The Revegetation Project at Calperum Station

With the completion of planting at the 13 Sites by July 2012, the focus shifted to an area called Pipeline. This site is accessed by turning left into the property from the Old Wentworth Road through the gate leading to Pipeline Track, approximately 6 kms from Rotary House. The site is immediately on the left with seven shuttles positioned along a sand ridge roughly parallel to Old Wentworth Road.

During late July, I was shown the site by Carey, an ALT employee, who was doing the preparation work at the site. Carey had positioned 3 of the 7 shuttles. Having not positioned all of the shuttles as expected, he wanted to continue positioning them but there was some urgency to run out some of the irrigation lines and fit the drippers in preparation for a planting group the next week. Over two days, he and I ran out 8 irrigation lines. I had always found this task fairly difficult when there are only 2 people, one person controlling the feed of pipe from the rotating table with the coil of pipe on it while the other pulls the pipe out through the saltbush to the final plant location and then work back towards the shuttle along the line of plant positions, pulling more pipe as needed as the line of plants weaved its way through the saltbush, pinning the pipe to the ground. The plant positions are identified by coloured stakes, different colours for the

The author went to Calperum Station in 2009 on a weekend visit where he was introduced to the diversity of the restoration and conservation project at the station. He was particularly enthused regarding the revegetation part of the project. The success of the planting of the seedlings is not only determined by the seedlings themselves and the weather (rainfall and temperature) but also flooding, grazing by animals, both native and introduced, and introduced weeds among other things.

different species. Sometimes, especially at Pipeline, the stakes were difficult to see because the saltbush was higher than the stakes. After laying the pipe, Carey went back to the shuttle positioning while I inserted the drippers along the lines.



By the end of the week, Carey had installed 5 of the 7 shuttles and we had run out 4 lines of irrigation pipe for each of 2 shuttles and fitted the drippers.

Another task requiring attention at Pipeline was the removal of Match Head weed. Growth of this weed was extensive around a number of both alive and dead trees. I spent a few hours during the week removing as much as I could. The dug up weed was taken back to the office area to dry and then burnt.

Planting of the site began in earnest in August. With help from 2 or 3 from each group of volunteers, Carey ran out the remaining irrigation lines and fitted drippers. The reminder of each group planted. The species planted were the same as the earlier sites, the canopy species being Native Pine, *Callitris gracilis* and Sugarwood, *Myoporum platycarpum*, the sub-canopy being, mainly *Pittosporum augustifolium* and *Hakea leucoptera* and the shrubs being two Wattles the *Acacia ligulata and Acacia nissophylla*, and two Saltbushes *Enchylaena tomentosa* and *Rhagodia spinescens*. By the end of the month, 6 of the shuttles were planted. The Mitcham Club visited in early September, planting the 7th shuttle. Guards were fitted to every plant. Because the site was

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6kms from the homestead, they were partially made in the Woolshed, fitting the shadecloth to the guard material leaving the material flat to ease the transport to the site. At the site the ends of the material was stapled together to form the circular guard. We also completed the Match head weeding. Dr Cale wanted the site completed before the end of September, which was achieved. He had decided to finish planting by September's end because the survival rates of plantings in October were lower than the rest of the planting season.

As stated in earlier articles, the spring of 2012, summer and autumn of 2013 were dry after the two wet years previously. Watering of the plants required frequent watering, much more so than in the two wetter years. This combined with the greater distance from the office, required many more man hours. The shuttles required refilling after each watering, carting the water in a shuttle



mounted on a 6 x 4 trailer pulled by a Toyota Hilux from the office area along Old Wentworth Road. The road condition deteriorated, as usually happens, in the drier conditions, causing increased damage to the trailer. Wheel bearings and axles were replaced on more than one occasion. The refilling of the other shuttles in the system was also still occurring. The task had become equivalent to a full time job for one employee, but actually was shared among the employees. The Rotary Club of Prospect donated the money to provide a new,

more strongly built trailer, which was built by Neil Webber from the Berri Club.

The survival rate of this planting was low. In late April 2013, my wife, Helen and I replaced the dead plants of shuttle 7 and in early May, a replacement of the dead plants of the shuttles 4, 5 & 6 was completed by the Mitcham Club.

I am unaware of the current survival rate. I should ask. I know the shuttles and irrigation lines are still in place. They can be seen from Old Wentworth Road. I hope to go to the site next year to have a look at the plant growth and take some photos. I will take a hoe with me to do some follow up Match Head weed removal.

I do not have any photos from the Pipeline site. Those shown here are general photos from Calperum. *(File Photos inserted by Editor)*
