WHERE DOES YOUR CLUB FIT?

Statistics from RI Resource Extra, MARCH 2016 VOL 10 No 9

Analysis of club sizes in Zones 7A (Philippines), 7B (New Zealand) and 8 (Australia),

- The average number of clubs in a District in New Zealand is 44 compared to 86 in the Philippines, with Australia having 54 on average.
- There are 99 very small clubs of 10 or less members in Australia (average 4.7 per district), 18 in NZ (3/district) and 37 in Philippines or 3.7 per district.
- There are 4 clubs over 100 members in Australia, 2 in New Zealand and 5 in Philippines.
- The largest club in our zones is Melbourne as the only club with more than 200 members.
- The average club size for New Zealand is 32.2 members; Philippines is 28.2 members and Australia is 26.6.



ROTARY LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE (RLI)

The Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI) is a fast-paced, two-day course offered to build on a Rotarian's leadership skills and increase understanding of Rotary.

Courses are topical, interactive, and geared towards Rotarians who want to be more knowledgeable and effective leaders in their Clubs.

This internationally recognized course is collaborative in approach and provides opportunities to learn more about Rotary, its structure, its programs and the role and function of Club leaders.

Rotary's strength depends on the quality, education and leadership of its Rotarians. Leadership skills in a voluntary organisation differ from those required in a business environment. Equally, it is difficult, in the busy schedule of most Clubs, to learn enough of the exciting world of Rotary with its over 1.2 million members in over 160 countries.

RAY'S TIPS From an article in ROTARY ON THE MOVE (find it on the District 9500 Website)

One of the ideas suggested by PRIP - Trustees Chair Ray Klinginsmith to restore membership numbers was a "Five for One" plan that many clubs have successfully implemented in the past. This is a model for introducing new members on a gradual basis for those clubs that prefer this model.

THE WAY IT WORKS IS:

- The members of a club are divided into groups of approximately five members.
- Each team is asked to identify several prospective members who share the values of Rotary remember it's not a numbers game, we want good people in Rotary who want to do good in the
 world and share the values of our founders.
- The team decides the best person or persons to make the initial contact with the prospective member. Many invite them for a coffee to introduce them to Rotary with one or two of the team attending, while others bring them to a club meeting as a guest. That decision is up to you and your club.
- After time spent getting to know the prospective member, normally two members of the team would invite them to become a Rotarian if they are suitable.



WANT TO REVITALISE YOUR CLUB?

Is your club vibrant? Are members engaged; are club projects meaningful; do you try new ideas; do you need new members?

Find out what members truly think about the club, its projects and its future; give them alternatives to see how they really feel about introducing some flexibility and innovation!

If the answer is 'yes' to any of these questions, conduct an anonymous online survey to collect data focused on YOUR Club for YOUR Board and YOUR members to reflect on what they want.

STEP 1:Contact District Trainer PDG Marie Dorrington (<u>mdorring@bigpond.net.au</u>) for a copy of sample surveys for ideas, then design a survey for YOUR club. The survey will then be set up for you and a link sent to the Club Facilitator to send to members. A hard copy is available for those who do not use a computer.

- STEP 2: All data is collated and sent to the Club to discuss
- **STEP 3**. The data is used to guide the Club towards its goals!

Assistance and support is available throughout the process from a member of the Training Team.
