## Section 1. Grants.

Grants are available to Rotary Clubs and Rotaract Clubs.

**1.A. District Grants.** We Rotarians are always looking for ways to leverage our projects. A District Grant does just that. Your club can receive a 2:1 match for your financial contribution to a local or international project up to a total of \$6,000, depending on your club's level of giving to The Rotary Foundation, from our District.

**1.B. District Grants, District Scholarship Grants and Rotaract/Interact Grants.** There are several additional grants well worth considering.

District Grants: Rotary and Rotaract Clubs wishing to apply for a District grant must be contributing \$50 or more per capita to The Rotary Foundation Annual Fund to be eligible for a \$3,500 grant

District Scholarship Grant: District Grants can be used for an undergraduate scholarship for a student who has demonstrated interest in one of Rotary's seven areas of focus or for RYLA scholarships. \$1,000 max including the 2:1 total.

Rotaract/Interact Grants: Rotaract and Interact Clubs can apply for a Rotaract/Interact grant limited to \$300 per grant. The District will match club funds 2 for 1 up to this limit.

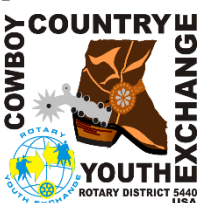
**1.C. Global Grants.** A Global Grant takes the grant process to a whole new level. If you have an international project, an international partner Rotary club, and a project costing \$30,000 or more, you can apply for a Global Grant. The process is not complicated but does have more steps than a District Grant. ## Section 2. Youth Programs.

Your Rotary club can sponsor youth through a variety of life changing programs.

**2.A. Youth Exchange.** Your District has, for many years, offered yearlong and summer exchanges for interested students. With a yearlong exchange your club can sponsor and send a student to one of many qualified countries for a 9-12 month academic exchange. Your club would be responsible for sponsoring

the outbound student and provide hosting for the inbound student at club member homes or qualified members of the community. For those students who cannot commit to a full year, the summer exchange program offers a family to family exchange opportunity to many qualified countries around the globe. Since the families do reciprocal hosting, your club would interview and sponsor the outbound student. Hosting of students by club members is not required. **2.B. Rotary Youth Leadership Award (RYLA).** This weeklong leadership experience is offered to seventh grade students through Young RYLA and high school juniors and seniors through RYLA. For students with special needs, RYLA Plus provides a one day leadership experience in a specialized, accessible location. This year, our District will offer two Young RYLA sessions, one in June and one in July 2025. RYLA will offer a one week session in June 2025. RYLA and Young RYLA sessions are hosted at the YMCA of the Rockies just outside of Estes Park, Colorado. RYLA Plus will be a one day event offered in the Easter Seals' Rocky Mountain Village in Empire, CO in partnership with District 5450. If you wish to sponsor one of more students, your club would interview and pay tuition for your selected students. ## Section 3. Training

Your District offers a variety of training for all aspects of Rotary. District 5440's annual calendar includes both training sessions and unique events to enhance your Rotary experience. Training not only increases understanding of Rotary and its initiatives, but also develops leadership skills and fosters community impact. Our unique events include time to learn more about this wonderful organization and the opportunity to build lasting friendships with others who share the same heart for serving the world.

**3.A. Presidents Elect Training Seminar (PETS).** A Rotary club president has many responsibilities. PETS training, a three day comprehensive overview club operations and leadership, is offered each year prior to the start of your term as club president. Whether it is your first term as president or a second or third opportunity to lead your club, PETS will give you the tools and practices to better serve your club. You

**3.B. District 5440 Conference.** Each year your District holds a District Conference. This year's District Conference is known as the Innovation Summit. There is no better way to renew Rotary friendships, experience outstanding fellowship and receive useful training than the District Conference. The 2025 Rotary District 5440 Conference will take place from June 5-7, 2026 in Fort Collins, Colorado. The annual District Conference offers something for every Rotarian. **3.C. District Assemblies.** Your District offers two District Assemblies each year. Whether in person or virtual, these District Assemblies offer information on District opportunities, training for club officers, tasty food, and fellowship. The District Assemblies are held in the fall and spring at a central location or virtually. They typically last one day. **3.D. Rotary Learning Institute (RLI).** RLI offers all Rotarians an opportunity to learn about the evolution of Rotary and its activities in the world. At RLI you will discover leadership strategies for your club, work, or other volunteer activities by participating in interactive discussion. Best of all, you can fulfill one of the key purposes of Rotary by networking with Rotarians from across the District.

If you have already attended, please personally invite a club member you believe would benefit from joining RLI. The overriding goal of this course is to create enthusiasm for Rotary by experiencing the world of Rotary outside of their own club. RLI also emphasizes the potential of Rotary service for the benefit of the world that can be furthered with excellent leadership in our clubs.

Graduates of RLI bring an enhanced background in Rotary when they serve in their club or represent Rotary in their community. **3.E. Grants Training.** If you have not yet applied for and received a grant, as described above in Section 1, you are missing an outstanding opportunity to fund local and international projects and award scholarships to selected students. Grants training will provide you with the essentials you need to apply for and make beneficial use of District and Global Grants. ## Section 4. Education and Scholarships

**4.A. Rotary Peace Fellowships.** Each year, Rotary selects up to one hundred individuals from around the world to receive fully funded academic fellowships at one of our peace centers. These fellowships cover tuition and fees, room and board, round-trip transportation, and all internship and field-study expenses.

In just over a decade, the Rotary Peace Centers have trained more than nine hundred fellows for careers in peace building. Many of them go on to serve as leaders in national governments, NGOs, the military, law enforcement, and international organizations like the United Nations and World Bank.

Two types of peace fellowships are available.

**MASTER'S DEGREE** offering master's degree fellowships at premier universities in fields related to peace and conflict prevention and resolution. Programs last 15 to 24 months and require a practical internship of two to three months during the academic break. Each year, Rotary International awards up to fifty master's degree fellowships at participating universities around the world.

**PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT CERTIFICATE** For experienced professionals working in peace-related fields who want to enhance their professional skills, Rotary offers a three-month program in peace and conflict prevention and resolution at Chulalongkorn University in Thailand. This program incorporates two to three weeks of field study. Up to fifty certificates are awarded each year.

## Section 5. Club Support

**5.B. Satellite Clubs.** A satellite club functions as a short-term, transitional step on the way to becoming a full, independent Rotary club. This allows interested persons to become Rotarians without meeting the requirement of having at least twenty persons to organize a separate Rotary club.

**5.C. Club Visioning.** Visioning helps Rotary clubs imagine what they want their club to become and create a practical plan to get there. In this facilitated workshop, a cross-section of club members work together to identify core values, community impact goals, membership aspirations, and priorities for the coming years. By the end of the session, clubs walk away with an action plan and clear direction that can guide presidents, boards, and committees for years to come. Each year the Zone Institutes conduct a training program as part of the Zone Institute meeting. Rotary members believe that we have a shared responsibility to act on our world's most persistent issues. Our 46,000+ clubs work together to: Promote peace; Fight disease; Provide clean water, sanitation, and hygiene; Save mothers and children; Support education; Grow local economies; and Protect the environment.

The Rotary mission: We provide service to others, promote integrity, and advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through our fellowship of business, professional, and community leaders.

The Rotary Vision: Together, we see a world where people unite and take action to create lasting change — across the globe, in our communities, and in ourselves.

There are many opportunities to be involved beyond your club and District in Rotary. Listed below are just three opportunities where many Rotarians in our District get involved. If you wish to broaden your experience with Rotary here are some excellent opportunities.

**6.A. Friendship Exchanges.** Imagine the adventure and fellowship in being part of a group of Rotarians who visit and are hosted by Rotarians across the globe. Friendship exchanges, which were not conducted during the COVID travel restrictions, are expected to resume in the near future. Friendship exchanges provide an opportunity to see how Rotarians in another country live and conduct their Rotary programs. Friendship exchanges have visited India, the United Kingdom, Brazil, and other countries in the past few years. Typically, a small group of Rotarians will travel together and be hosted in a Rotary member home. The Exchange participants will experience club meetings, club projects and District projects. They may even attend a District Conference. Opportunity will be given to become involved in your hosts District projects through the District and Global Grant process. A friendship exchange can be a life changing experience that will forever broaden your perspective as a Rotarian. Watch for the start of new Friendship Exchanges in the future.

**6.B. Rotary Zone Institute.** District 5440 is one of 30 districts that are members of the Big West Rotary Zone. Our Zone includes much of the western United States. Each year our Zone holds a Zone Institute. The Zone Institute week consists of three parts that include:

An Education week for our District Governor line including District Governors, District Governors Elect and District Governors Nominee. Education week involves training for several days prior to the Zone Institute for our DG line so that these leaders can more effectively govern their District.

Another aspect of the Zone Institute is the Emerging Rotary Leader Program. This training provides an opportunity for our District to send a limited number of Rotarians who wish to become more involved with Rotary at the Zone or RI level. There is one day of ERL training that precedes the Rotary Institute, which is attended by all.

A third aspect of the Zone Institute is the Institute program, held usually the last three days of the Zone Institute week. The Zone Institute program is both inspirational and educational. Our Zone brings together a group of outstanding speakers who provide inspirational messages to help us become more effective Rotarians. Zone Institutes are packed with training, fellowship, and inspiration. Once you attend a Zone institute, you will become more aware of the depth and breadth of Rotary.

The 2026 Big West Rotary Zone 26/27 Institute and Governor Education will be held in Albuquerque, NM from August 31-September 2, 2026. Education week is for our DGs, DGEs and DGN's. **6.C. Rotary International Convention.** Imagine attending a multi-day Rotary International Convention with up to 20,000 other Rotarians at an international meeting site such as Taipei, Taiwan June 13-17, 2026; Dubai, UAE (tentatively selected) May 22-26, 2027; or Minneapolis, Minnesota (tentatively selected) May 27-31, 2028. Here you will experience the full depth of Rotary influence

across the globe. Each year Rotary International brings together Rotarians from all over the world to exchange ideas, share project successes, and engage in great fellowship and fun. The 2026 Convention will be held from June 13-17, 2026, in Taipei, Taiwan. You can learn more about this unique experience at <https://convention.rotary.org/en-us/>. If you want to plan for a future convention, schedules for the next few years are Dubai, UAE (tentatively selected) May 22-26, 2027; or Minneapolis, Minnesota (tentatively selected) May 27-31, 2028.

**6.D. Giving to The Rotary Foundation.** Perhaps one of the most effective ways you can support Rotary is by making an annual contribution, at any level, to The Rotary Foundation. Each year, Rotarians in our District give over \$350,000. These funds come back to our District and are used for both District and Global Grants, as well as Scholarships. We also give generously to eradicating Polio which has reduced cases of the Wild Polio Virus from over 350,000 per year in 1986, which the program began to just 12 cases in the world in 2023. This effort has saved millions from a lifetime of disability or even death.



Donating to Rotary means clean water and sanitation. Health and hope have grown in areas that were once ravaged by diseases like polio. Economic development and new opportunities develop more prosperous communities. Your financial help makes all this happen, and more.
