Smith Family – General Manger – Guest Speaker at Prospect



Rotary Club of Prospect Guest Speaker last week was Graham Jaeschke, General Manager of The Smith Family, SA & NT who told us of the work organisation. The Smith Family is a children's charity which is helping disadvantaged Australian children to get the most out of their education, so they can create better futures for themselves.

In the last year the work reached more than 127,424 disadvantaged children and their families in 94 communities across Australia, thanks to the support of caring Australians.

Over the five years to June 2016, an average of 82 cents in every dollar of funds raised from individual supporters, corporate partners, universities, trusts and foundations, bequests and through the support received from VIEW Clubs of Australia and governments was spent on our community programs. The surplus from The Smith Family's own Recycling Operation and from other commercial activities (\$1.4 million in 2015-16) helps to offset its infrastructure costs, ensuring that funds raised can be spent as much as possible on programs supporting children and young people in need.

June is Recreational Fellowship Month.

June is designated as Rotary Fellowship Month. Rotary Fellowships are international, independently organized groups of Rotarians, Rotary partners, and Rotaractors who share a common recreational interest or vocation. This month is recognition of the opportunity to have fun, make new friends around the world and enhance the experience of Rotary that belonging to a Rotary Fellowship enables.

Rotary Fellowships began informally in 1928 when a group of Rotarians with an interest in Esperanto joined together. In 1947, Rotarians organized a group of boating enthusiasts, which became the Yachting Fellowship. This joining together to share common interests and activities gained attention and operated over the years under various names as World Fellowship Activities; International Vocational Contact Groups; Rotary Recreational and Vocational Fellowships; and finally Rotary Fellowships.

Benefits of Rotary Fellowships:

- Enables Rotarians to make lasting friendships outside their own club, district or country
- Contributes to the advancement of Rotary's public image and identity
- Serves as an incentive for joining Rotary and for continuing as a member

Community CPR-30

My name is David Glasspool. I am a Paramedic of 22years with SA Ambulance Service (SAAS) and I am now State Coordinator of an exciting project called Community CPR-30. This project is one of 6 projects that has combined and programmed to undertake as a major strategy, approved by Health SA, with the principal goal of improving survivability of persons who experience an "out of hospital, sudden cardiac arrest".

Statistically, the chances of surviving an out of hospital cardiac arrest, (in Australia) are about 20% which compared to overseas figures of around 60-70%, indicates we have some work to do. What we know is that bystanders are reluctant to get involved and CPR is often not commenced, for a variety of reasons such as apprehension, anxiety, misunderstanding, lack of knowledge etc etc. What we also know is that there is an enormous wealth of statistics and studies which overwhelmingly support early defibrillation. Overseas studies have clearly supported the availability of community access defibrillators (AED's) as a critical component in regards to increasing survivability. My role within this work is to engage the South Australian community to participate in short training sessions, free of charge which include "hands-only" CPR and familiarisation with AED activation. Although the program has been operating informally in rural and remote SA for approximately 12 months, SAAS now has approval and funding to officially launch CPR-30 across the State in approximately 8 weeks.

AED's are fast becoming the "priority target" for community fundraising. It is fantastic to see sporting clubs and a variety of other community groups installing these devices, within their facilities. Sadly, these devices often are secured behind closed doors because of concerns regarding theft and damage or the club or venue is only open at particular times of the day or evening and therefore the AED is of no benefit to the community outside of opening hours. I was made aware, this week, that one of our municipal councils rejected 3 community grant applications for AEDs because the devices were going to be placed inside venues that were only open during specific hours. The grants would only be approved if the funding supported a project that would benefit the "entire community". This is very sad.

In a moment of pure coincidence, I realised that if these community groups had gained a grant or had raised funds to purchase an AED, why couldn't they install it somewhere that was open 24 hrs a day that was a well-known landmark. So, I have initiated enquiries with a fast food restaurant chain and a 24/7 petrol/convenience store to seek their support in offering wall-space within their 24hr/7 day facilities across the State, where a Community Access AED can be located. Early access to AED's in a critical step in assisting SA Ambulance and the wider community in its goal to improve survivability for people who experience "out of hospital cardiac arrest". As evidence to support this project I am aware of a fast food restaurant in Melbourne which had installed an AED which was used effectively to save the life of a 15 yr old employee at the restaurant.

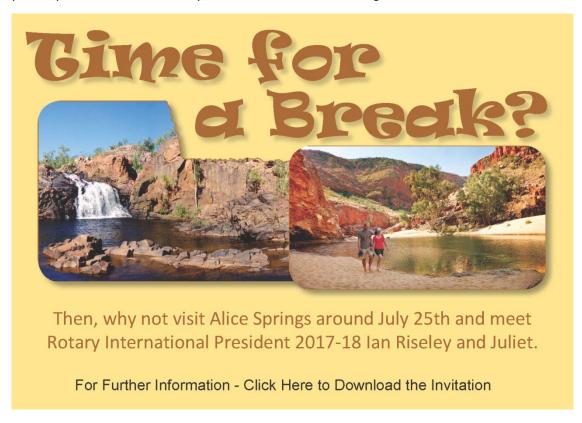
So my request to your organisation is to seek your fundraising abilities to purchase AED's which can then be installed at locations which support this project.

I am very excited about what this proposal can offer to the Community of South Australia and I would welcome the opportunity to discuss this further with any representatives of Rotary Australia as necessary.

SA Engineering Challenge

The previously distributed 2016 Report was noteworthy for several reasons, not least of which were that we held it in the Riverland (Loxton) and Port Lincoln for the first time. Henceforth Pt Lincoln and Whyalla will share it; it's in Whyalla this year (this Thursday) and next year it will be in Pt Lincoln again.

You are no doubt aware it's not exclusive to District 9500. The Mt Gambier Clubs are in a Victorian based District and there are many schools in both 9500 and 9520 which attend. We put it on for 8 schools per day on 6 days in metro Adelaide and at Mt G, Pt P, the Riverland and Whyalla/Pt Lincoln. The schools send along 20 to 30 year 9 and 10 students, the aim being to encourage them to study the STEM subjects through year 12, to equip them to take up maths, science and engineering degrees. Public, Private and Catholic schools all compete. Several girl's schools compete and did very well again last year. So we reach out to about 80 schools and almost 2,500 youngsters (who have a ball!).

The SA Committee has reps from each of the 3 SA Unis on it and it is managed by an Executive Committee of mostly Rotary Club of Adelaide members. Our Club contributes \$5,000 annually towards it but we have to raise around \$100,000 to ensure it happens. A major component of the cost is the amount paid to the Uni of Newcastle which sends two event managers and a huge van full of the materials the youngsters use to undertake the various exercises. This costs in the order of \$7,000 per day.

This year is well underway as I write. 3 days at the Uni of SA @ Mawson Lakes last week, Pt Pirie, Whyalla and Mt Gambier this week and one at the basketball stadium and two at Flinders Uni next week. The Riverland day is scheduled for July 4. The state final will be held at the basketball stadium on Wednesday August 30.
