the way the new district is to be managed is 'fait accompli' and therefore there is no point in contributing their ideas.

This is incorrect.

I provide the important back-ground and underpinning information to facilitate and encourage your valuable contribution to the process.

The Steering committee (SC) was formed by the combined G-train of the two districts 9500 & 9520. The prime focus of the SC is to present to the G-train one or more models in which the new district could go about its primary role of supporting clubs and managing the broader affairs of the district. The SC is at present in the "consultative stage".

Earlier this week you received an email calling for your thoughts and recommendations on the governance and management of new district 9510. You can do this individually, collectively or both.

Added to this are consultative meetings with current leaders within the respective Groups, organised by their Assistant Governor and led by a steering committee member.

Further, the Team Leaders from D9500 &D9520 have been encouraged to meet to discuss how their respective areas of responsibility will combine (acknowledging that there are process differences in how each delivers its programs).

The SC has programmed the consultation process from now through to September this year. It will then spend a few months formulating one or more models and then putting them out for broad comment before presentation to the G-train and the DG's.

For those of you who are unfamiliar with the term "G-train" – this is a group made up of the IPDG, the DG, DGE & DGN – the "Governor Train". Most districts have something similar. Usually, the G-train meet as an advisory group to help and support each other in the preparation for their role as DG and also to act as a sounding board where issues arise. In the unification of districts, the G-train is considered the most appropriate group to guide the process and to consult/advise with the incumbent DG's, who together need to agree on the governing model to be used for D9510.

Most importantly, we have the opportunity to create a "new" model" that fits us best, bringing with us those practices that have stood us in good stead for many decades and shedding those no longer relevant to contemporary times.

Just as Clubs have been given the opportunity to change their meeting format to become more relevant to new-comers, so also the district has the opportunity to become more efficient in the support of Clubs.

RI, at Board and management level is also changing and over recent years RI has given Clubs the opportunity and encouragement to change.


As with any good "brain-storming" activity, no idea is a bad one, and no idea is 'too out there'. It's up to the SC and the G-train to extract the pearls.

New bathroom for Rotary House at Calperum.

The Calperum Committee has been discussing the addition of a new bathroom to Rotary House at Calperum. The request was made by a number of Rotarians using the house, and was seen by the committee to be a worthwhile investment of our money and time.

As with any new public facility, we made the decision with Calperum manager, Peter Cale, that any new bathroom must also cater for all access needs. We do have Rotarians with these needs now, and it is likely that more of us will need a safer bathroom into the future.

Thanks to Jeff Cluse and Russell Camens for their work in designing the bathroom, and for then costing it. The total cost, at commercial rates, is of the order of \$57,000. This includes all materials and labour, and management fees, etc. This is the same way that a builder would cost out an extension/addition to a home. It is also important to Calperum for us to use this "book" value, as it, and other volunteer labour we provide, will be included in Calperum's contribution as the base of a larger grant application to upgrade wet areas in all the buildings, and then to extend the dormitory areas in the camp site. Because Calperum is not in a council area, it is classified as remote in the federal government grant allocation process, and 'earns' \$2 for 1. Hence the bathroom 'cost' alone will qualify for more than \$114 000 government grant to help with future development. At our current work rate, we could be worth more than \$200 000 in this process.

Obviously we will use Rotarians for as much of the labour as possible, both for the bathroom, and for other landscaping and tasks we are good at. Hence, we are now seeking your support. Donations to help buy the materials for the bathroom can be sent to the committee, details in the current and next directory. We have some money now, but a lot more will be needed. Already a number of Rotarians have volunteered special skills. This addition will make the house even more comfortable, and also allow all Rotarians and other users of the house to enjoy its facilities to the full, and continue our work to support all aspects of Calperum's activities.

Dear Rotarians,

Dear President, Board and Club Members

I am contacting you to ask if your Club would consider joining the Rotary Club of Alice Springs, the Rotary Club of Gloucester NSW, [Rotary International] and others to assist indigenous healthcare provider Western Desert Dialysis (also known as the Purple House). Western Desert Dialysis is currently providing kidney dialysis in 11 remote aboriginal communities and has recently committed to supply the same much needed service to patients in another 3.

Haemodialysis treatment is required three times a week for around 5 hours at a time. Without the dialysis units in their communities, patients are forced into leaving their home and going to major centres. This means leaving their family, suffering the associated issues of isolation and lack of support as well as losing the elders and culture on the communities. The elders are required to maintain the laws and cultural awareness.

Indigenous people have a much higher incidence of renal disease. As well as providing dialysis, Western Desert Dialysis also offers education as to disease prevention and improved nutrition.

As an NGO, Western Desert Dialysis is partially funded by local government but must raise further funds to finance its activities in full. It urgently needs a vehicle for administration services in Alice Springs and an off-road ute for transporting equipment and staff to communities.

The total funds required for the two vehicles is \$75,000. Through the generous support of several Rotary Clubs and charitable foundations, we have so far raised more than \$55,000 towards our target. We are very close to delivering the support Western Desert Dialysis so badly needs - and we need your help! We are encouraging Rotary Clubs from our District and around Australia to make a contribution - no matter how big or small - and in return your support will be acknowledged on a plaque to be displayed at the Purple House clinic in Alice Springs.

So that we are not in the position of seeking camp parents each year just prior to camps, I am keen to hear from anyone interested in the roles, be it this year or future years.


