Interact Conference:

This years Interact Conference was held on October 27th at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Greentree. Over thirty clubs from schools in the suburbs and inner city of Pittsburgh attended. The attendees met to confer about the actions and means of improving their individual Interact services as well as help new clubs start up.

After a quick breakfast, the conference began with the current student District Governor welcoming all attendees and saying the pledge and a prayer. Interact conference chair, Sue Kelly, was introduced as well as other representatives of the local Rotary Districts. They explained the history and mission of Rotary club and also how they decided to branch out and start organizations with the same purpose at the middle school, high school, and collegiate level. Rotary's first project was buying a horse for a country doctor c 1905, and from then on has accumulated over 1.2 million members and 35,000 clubs. The biggest success of Rotary and its branches was essentially eradicating the Polio disease from the World.

Next on the conference agenda came a speaker named Darren Miller. He talked about his passion for completing the feat of swimming all the notorious channels of the world. Darren explained to us about what he learned through accomplishing his adventure and rising above all of its trials and tribulations. He focused on the points of using one's passion to help others, taking a step into the unknown, and waking up everyday appreciative of the breath one gets to take. Throughout his motivational presentation, he explained the 'Hardening Process of Life" that applies all previously mentioned points into the challenge to "do something each and every day that you don't want to do". By avoiding the noise and being dedicated to the challenge, one will be successful. He defined success not as the size of the pocketbook, but rather how one impact and helps people through. After the nominations for the new Student District Governor were made and presented, the assembly split into groups to rotate between rooms. The rooms had a variety of different information available. One room was devoted to explaining Rotary's Foreign Exchange program. Six students from countries including France, Belgium, Brazil, Spain, Venezuela, and Denmark were introduced earlier that morning and then had a chance to explain their journey, sponsored by Rotary. Another room displayed the opportunity to go to the RYLA leadership camp this summer and meet new students and develop confidence as well as leadership skills.

The next couple areas were available for spokes persons from a dozen different benefactory programs to speak on behalf of their mission and help Interact clubs get involved. These projects ranged from Volunteering with Animal Friends, to Global Links (a medical supplies collection), to the Shelter Box, to Shoes to Nicaragua. The last station was similar to a round table for students from a plethora of schools talk openly about the successes and struggles of their clubs back home. This provided a great way to hear even more new ideas for events and start joint projects with apt clubs.

Following lunch, the announcement of the winner for the new Student District Governor and the assistant position was made. The conference ended after further information for the workings of Rotary was discussed then everyone boarded their buses to head back to school.

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TJ Updates

This year's Interact Board members are: Alexandra Downer, President; Jessica Taylor, Vice President; Audrey King, Secretary; Cole Majernik, Treasurer; Avery DeGruttola, Junior advisor. The Club is sponsored by TJHS English teachers Denise Breisinger and Deneen Loughran. After being on hiatus last year, the group re-organized to attend the Annual District 7300 Interact Conference in October. This newly organized 50 member group has actively volunteered with Hundred Acres Manor, TJHS fall play, Pleasant Hills Library holiday activities, TJHS Veterans' Day Ceremony, and WJHSD Curriculum Night/8th Grade Orientation.

Additionally, the TJHS Interact group has been involved in two service projects. They chose a November Food Drive to benefit the Greater Pittsburgh Food Bank as a short term community-based service project. Inspired by a presentation at the District Conference, they have chosen to raise funds for a ShelterBox as their long term global service project. One can read more about the ShelterBox at http:// www.shelterboxusa.org/ where it states that the organization "delivers emergency shelter and other lifesaving supplies to help families begin to rebuild their lives after losing their homes and possessions following a natural disaster or humanitarian crisis." A ShelterBox usually contains a family tent, water filter, blankets, cooking and eating utensils, tools. children's activity pack, mosquito net, etc. To raise the \$1,000 needed to support one ShelterBox kit, the Club has chosen two primary methods. First, administration has generously permitted them to collect \$2 per faculty member on Dress Down Fridays. Secondly, the Interact members have signed a "Water Bottle Dime Pledge." They have agreed to fill empty regular sized (half liter) throwaway water bottles with dimes: a bottle full of dimes results in \$100. Their goal is to combine funds from the filled water bottles with those from the teachers' Dress Down Days to support at least one ShelterBox by May 1. Once the funds have been submitted to ShelterBox, the Interact Club will be assigned a box number which will allow them to see where their box was delivered (track the box). The Club is responding to and raising awareness of the needs within their local community as well as considering those around the globe.

The TJHS Interact Club is honored to be guests at the Pleasant Hills Rotary Lunch on Tuesdays. November Rotary Students of the Month were Jessica Taylor and Avery DeGruttola; December students were Alexandra Downer and Alexa Uhlyar; January Students were Audrey King and Kelcie Stachtiaris. The Rotary, too, has supported the selection of ShelterBox for the long term project.

CVHS Interact Club also held two **holiday** food drives at Thanksgiving and Christmas time. All food items and canned goods were donated to Bethany Presbyterian Church Food Bank in Bridgeville. The food bank supports many local families in our district and surrounding area.
