DISTRICT 7300 MEMBERSHIP ENGAGEMENT COMMITTEE UPDATE

On Saturday, 9 February 2019, Presidents Elect, Membership Chairs, and interested Rotarians from Districts 7300 and 7330 (hereinafter D7300/D7330) participated in a Membership Summit to maintain, strengthen and increase club memberships. The merger will create District 7305 (D7305). Clubs, whether large, medium or small have their distinct cultures and dynamics. What works successfully, for one club, does not necessarily work for another. Bridging the gap and facilitating new models of membership recruitment and other approaches, were facilitators AG Dennis Piper—and me.

DG Singh Ajmani (D7300) and DG Cherie Sears (D7330) opened the Summit with welcoming remarks and engaging dialogue. After Dennis and I shared what would unfold, videos and power point presentations allowed interaction to begin. Due to the length of time available, two thirty minute breakout sessions were offered to focus on each the following.

- 1. <u>Women's Engagement (WE)</u> Led by WE Chair Kelli Robbins, the group discussed the recent WE launch (**yes, men are welcome**) and how supportive it was towards engaging Rotarians wanting to increase growth and participation of Rotary women.
- 2. <u>Young Professionals</u> Led by Ethan Nicholas, this session focused on effective campaigns that draw in community leaders; and discussed having an effective speaker's program that draws in prospective members of all ages. Ethan's company has offered to manage a mailing campaign, if interested clubs provided names and addresses.
- 3. <u>Diversity</u> Led by Genevieve Odour and Robin Zoufalik, the group shared methodologies for inviting diverse cultures, genders, professionals and civic organizations to participate with various community outreach programs by Rotary clubs.
- 4. <u>Club Health</u> Led by Dennis Piper, this discussion focused on online tools and programs rotary.org offers to support how each club can strengthen and grow membership. Sincere assessment of a club's present culture and dynamics guides forward motion to strengthen and grow clubs.

Closing remarks were given by our upcoming D7305 leadership team, DGE Jim Hahn who introduced DGN AI Delucia and DGND Vince Costa, with all sharing their positive excitement as D7300 and D7330 merge to form D7305 on 1 July 2019.

ROOF INSULATION PROJECT IN SAN PEDRO, BELIZE

When Rotary Club of Pittsburgh members Richard Dixon, Karl Ohrman, and Al Wells (together with their wives Harvette, Ruth and Mimi, respectively) returned to Pittsburgh this month from a winter escape to Belize, it became clear to everyone that they had not merely been on vacation ... the team, together with White Oak Rotary and Ambergris Key Rotary in Belize, just accomplished an important renovation product on behalf of local school children (photo gallery next page)--the insulation of ten school roofs within the Holy Cross School in San Pedro, Belize, a school that serves five hundred students. Keep reading, and in minute you just might think about roof insulation in a whole new way.

The next time you are in, say, Houston Texas in, say, a BIG LOTS or some other cavernous establishment, look up at the interior roof. Do you see all that heavy insulation up there? Yes, you do, and then, if you are from the Northeast U.S. and you have not had the realization before, you will next go through the thought process, "Why is there that much insulation up there?" because "It never snows down here in Texas," and then you will have the realization, "OHHHHH, that insulation is up there to keep the HEAT OUT!"

This same sun-baking-the-roof phenomenon is what motivated the renovations at the school in Belize. Belize can get very warm, and uninsulated zinc roofs turn the space underneath into hot, sun-powered ovens. Ending in February of this year, the cooperating Rotary Clubs retrofitted ten (10) zinc classroom roofs, not only to provide interior ceilings--and lights and ceiling fans and so forth--but to insulate the space between the zinc roof and the ceiling. The reduced temperature in the school rooms, as a result of this renovation and insulation, is dramatic. If you refer to the picture gallery, next page, in the photo encaptioned "BEFORE INSULATION," you can see a typical example of one of the ten zinc roofs that were insulated and finished during this project. On the right, "AFTER INSULATION," you will also see how the finished classroom looks. What you cannot feel--but you can imagine--is the mercifully lower heat in the room, and of course the visuals are much improved, too. Let the (comfortable) learning begin anew!

Rotarians know how to celebrate, also, so not only did they have a chance to break bread together (next page, bottom right) they enjoyed a round of applause from school children in their newly refitted classroom (next page, top right).


