Funds raised during the week will go towards the provision of all-ability play equipment in Spencer Park, Merimbula. 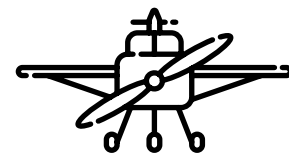

commercial flight or driving with friends. Hundreds of events have been held over the years in many of the 60 countries in which Flying Rotarians reside. In a vast country like Australia, where the distances are great and town centres remote, IFFR pilots have used their aircraft to help with aero-medical aid, such as Angel Flight, or by offering transportation help in other emergencies; and in doing so advancing Rotary's public image and identity. A recent global initiative has been to hold meetings during which young people are introduced to the wonderful world of aviation; hence the
