

RAWCS and RNZWCS have established a working group which meets regularly to further develop a cooperative approach to supporting Rotary humanitarian projects in the Zone 8 region. The organisations are committed to working collaboratively, sharing information and expertise to further the object of Rotary.

Procedures have been established to register projects for each World Community Service in the jurisdiction of the other agency to enable tax deductable donations to be received and applied. RNZWCS established an appeal project in New Zealand to fund Bushfire recovery in Australia and RAWCS has registered the Emergency Response Kits (ERKs) project to support disaster victims in the Pacific through RNZWCS. Donations can be received by both agencies to support ERKs distribution to Cyclone Harold damaged areas.





REPORT 17th MAY 2020 RAWCS Southern Region Coordinator - PDG Ken Moore

The Annual RAWCS Planning Workshop was conducted at Ciloms, Tullamarine, in January and involved the National Board and representatives from all five regions. This was obviously earlier than in past years and this was because the National Board felt that there was a need to review how the implementation of the strategic directions set last year were going.

The workshop was conducted on the Saturday and Sunday and was a mix of learning, reviewing the past 12 months and setting tasks for the next year. The weekend was focused on:

- understanding RAWCS; where and how it got to where we are now;
- where we are going and why;
- allocating tasks for 2020 and beyond; and
- setting timelines to get it all done.

One of the key learnings of the past year was that RAWCS as a whole needs to do much more by way of communication, especially selling the merits of engaging with RAWCS at Rotary Club level. This will come as no surprise to many of you as this has been the sort of thing that has discussed on a number of occasions at regional level. And we have all heard the feedback from some areas that it is difficult to see the merit or benefit of setting up a project under the RAWCS banner when it is seemingly just as easy for a club to go it alone.

So there is a disconnect that the workshop sought to address and the five regional coordinators as a team have been tasked with basically answering the question "What do individual Rotary clubs need from RAWCS?"

The coordinators have come up with a plan aimed at increasing club engagement with RAWCS and initially we are going through the process of identifying those clubs that are not active with RAWCS and finding out why that is the case.

Once that stage is completed the RAWCS communications team will be engaged to develop generic information materials for webinars, videos, newsletters and the like, making sure that we are communicating a consistent message regarding RAWCS capabilities and how clubs can be supported by RAWCS.

So watch this space and please don't hesitate to provide constructive feedback.







Construction and Installation – Baguia Sub-district, Timor Leste 32 Water Tanks and 4 Toilet buildings & WASH Training

2017 - 2020 Global Grant Number: GG 1868328 RAWCS registration: 54-2017-2018

Background

During the 3 year period of this program from its conception in 2017 to its recent completion in 2020, the individual office bearers of the various Rotary Clubs involved have changed and for this reason our Final Report is presented in the format of an **Introduction** and a **Conclusion** followed by the four (4) individual **Team Reports**, so that those without previous knowledge of the program can gain an understanding of how the program was conducted and what has been achieved.

This project was developed by a group of Melbourne based Rotary Clubs comprising:-

• RC Camberwell • RC Chadstone • RC Glenferrie • RC Hawthorn • RC Malvern • RC Prahran

Various financial amounts were pledged by the above-named Rotary Clubs and applications were made for grants from District 9800 and The Rotary Foundation as well as registering the project with RAWCS. The Rotary Club of Camberwell acted as the program's "International Club" and the Rotary Club of Dili Lafaek as the "Host Club".

To ensure the long-term sustainability of such projects The Rotary Foundation has made it a requirement of their Global Grants scheme that any "WASH" Training be provided by approved in-country Providers. This increased the cost of the project but the inclusion of WASH Training has proved very fortuitous as the Handwashing component of this training has been put to good use by the schools and local communities to reduce the spread of the COVID 19 Virus.







Final report conclusion

The need for clean water and sanitation in this mountainous area of Timor Leste is very great and it is with pride and pleasure that we advise of the completion of this programme and the full expenditure of its AUD \$139,150 Budget, which comprised donations of totalling \$72,000 from the six Rotary Clubs in this Consortium, a 9800 District Grant of \$10,000 a Global Grant from The Rotary Foundation of \$48,681, donations through RAWCS of \$2,733 and personal donations of \$5,736 from private individuals. Four (4) Team Visits were made to the region by Rotarians and other volunteers during the course of the project and copies of their four (4) individual reports are enclosed at the end of this Final Report.

It is very pleasing to note that construction of the last 3 Toilet Buildings was carried out completely by locals, using materials and local skilled/semi-skilled labour paid for by the Consortium. This work involved digging stone and concrete lined effluent Pits, laying concrete Toilet floors with inset squat toilets and building concrete block walls and Colorbond roofs.

The Water Tanks were installed on stone and concrete tank stands and fed with clean water from either nearby springs or from gutter and downpipe systems installed on nearby school roofs with the majority of this work at the end of the project being carried out entirely by locals.

"WASH" Training was originally provided by the Dili based Timor Foundation but they were not able to provide onsite training in the more remote hill villages and this work ended up being provided by a local doctor from the Baguia community Health Centre which worked well.

Message from the Chair

Spring has arrived at last! (In the southern hemisphere).

Incorporating Learn+Grow

It is wonderful to see my snow peas, beetroot, lettuce and kale all smiling at me, not long before I can pick them. I will enjoy being able to take leaves off the lettuce and the kale and being able to make a nice salad with beetroot and tomatoes. I will share these vegetables with my neighbours and they share their potatoes, carrots and zucchini with me. Sadly many people do not know how to grow their own food.



On the way home from the nursing home my husband is in, I heard a report about food security in Australia. In the last 12 months, more than one in five Australians (21%) have been in a situation where they have run out of food and have been unable to buy more. That is the equivalent of five million people in Australia. The report explained that there are many groups helping by providing food boxes etc., but we need to do more. That is a great short term fix but it doesn't solve the long term problem. I started thinking about how many people in areas in which we live, have this problem. Perhaps as well as food parcels, we give each family a small portable garden bed (or pots), and then instigate a workshop to teach people how to grow their own food using a planting guide for the area. Rotary Clubs could work with community and neighbourhood centres to facilitate this process. And, they could use our Fresh Food for Families model, which can be downloaded from our website - https://foodplantsolutions.org/wp-content/uploads/2019/01/Fresh-Food-for-Families-report-v12.pdf.

This approach shouldn't be limited to Australia but is applicable to anywhere in the world where food security is an issue.

The cost per Rotary Club would be small, and the impact and enjoyment we have had from facilitating the workshops for new Tasmanian's has been fabulous. The outcome in all cases is that families are now starting to grow their own vegetables and enjoying eating them as well. This surely would show that "Rotary Connects the World", as we work in many other countries facilitating the same process with success.
