# OFFICIAL HANDOVER OF THE ROTARY CARE GARDEN AT LANDSBOROUGH



When the Rotary Club of Alexandra Headland wanted to make a difference to the community, they took the advice of Rotary International and instead of brainstorming a project within the club, they went out and asked the Sunshine Coast community service organizations what they would like Rotary to do for them.

The answer was to transform a crisis care house into a home. Specifically, to turn an empty back yard into a welcoming garden where kids could run free and create happy memories at this difficult time in their lives.

This request was discussed among the Sunshine South Cluster clubs, and very soon the clubs agreed that this was something the clubs would do as a cluster, with all clubs contributing – within their capabilities.



And so began a collaboration with the clubs to help bring this \$100,000 dream into a reality.

It was the first time that the cluster had attempted such a large project and so it was a bit of a learning process but soon we had a landscape design, thanks to Sunshine Coast Central Rotary then a Project Manager from Mooloolaba Rotary, Contractors and financial advice from Maroochydore Rotary, Volunteers from Buderim Rotary, while Alex Headland Rotary managed the coordination with the crisis care house carers and took the lead on grant applications.

Soon we were having our first working bee, attracting Rotarians and Rotoractors from the USC club. So for the past months Sunshine Coast Rotarians have been working away on a \$80,000 renovation to create a welcoming garden for the crisis care home.

As the landscaping was finishing and thoughts turned to garden furniture, our friends at Buderim Mens shed helped the project along by making up the garden furniture in their workshops, and Rotarians assembled and painted and oiled on site.

We've had fantastic help through Rotary Connections and our Honorary members, Councilor Rick Baberowski, Sunshine Coast Council, Queensland Community Gambling Fund, Buderim Men's Shed, Peter Hall from Hall contracting, and many donations from contractors, and suppliers we were able to supplement the Rotary District Grant and donations from the Rotary Clubs themselves.

With this help, and with the Rotary connections in the community the work progressed despite some unusual Sunshine Coast wet weather.

Soon, it was time for the official opening and on Friday DG Darryl Issepi and ADG Wendy Gilson handed over the garden to IFYS CEO Tony Pignata and IFYS Business Development Manager, Vicky Meyer.

Finally, a big thank you to IFYS for allowing Rotary on the Sunshine Coast to "make a difference" to the kids who will come and grow and play in this fantastic garden.



# What has happened to kick-start this effort?

- 3. A commemorative Stamp will be issued in 2021 by Australia Post.
- 4. How good will it be to create a legacy by stamping out Trachoma?
- 5. Save The Date! Wednesday, 21 April, 2021. A Grand Event at a world class venue attended by dignitaries and vice-regal representatives, participants from anywhere across Australia/NZ and a rolling program of face to face events in multiple locations!
- 6. A \$1million Global Grant for action within Australia to be done. Ideas

Audacious? Yes, but our history is big and bold when we combine our energies! We are not only celebrating the Centenary of 4 Rotary Clubs but the Centenary of Rotary in Australia and New Zealand. This will create a platform for the next 100 years of Rotary Community Service!

# What is now on the horizon?

- · A web based tool kit for local leaders to inspire local action.

# MAUREEN HILL'S 50TH ANNIVERSARY IN PAPUA NEW GUINEA

On the 7th of July, a normal Sunday afternoon in Madang, a number of people from the Red Cross, Creative Self-Help Centre, representatives from the business community in Madang, friends and families gathered at the Madang Resort & Kalibobo Village's Sugen Aben Park to celebrate the anniversary of an extraordinary woman.

As she sat under the marquee at the Sugen Aben Park, the many people that were drawn to her character, one could easily identify her. Exchanging laughter with everyone at her gathering. Maureen Hill celebrated an anniversary that could never be comprehended to the amount of change that she herself had done to individual Papua New Guineans, remote villages, Institutions, organizations throughout Madang and Papua New Guinea.

"There's a piece of her in all of us," said Sir Peter Barter, the Managing Director of the Melanesian Tourist Services (MTS). MTS and the Melanesian Foundation funded the "liklik hamamas," as described by Sir

Peter. The event was to thank Maureen for 50 years of service to the Madang Community.

Sir Peter said that her involvement in numerous activities included her presidential roles with the Madang Red Cross, Country Women's Association, Lions Rotary Club, Madang Amateur Theatrical Society (MATS), City Mission, Kindergarten long ples, Provincial Council of Women, Child Welfare, most of the Women Association in Madang and her active membership at the Modilon Hospital Board, where she along with Rotary have undertaken major projects to improve the health facilities at the Hospital and extended services to the rural people.

Another worthwhile contribution was to establish the Madang Self Help Centre to assist the disabled, an organization that has operated by raising funds and donations.

Maureen has also been a key member of the Madang Festival Committee and had most recently assisted Leoshina Kariha in the Miss Madang Pageant, who later was crowned Miss PNG and Miss Pacific Islands. "Leoshina has been a shining light for empowerment of women not only in Madang and PNG but now world wide," said Sir Peter.

Despite her age of 82, Maureen keeps fully active in the many organizations that have contributed towards child welfare, women, and the disabled, in fact anyone wanting help. "I know of no other person in PNG that has given so much in a selfless way," said Sir Peter. "I am very proud to call Maureen one of my closest friends, but unlike many people telling her to take it easy, I encourage her to do even more as this is what keeps her going," he said.

Apart from all this, Maureen successfully runs 'Mrs. Hill's Nursery' and has a remarkable memory that stretches decades into the past, names of every child that has attended the nursery for nearly 50 years now-she remembers.

A New Zealander by origin, her story started in an island far from the main towns and cities, "quiet similar to the remote locations here in Papua New Guinea," said Fr. Philip Gibbs, an SVD priest and a staff from the Divine Word University in Madang. "We are the only two Kiwis here in Madang." said Fr. Phil as he gave his acknowledgment to Maureen.

As a child, Maureen Hill's home was at the Island of d'Urville, "coincidentally enough, my island was discovered by the same French explorer that discovered the Astrolabe Bay, Jules Dumont d'Urville," said Maureen with a gleeful smile. "A 12 Hour boat ride to anywhere," as described by Fr. Phil, Maureen Hill was home-schooled by her mother.

Her first knowledge of the 'Island of New Guinea' came from a large world map and a coconut scented soap that had its coconuts extracted from PNG. "I got to know the Island of New Guinea through a soap and a punishment that my mother used when I misbehaved," said Maureen with a tiny laughter in her voice. Recalling her childhood memories, she said that she had to find a country on the map and to name it correctly, "that was the punishment," she said, while showing another smile.

As a young woman, Maureen attended the Nelson's College for girls in New Zealand and then later, becoming a teacher. "I didn't come to PNG yet, I had the opportunity to travel the world," said Maureen.

Through the scholarship from Westpac, the young Maureen Hill travelled and stayed at 122 different countries before arriving in PNG, "yes, like all women, I followed a man here," said Maureen, her smile after her statement was followed by cheering, applause and laughter from the people that were gathered to celebrate her years in Papua New Guinea. The Late Peter Hill, Maureen's husband was also remembered in the celebration, both celebrated for their work in Madang and PNG. "I arrived in PNG, but I couldn't get a job as a teacher so I started sowing," said Maureen. "I used the sowing machine that was given to me as a gift from my parents, I still have that old sowing machine today," said Maureen

with a proud smile.

"One day, my neighbor asked me to look after their child, which I did with great happiness," said Maureen. During the late 1960's, when she arrived in Madang, there were no day-care centers for children; this saw the establishment of the Maureen Hill Nursery School.

"I would like to thank Maureen Hill, for nurturing 2 generations of the Barter family that have gone through your care and education," said Sir. Peter. "My son and my grandkids were all taught how to read and write at her school," he said.

From Pilots, Bank managers to Doctors that are now in the Pacific, "I was surprised to know that most of my little ones are now either flying somewhere in the world or are now doctors in Vanuatu," said Maureen. "I had always wanted my students to stay in Madang," said Maureen with a smile. The Maureen Hill Nursery School in Madang will mark its 50th anniversary on the 20th of October this year as well.

"I don't know why I do what I do, I love to do what I do," said Maureen. "If I was in another country I would have died, thank you Papua New Guinea for keeping me alive," she said as she was applauded again.

Maureen Hill is one of many expatriates that see the beauty in Papua New Guinea, "people like us choose to stay here, it is the work that keeps us alive," added Sir Peter with a smile

# POLIO MOVIE EVENT "RIDE LIKE A GIRL"



This year's Polio Movie Event is looking like another blockbuster and promises to be an excellent polio fundraiser for your clubs.

The movie is Ride Like a Girl, the story of Michelle Payne – the first female jockey to win the Melbourne Cup. Take a couple of minutes to check the trailers... I think you'll be inspired!

One of the key factors about Ride Like a Girl (RLAG) is that it's a movie for the whole family – from boys and girls through to seniors. It has a great message about the power of tenacity.

In Australia, the movie will be released to the public on Thursday 26 September.

In New Zealand, it will be released on Thursday 24 October.

However we've arranged for Rotary Clubs to have the opportunity to hold pre-release screenings in the three weeks prior to public release. These Rotary events can be held any day of the week but we expect that a popular option will be family screenings on a weekend. The movie also provides an opportunity for clubs to engage with their communities, so gala events are another great option, perhaps with a horsey theme. Some clubs (or club groups) might choose to hold more than one event. (Please note that the pre-release is not exclusive to Rotary.)

Like last year, we will be providing marketing materials, such as templates for creation of brochures and posters. However we would encourage you to tell your clubs about the event now, to give them time to make the arrangements. They will need to decide what timing works for them, perhaps work with other clubs in their vicinity, decide whether they want to do more than just the screening (eg, cocktails in the foyer), and of course promote their event to their networks, etc.

Clubs will also need to make arrangements with their local cinema. There is no pre-defined deal and the clubs will need to negotiate this with the cinema. A typical arrangement might be a cost of \$10 paid to the cinema, with a ticket price of \$20, but this varies by location. Cinemas are not obliged to participate however most will welcome the opportunity to fill their theatre and gain word- of-mouth publicity for the movie.

By the way, the director of RLAG is Australian actress, Rachel Griffiths, the lead actor is Kiwi Sam Neill and Michelle Payne is played by Teresa Palmer. # HEALTH BENEFITS OF BELONGING TO A GROUP

# Would you, your family, friends and colleagues like a long, healthy and happy life?

If so, being a member of a Rotary Club is one of the best ways to ensure it. This was the message at a Membership Development evening on 15 May, hosted by the Rotary of Brisbane, where Prof Alex Haslam of the University of Queensland presented the results of his team's world leading research on the benefits of belonging to at least one group and preferably two or even three. The mental and physical health benefits are even greater in groups where you meet new people and where the group is involved in community support projects, be they local or international. How great is Rotary in satisfying these criteria?

Despite community perceptions to the contrary, the research, some of which is generously funded by Australian Rotary Health, shows that the mental and physical health benefits of belonging to a group are at least as important as giving up or not smoking and significantly more important than exercise, physical activity, low alcohol consumption and maintaining a healthy weight. If you are over 50 and you join one social group today you will cut your risk of being diagnosed with depression in the next two years by 24%. With every group membership that you lose after retirement, your quality of life declines by 10%, and your life expectancy reduces by about 3%

There were 15 Rotarians from 3 different clubs, and 29 non-Rotarians, present on the evening and a very lively question time was a good indication of the great interest, even excitement, at Prof. Haslam's message. The latest (19/6/19) R.I. Membership Minute on "ideas for strengthening membership" begins with "prospective members join Rotary for local and international service as well as personal and professional development".

"Service before self" has always been an important Rotary ideal. In order to give the best service we must be physically and mentally healthy and Prof. Haslam's message is that regular participation in Club activities is very valuable in this regard. These benefits to membership of a Rotary Club have generally not been promoted or even realized but the evidence is now there that they should be high on the list when we are talking to prospective members. We must also ensure that our Club's culture is a friendly welcoming one and I am pleased to finish this report with a quotation from the article by Zoe Bellamy of the Rotary Club of The Ponds, NSW, published in Dec/Jan issue of "Rotary Down Under"-"It should be the duty of each and every one of us to look out for each other and extend the care to those in our communities. Friendship is contagious. So is kindness. Build your clubs on these foundations and who wouldn't want to join".

# THE SECOND BEST KEPT SECRET IN D9600

Rotary is on the cusp of eradicating of polio from the planet following the pivotal leadership of our own Sir Clem Renouf. Although this world-changing achievement (so close to being finalised) is no secret to Rotarians, too few of the public are aware of this great gift of Rotary to the world.

The second best-kept secret is the enormous impact Rotarians Against Malaria (RAM) has made in significantly reducing this debilitating, deadly disease from our part of the world. Worldwide, there are still 216 million cases of malaria annually, nearly 450,000 of them resulting in death, particularly pregnant women and children under five years old. Malaria remains a critical disease in our part of the world, despite significant improvements due to RAM.

RAM has reduced deaths due to malaria by more than 30% in PNG, the Solomon Islands and Timor Leste through the distribution of 12 million insecticide-impregnated bed nets over the past decade, now in its fourth replacement cycle. In addition, RAM is 'Chasing Malaria' to eliminate the disease in low incidence areas through surveillance, testing and treating all cases, including those where no symptoms appear. Efforts are made to reduce mosquito habitats by introducing fish to feed on mosquito larva, insecticide spraying and educating school children about malaria.

In the early days, RAM was funded by small donations of \$2 by all Rotarians, for which we were given a small RAM sticker for our membership badges. Subsequently, the Global Fund funded most of the RAM operations but, unfortunately, that funding is drying up and there is a need, once again, for Rotarians to help fund our biggest health challenge, after Polio eradication - the eradication of malaria. We also have the challenge in funding the exciting development of a malaria vaccine at Griffith University, and essential tool needed to eradicate malaria from the world. What a wonderful legacy it would be for Rotary to eradicate both polio and malaria, all through initiatives originating in local Rotary Districts (primarily 9600, and 9640) for the malaria vaccine project).

An Urgent Need to fund RAM Initiatives in 2018-2019, only three Rotary Clubs in D9600 (Hamilton, Redcliffe Sunrise and Toowong) plus a private donation from Brendale made contributions to the RAM General Fund. We should hang our heads in shame at this lack of support for one of the most successful humanitarian projects in our part of the world. RAM has reduced the incidence of malaria dramatically, contributing to better lives in PNG, The Solomon Island, Timor Leste, and elsewhere. The battle against malaria is not over. There is still much to do. Each club is asked to contribute \$500 annually to the RAM general fund to eradicate polio. A modest contribution from Rotary Clubs of \$500 each year will help Rotary's dream of a better world – a world where malaria does not continue to ruin the lives of over 200 million people each and every year.

# THE PATH TO PEACE THROUGH GENDER EQUALITY



The horrifying outcomes of war in Africa motivated former Kenyan occupational therapist, Mohamed Sheikh Yussuf, to change career paths and study at The University of Queensland.

Mohamed will leave UO's School of Political Science and International Studies as a Master of Peace and Conflict Studies, which he plans to use to help stop violence at the source, rather than treating the end result in UNHCR-run refugee camps.

"I used to get satisfaction in rehabilitating my clients to be independent again, but I was enraged by the senseless maiming of innocent civilians and used to think about what I should do to halt, or at least limit the devastating impact of these conflicts," he said. "Like they say in public health, prevention is better than cure, meaning it's cheaper to engage in conflict resolution than responding to devastation wrought by conflict in loss of limbs, lives and properties."

"The gruelling rehabilitation process of these individuals used to take a toll on me. It's on this basis that I finally decided to take a detour from my

profession and that is how I ended up being a Rotary Peace Fellow."

While studying at UQ, Mohamed was inspired by the classes of Associate Professor Nicole George and decided he wanted to work in gender empowerment. "I belatedly realized I am a feminist, and want better treatment for our women folk," he said.

"Growing research indicates that societies that treat their women well tend to be stable societies where meaningful economic development can be realized because there is peace. I am more passionate than ever before about formulating pro-active gender equity policies for peace and prosperity's sake."

As he winds up his studies in Brisbane, he has already decided his next step in the path to peace. "After graduation I intend to go back home and continue working for Garissa Mediation Council, in building peace, justice, dignity and respect for women."

Garissa Mediation Council is a community-based organisation founded in 2005 to foster dialogue and cohesion among communities occupying the volatile areas that straddle the borders of Kenya, Ethiopia and Somalia. Mohamed said he realised achieving change would take time, but he had big plans. "I hope to achieve many things like being involved in the eradication of female genital mutilation and allowing girls to go to school instead of being married too soon. I am immensely grateful to have been awarded a scholarship by The Rotary Foundation to study for my master's degree. I believe it gives me the special skills, knowledge and experience to become an all-round peace maker both at the local and international level."

# **TIB TEAM REPORT 2018-19**

The major focus of the team members has been in 2 areas:

- · Expand sales and distribution through promotion, and
- Building and developing the IT infrastructure, capacity and reporting to support a wider network.

Highlights for the year:

- The IT team completed an upgrade of the server infrastructure to speed up processing and support further development.


