





From RI Director's News (Zone 8 & 7B July 2016)

The Council on Legislation earlier this year was an extremely progressive event with some decisions potentially changing Rotary for decades to come. To me, this clearly demonstrates Rotary is willing to fit in with Rotarians and not Rotarians having to fit in with Rotary......As we move forward we need to work as "one" Rotary. We are not in competition with each other or any other service organisation. We need to encourage each other and work together to achieve the best possible outcome for our clubs, districts and Rotarians.

It is a major concern for me as I look at the demographics of a majority of our clubs and districts. Our average age is 71 years old and there is a 'limited window of opportunity' to turn this situation relating to aging membership around to ensure a strong and positive future.

We need to become more diverse in our membership. Our clubs must reflect their respective communities. We need younger people of both genders and we need the best possible people to join Rotary. We can't leave these challenging tasks to someone else...

This issue of membership is an urgent one, I cannot emphasise that enough....

Is the 2016 Council on Legislation relevant for your Club?

More from the Director's News....

Every three years, members from around the world gather in Chicago to consider proposed changes to the policies that govern Rotary International and its member clubs. The Council On Legislation (COL) is an essential element of Rotary's governance. This year, the COL was held in April and resolved to give Clubs greater flexibility regarding meeting times and membership rules and requirements, with the aim of making Rotary more attractive to new members and assuring the continued growth and relevance of the organisation.

Some of the major changes which were adopted are:

- clubs allowed to decide to vary their meeting times, whether to meet online or in person, and when to cancel a meeting, provided they meet at least twice a month
- now a simple membership requirement that a member be a person of good character who has a good reputation in their business or com- munity and is willing to serve the community
- a \$4 per year dues increase for next three years to allow RI to improve My Rotary, develop resources so clubs can offer a better membership experience, simplify club and district reporting, improve web- site access for Rotaractors, and update systems to keep Rotary in compliance with changing global regulations.
- a Council on Resolutions will meet annually online to consider resolutions
- Rotaractors will be allowed to become members of Rotary clubs while they are still in Rotaract
- the distinction between e-clubs and traditional clubs will be eliminated.
- a standing committee on membership to be established
- · polio eradication remains a goal of the highest order

These changes are effective from 1st July.



Statistics show that well-informed Rotarians are more likely to remain in Rotary! Does your Club regularly inform members about new initiatives? Has the COL information been shared yet at a Club Assembly? Has the Club discussed how the changes could be used to increase membership?

Rotary Leadership Institute

This internationally recognized course is collaborative in approach and provides opportunities to learn more about Rotary, its structure, its programs and the role and function of Club leaders.

Rotary's strength depends on the quality, education and leadership of its Rotarians. Leadership skills in a voluntary organisation differ from those required in a business environment. Equally, it is difficult, in the busy schedule of most Clubs, to learn enough of the exciting world of Rotary with its over 1.2 million members in over 160 countries.
