

MAY IS AUSTRALIAN ROTARY HEALTH MONTH

Supporting healthier minds, bodies and **communities** through **research, awareness** and **education** is the Statement for Australian Rotary Health.

The Australian Rotary Health mission is to create better health for all Australians through improved education and advancements in knowledge through medical research. They support excellence in research in an effort to provide both preventative and curative solutions for a broad range of health conditions.

The Australian Rotary Health vision is to be a catalyst for projects that improve the quality of life for people who are least able to assist themselves.

Australian Rotary Health provides funding into four focus areas, and promotes findings to the community:

1. Mental Health Research

Since the year 2000, Australian Rotary Health has focused its funding on mental health research. In 2012 this focus narrowed to the Mental Health of Young Australians, and in 2013 research projects focusing on the Prevention of Mental Health Disorders were included.

There are three ways we fund mental health research:

- Mental Health Research Grants
- Ian Scott PhD Scholarships
- Postdoctoral Fellowships

2. General Health Research

Australian Rotary Health engages with a variety of funding partners to provide Research Grants and PhD Scholarships. These projects encompass a broad range of general health areas including cancer, heart disease, children's health, motor neuron disease, diabetes and more.

There are two ways we fund general health research:

- Funding Partner PhD Scholarships
- Research Companion PhD Scholarships

3. Indigenous Health Scholarships

These Scholarships support Indigenous students to undertake tertiary training in nursing, physiotherapy, psychology, dentistry and other health related degrees at university. These scholarships help Indigenous students to overcome barriers to tertiary study and qualification.

4. Rural Medical & Nursing Scholarships

Australian Rotary Health provides scholarships for medical and nursing students to undertake placements at a rural and remote health care service. Students experience what these facilities have to offer and provide an incentive for recipients to pursue a career in rural Australia upon graduation.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING TEAM

A Dental focused Vocational Training Team has been selected.

This Vocational Training Team project is very important to the people in Vanuatu, as it will support the oral health of adults and children through curative and educative work in Port Vila and surrounds. The Team is very excited at the prospect of making a real difference in Vanuatu, especially after the devastation of Cyclone Pam.

The VT Team will depart Adelaide on June 13th to visit the Port Vila and surrounding area for 15 days. They will work in clinics, schools and communities to undertake curative and educative dental and oral health care. They will need to take much of their own resources with them to complete their work.

The **Team Leader** is **Dr. Viv Valladares**, a member of the Rotary Club of Elizabeth.

ONLY 938 pairs of new or gently used shoes are required to reach the goal of 8,500 pairs of shoes collected by Rotary District 9500 in the 2014/15 year for Soles4Souls.

ONLY \$3,076.50 to reach the goal of \$8,500 donated by Rotary District 9500 in the 2014/15 year to Soles4Souls.

When I presented my partner's project Soles4Souls to clubs, I never imagined that it would be greeted with so much enthusiasm and support, or that the goal of 8,500 shoes and \$8,500 would be remotely attainable and now with two months to go, it is so exciting to realise it is really possible!



I am therefore requesting ONE MORE HUGE DRIVE (less than 1 pair of shoes and \$2 per Rotarian) from each club in the month of May. Please organise a collection in your

club. I can arrange to pick up shoes from any location.

Shoes and funds can make a positive difference to the lives of others both in Australia and around the world. For example, for every \$50 raised you support the redistribution of 25 pairs of shoes, \$500 supports the redistribution of \$250 pairs of shoes and \$1,000 supports the redistribution of 500 pairs.

In 2015, thanks to the wonderful community who support Soles4Souls:

- 1,500 pairs of shoes were sent to the people of Vanuatu in April following the cyclone.
- 100 pairs of boots gifted to the Australian Refugee Association
- Through Northern Domestic Violence Society in Adelaide, footwear has been provided to women and children in emergency accommodation

ROMAC - ROTARY OCEANA MEDICAL AID FOR CHILDREN

ROMAC MISSION STATEMENT

To provide medical treatment for children from developing countries in the form of life-saving and/or dignity restoring surgery not accessible to them in their home country.

ROMAC's OBJECTIVES

- To provide hope where there is no hope
- To restore dignity to human life
- To save or transform the lives of children from developing countries.
- To provide the best possible medical and surgical expertise.

ROMAC was formed by concerned Rotarians in 1987 and is a program of all the districts of Australia and New Zealand and Rotarians continue to volunteer their time and expertise to run this great program. ROMAC is assisted by many eminent Australian and New Zealand surgeons who usually generously donate their time for the treatment of the ROMAC patients. This humanitarian program has provided over 400 children from more than 20 developing countries in the Oceania region with urgent medical treatment that has saved their lives or given them new hope for a better life.

ROMAC has a Board of five members, plus an operations committee, which includes the Board members and eight other Rotarians responsible for operational activity. For ease of management, Australia and New Zealand is divided into six regions – each with a regional committee which includes representatives from each of the Rotary districts in their region. District 9500 and 9520 is Central Region and is chaired by PDG Alun Hughes (District 9500).

The most recent patients in the Central Region have come from Timor Leste and have been hosted by the Rotary Clubs of Hallett Cove and Burnside. These have been treated in the Adelaide Women and Children's Hospital (AWCH). A 4 year old boy was operated on by surgeons for 7 hours to remove a cancerous tumour from his kidney that saved his life, another boy also from Timor Leste, was treated in the AWCH cranial facial unit. There are many more whose lives have been saved across Australia and New Zealand by heart surgery, from a life of misery due to severe burns and many other ailments.

Central Region's next patient will be arriving in July for treatment in the Memorial Hospital and we are seeking a host Rotary Club and family.



What has the District 9500 Conference in Pt Lincoln and Membership development got in common?

As it turns out - A lot!

Inspiring speakers, great camaraderie, learning more about Rotary, rekindling enthusiasm to be Rotarians to list just a few.

I often speak about having an elevator speech ready for when someone asks you **'What is Rotary.'**

Well, here is a fantastic message / elevator speech for every Rotarian to use whether you attended the Conference or not.

I recently received the message on the right hand side of this page from Keith Abraham who was the Key Note speaker at the recent Rotary Conference in Port Lincoln.

I ask that you distribute this email from Keith Abraham to your family, friends, associates, your social network groups and tell them about Rotary and invite them to visit your Club and invite them to be a Rotarian. I have written a preface to Keith's message that you may also like to use.



If you have read my book or heard me speak, you will know that my personal development journey started when I was invited to attend a Rotary Leadership Program called RYLA. It is one of their youth development programs that has been going for over 50 years for 18 to 28 year olds. Well, 30 years ago I attended my first RLYA as an awardee and over the past 30 years I have been so appreciative that someone believed in me more than I did and provided me with that opportunity.

Over the last 29 years I have been going back almost every year to present a two hour workshop on goal setting, only missing 2 years due to my travels or flooding.

If you have ever watched the movie Sliding Doors, with Gwyneth Paltrow, the story is based on showing two parallels of a life. What if I chose to take this action rather than pursue another path, what would have happened? For me I wouldn't be writing this blog, I would not have written the books I have written, I would never have joined Rotaract or moved to Brisbane, met my loving wife, have two beautiful daughters etc, etc.

If you are not familiar with Rotary, they have an award named after the founder of Rotary International, Paul Harris. To give this award to someone a Club or Rotary District must make a donation of US\$1,000 to the Rotary Foundation, which has been responsible for so many great achievements and virtually ridding the world of polio. In 1990 I was awarded a Paul Harris Fellow by the Rotary Club of Broadwater Southport for my contribution to Rotaract

A couple of weekends ago I spoke to 350 Rotarians from District 9500—which is all of South Australia and part of the Northern Territory—where to my surprise I was awarded another Paul Harris Fellow for the work I do for RYLA. I need to say it is quite unique to receive one award if you are not a Rotarian, which I am not, but to receive two is beyond belief.

Now enough about me, I wanted to share my heart-felt gratitude to Rotary for not only the work they do but the impact they had on my life. I encourage you to go along to a Rotary meeting. Their motto is ... Service Above Self. But there is so much more to Rotary than community service. There will be a club near you that either meet for breakfast, lunch or dinner and I know you are busy, however, the time you give will come back to you tenfold.

If you are aged 18 to 28 get yourself on RYLA, or if your children are this age encourage them to attend - it will be life changing and you will make friends that will stand the test of time.

I am so grateful for all that Rotary has done for me and for this prestigious award, it should be me who is giving the gifts to you.

whole world The has been shocked by the degree devastation caused by the Nepal earthquake on 25th April. The extent of survivor's misery and misfortune is just beginning to be unveiled . **Rotary Australia** World Community Service (ie RAWCS) has 35 varied and ongoing projects there which include orphanages, community health assistance (sanitation, water, education etc), dental schools, eye camps, and agri business development.

Reports from the Project manager are only just becoming available from Rotarians who were (and still are) there, and from those about to return. All need urgent funds only at this stage. All have dedicated Donation links to their projects on the www.rawcs.org.au website – if you search under 'Country' you will find them.
