

PEACEBUILDER CLUB STANDARDS

Purpose of becoming a Peacebuilder Club

- Implement and promote Rotary International's Peace and Conflict Resolution Area of Focus in your club;
- Address the growing problem and danger of divisiveness and polarization that fractionalizes and stagnates societies, disrupts peaceful relations, and increases the potential for violence;
- Build stronger, more harmonious communities and a more peaceful world;
- Help Rotarians maximize the peacebuilding impact of every Rotary project in all 6 of RI's Areas of Focus;
- Assist in the accomplishment of Rotary's mission to 'enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace".

Organization and Training

Every Peacebuilder Club shall have a Peacebuilding Committee made up of at least two people;

Each member of the Committee is encouraged to take 20-20 minutes to read Your Piece of Peace – A Peacebuilding Primer for Rotarians found at www.rotarianactiongroupforpeace.org. Click on "Peacebuilder".

The Committee is encouraged to:

- 1. Help build the momentum and impact of peacebuilding in Rotary by joining and/or supporting the Rotarian Action Group for Peace;
- Complete online training in the 8 Pillars of Positive Peace available through the Rotary Positive Peace Academy at <u>http://rotarypositivepeace.org</u>;
- 3. Become familiar with all resources available on the Rotarian Action Group For Peace website at <u>www.rotarianactiongroupforpeace.org</u>. Click on "Resources";
- 4. Invite 1-2 Committee members to participate in the monthly District 5500 Peacebuilder Network.

Committee Responsibilities

Educate and empower Rotarians and members of your community to support peacebuilding principles and strategies by:

- 1. Encouraging them to read Your Piece of Peace A Peacebuilding Primer for Rotarians;
- 2. Conducting club training regarding principles of peacebuilding utilizing principles from the *Primer*, the Rotary Peace Academy, and other sources;
- 3. Helping them recognize that Club projects that address any of the RI 6 Areas of Focus contribute to building stronger and more peaceful communities;
- 4. Reporting regularly to club members on all club peacebuilding activities.

Engage Rotarians, Rotary Peace Fellows, Interactors, Rotaractors, and others in your area in peacebuilding action by:

 Sponsoring at least one club peacebuilding activity every year. An example is one that introduces peace curricula in local schools, clubs, and youth groups. Raise your club's Profile

- 1. At least once a year, do something to increase public awareness of Rotary's peacebuilding power and activities. Examples include planting a Peace Pole, sponsoring a community Peace Conference, or conducting a Peace-art or Peace-video competition at a local school;
- 2. Increase awareness of the Rotary Peace Centers and the Peace Fellow Program. Engage club members to identify qualified candidates for a Peace Fellowship.
