Hello Readers or should I be saying ahoy there!

I had the most fabulous day yesterday whist doing something that I've been wanting to do for many decades. I went out to sea in a big multi masted sailing ship akin to the big ships of yesteryear - before steam, coal and diesel. Avid readers would have noted in the Horizons, adverts for a day cruise on the 'One & All' – a 2 masted sail training ship. She's a true marvel and what an experience.

The main purpose of the cruise was to expose Rotarians and their friends to the ship and especially to make us aware of the fabulous opportunity that the operators are offering Rotary. In the recent few months they have held multi day "sailing experiences" for young kids, 15-18 yo's, most sponsored through Rotary Clubs. It's an 'out of comfort zone' experience where the kids learn about team ship, gain some leadership and communication skills and have a personal discovery journey, all whilst participating in the integral role of crewing the ship. They get to work in teams (watches) and operate the ship day and night as it sails between ports. They steer, navigate and set sails and they even climb up the masts to furl out and stow sails. (Not sure these are the correct nautical terms but you get the gist).

On board were several of these young adults who had joined one of these sailing experiences. I now refer to them young adults as it was very apparent that they were no longer aimless teens with no real purpose or direction in life. They took many opportunities to speak to us, either one-on-one or in small groups telling us about their experiences and the particular role that they were doing at that particular time. How good is it, to see the end product of Rotary effort and support.



RIDE TO CONFERENCE



Our D9500/9520 Conference at Tanunda is now less than 4 weeks away. Last time I sent a notice it was five months out, so you should be fit by now??

Adelaide to Tanunda, via Gawler and Lyndoch is about 80km and mainly a flat ride. A nice comfortable ride if you've done some training.

The ride will start from the car park of the Caledonian Hotel, O'Connell St and Barton Tce, North Adelaide at 6:30am. (Sharp) on Friday 23rd March.

The ride will progress along the bike lane of Churchill Rd then up Churchill Rd North. We will cross over Pt Wakefield Rd to Montague Rd, and proceed up Cross Keys Rd and into the back of Mawson Lakes. Through ML and onto the Shared Path along the back of Parafield Airport. We then cross over Kings Rd and into the back roads of Salisbury Downs, following the rail line. We cross over Salisbury Hwy and then over Waterloo Corner Rd, onto a shared path going under the train line and continue via back streets to cross over Commercial Rd and onto Kettering Rd at the roundabout.

Kettering Rd comes to Goodman Rd, follow this all the way to Elizabeth. Follow Elizabeth Way and left onto Winterslow Rd and then onto Peachy Rd.

This is a pretty good road to ride and goes through Davoren Park to Curtis Rd at Andrews Farm. Left on Curtis Rd will take us out to the Northern Expressway's Stuart O'Grady Bike Track. About 15km on this takes us to Gawler. Follow Two Wells Rd, Ryde St and Overway Bridge Rd to the Gawler Station. Then via Twelth St into Murray St, Gawler for breakfast and a cuppa at Cibo, 77 Murray St.. Probably there about 9:30am

About 10am, from Murray St, take Calton Rd out to Sandy Creek. Calton Rd is a little steep as it leaves Gawler but soon flattens out and takes you onto the Jack Bobridge rail trail and out to Lyndoch. A quick rest stop if you need it.

Lyndoch to Tanunda, just follow the Rail Trail, It does head away from the main road for a bit and there are two little steep bits on this route. Once in Tanunda, then it's a case of just follow your nose to Conference and or your accommodation.

All of the above detail is shown in case some riders want to join the ride along the way.

Anyone who wants to join the Ride to Conference please let me know as soon a possible.

Rotarians Action Group against Slavery

Dear Friends

This month's issue of the RAGAS Newsletter highlights the exploitation of human beings in Malaysia, Australia and the USA. If only these were just isolated incidents!

Sadly, we are living in an era of unprecedented turmoil. Record numbers of people are fleeing wars, persecution and natural disasters, terrorists are lurking on every continent and the international community is grappling with acute migration challenges in regions like the Mediterranean, the Balkans, Africa and the Bay of Bengal. For human traffickers and slave masters, these hardships represent welcome business opportunities and their prime targets for exploitation are the displaced, the very poorest and the most vulnerable human beings on this planet

All over the world, millions of unsuspecting victims are being deceived & transported across regions, countries and continents for their organs, or pressed into armed combat or forced to toil for little or no pay in factories, fields, homes, quarries, restaurants and in the sex trade where they are used and abused and for young girls repeatedly traded on the female used body market where they are passed from man to man like a shared cigarette...used and then all too often stubbed out.

But NIL DESPERANDUM, it seems there is light at the end of our tunnel of doom and gloom. In Malaysia they are creating a special court specifically to protect the victims of exploitation. In Australia moves are afoot to introduce a comprehensive Modern Slavery Act and in the USA many Rotarians are seriously on the move to eradicate human trafficking and slavery in that country.

So much action against contemporary slavery is now being taken in several US states which uplifts the spirit exponentially. For example in last month's issue of the Newsletter we highlighted a significant anti-slavery global grant project in District 5180, California. Read this month Newsletter for up to date information.

Across on the other side of the world, our RAGAS Coordinator in the Philippines, Ernesto Perez shares his dreams and ideas about how to protect the overseas Filipino workers from exploitation.

<u>A plea for information</u>. Chatting with some of you in Atlanta, I realized that there are other clubs/districts which are freshly engaging with similar projects all over the world. If I haven't heard from you already, how about sharing the details of your project with our readers? This email and its regular Newsletter is **initially** going out to over 2,300 Rotarians in 66 countries. I say initially because in many cases, as in my own District, the Newsletter is distributed by the District Secretary, to every club in District. Have you asked your District Secretary to distribute this Newsletter to other clubs?

Just think of the value of sharing information about your club's anti-slavery (or proposed) projects with other readers. Not only would you be giving other readers the opportunity to participate in or help your project, you might also galvanize them to join the struggle in their own regions or countries. Why restrict providing news of the significance and usefulness of your anti-slavery project to Rotarians in your own District or even in your own country?

Raising awareness is crucial because it often leads to action. A couple of years ago, Gary Haugen from IJM reminded Rotarians in Seoul of their responsibilities to tackle this obnoxious crime against humanity. As members of Rotary

The CALPERUM & THE ENVIRONMENT Committee (D9500 & D9520) is pleased to advise that we have achieved our original target of \$12,500 towards creating the

RISELEY FOREST @ CALPERUM

The target was set towards the planting of a minimum of 2,500 trees, shrubs and ground-covers at Calperum as part of our major revegetation program commenced over a decade ago. At the CATE meeting in February it was decided that some experimental plantings with an alternative watering system should be funded, and that this should also become part of the RISELEY FOREST.

Thirty out of 90 Clubs in D9520 and D9500 have to date contributed, but we still need further support for the additional scope of work we have now committed towards, meaning that the total planting will exceed 3,000. We hope Ian Riseley won't object to us exceeding his expectation.

RISELEY FOREST @ EVERYWHERE

In addition to the CALPERUM FOREST to acknowledge Ian Riseley's vision of tree planting around the Rotary world, quite a number of Rotary Clubs are planting a local FOREST, many in conjunction with a local school.

We acknowledge the efforts of innovative initiatives in this regard. One Club plants a tree for each guest speaker this year, another is seeking to beautify the O-Bahn tunnel in the parklands (good luck), and another held a Club working bee at the President's farm to plant the trees he needed as windbreaks.
