Dear Fellow Rotarians,

After almost 100 years of successful operation in Australia and New Zealand, Rotary finds itself at a very significant cross road. With a declining membership over the last ten years, Australia has lost 4,314 members (13%) and New Zealand has lost 1,967 (19%) plus an ageing membership demographic, the continued existence of Rotary as we know it is under considerable threat.

Down the Mighty Murray

Renmark to the Murray Mouth – 600Km

The paddle will start from Renmark on 19th February 2018. Are there any Rotarians out there who would like to join us for a day, a week or the whole trip (3.5 weeks)? The trip is unsupported, meaning that all camping gear and food/water is carried with us. There are of course shops at the major towns, and along the river there are 7 Rotary clubs who we hope to contact on our journey down river. It will be a relaxed journey, paddling at a rate of about 30km/day, with regular stops for morning tea, lunch, afternoon tea. Each day we start paddling about 7:30am, then set up camp by about 3pm. We paddle downstream so can do about 6kph, about 5hrs of paddling per day. Not difficult if you are reasonably fit. On occasions we will stay in a caravan park (we'll need a shower) and have the occasional day off. The trip is planned to finish on the 13th March and will be in time to attend Districts Conference in Tanunda.

This trip will be used to raise funds for a Rotarian Action Group Against Slavery project in NE India, run by the Rotary Club of Dunbar, Scotland, and the Rotary Club of Kalimpong, Bengal, India.
