IMPRESSIONS from Cuba Part II

"None of us can save the world alone but each of us can do something,"

After having volunteered the past four years in Poland with Global Volunteers, I decided to join their program in Cuba in 2016 to teach conversational English. Many sponsors, including the Estes Park Rotary Club, made my venture possible. After several weeks in Cuba, some initial impressions are worth noting.

Global Volunteers is an internationally recognized organization engaging volunteers in community development projects. Working in close partnership with local people, volunteer teams provide essential services to help at-risk children and youth in 17 countries reach their potential.

The island is almost 800 miles tip to tip. It is the biggest island in the Caribbean and was the first island discovered by Columbus. Cuba's population is 11 million.

Upon landing in Santa Clara, applause was evident throughout the plane: families visiting, vacationing or reuniting after long periods of time. For Cubans, it was a time to celebrate. For us Americans it was the venturing into a country isolated for fifty plus years. I don't know if any of

us were prepared for the heat and humidity. I am sure sweating is good for the soul.

Cuba has been isolated, frozen in time for fifty years and now stands on the brink of many changes--politically, economically and culturally. The leadership and general population is aging. I thought it would be an interesting time to be there.

I worked with several students on their conversational English, including Paula, a 41 year old Cuban nurse, who lost her husband to cancer less than a month before. Paula was quite willing to share her loss with me. Laughter seemed to be the glue that bonded our relationship.

As my colleagues will attest, the range of English proficiency among the students varied widely, but they were most eager to learn. During one evening class I noticed that there was laughter at each table. At that point I knew we had bonded with our students; our new friends. We volunteers come knowing that we don't always know best. We can bring our experiences, resources and caring to work with people in their own way on their own goals.

I was struck by the level of knowledge the students had of the

world, along with their critical and conceptual thinking and creativity. The students are brilliant, dedicated, filled with hope, and eager to learn. As one student expressed: "I love my country but we need improvements. Cuban people don't want too much, just to live a comfortable life--more food for our tables, more money to support our families and also to have the opportunity to travel to another country." Although I tend to be positive regarding coming changes to Cuba, again views among the students varied widely. Time will tell what the changes will bring.

In addition to teaching there were fun moments. From our hotel to the community center where we taught classes, our mode of transportation was horse and buggy. I asked my driver what my horse's name was. He informed me that the hoarse did not hae a name. All the other horses had names. I insisted that my horse had to have a name. So we agreed to name the horse Rene. So if you are ever in Cuba see if you can find Rene the horse.

Cubans are faced with innumerable challenges in an effort to modernize Cuba. In terms of infrastructure, the various forms of

transportation in Cuba speak to the isolation: American cars of the 50s, bikes, scooters, horse drawn buggies, busses, trains, etc. The City of Ciego de Avila in the center of Cuba where we taught was a charming, peaceful town frozen in time. In terms of traffic I am coming to learn that pedestrians never have the right of way.

Our last two days were spent in Havana. As we drove into Havana it felt like we were experiencing coming on to a movie setting of the 50s. After the Soviet Union collapsed ending its economic support and kicking off a brutal depression, change became inevitable. The Cuban government has approved both people- to-people educational travel such as Global Volunteers as well as people-to-people traveling on their own. As one Cuban stated: "It's going to change. But little by little." "This is going to be good for the whole country, you'll see. We'll figure it out."

- Change is already happening including:
- Greater tax and budget authority being directed to lower levels of government
- A decreasing state payroll
- Expansion of private markets
- Increase in real estate ownership
- Reduction in government subsidies
- Increase foreign investment
- · Addressing the budget deficit

The socialist system of Cuba has many benefits including universal access to all levels of education, medicine and health care. Giving up these dependencies will not be easy. Government subsidies are everywhere: government hotels, grocery stores, the art, etc. The issue is not whether change is coming, but in what form. I think Cubans will find a balance between socialism and capitalism. From my conversations, the following issues will need to be

addressed:

- Decreasing labor force
- An aging population
- A cradle to grave free health care system
- Out migration of young Cubans
- Government subsidization of food, jobs, health care, arts, etc.
- Under-investment in vocational and technology training
- Mismanagement and overreach of their own state ministries
- Corruption

As a longtime volunteer with Global Volunteers, I have no illusions about teaching conversational English, painting a wall or pulling weeds. Instead what happened during my visit in Cuba was a bonding between two peoples after a too long period of absence. Cubans welcome Americans. I am glad I was there.

- The recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations
- The dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society

Promoting integrity through ethical behavior is an essential part of what it means to be a Rotarian. During January, consider how you can put these ideals into action. Consider the following as some suggested activities during Voca-

tional Services Month:

- Talk about your vocation in your club, and take time to learn about fellow members' vocations.
- Use your professional skills to serve a community.
- Practice your profession with integrity, and inspire others to behave ethically through your words and actions.
- Help a young person achieve his or her career aspirations.
- Guide and encourage others in their professional development.
- Emphasize the connection between the Four Way Test and

the Rotary Code of Conduct and their importance to the values of Rotary

If you do any of these things, you are performing vocational service. If vocational service motivates and energizes you, then you're in the right place, because vocational service is the very essence of Rotary. It is what sets Rotary apart from other service organizations.

I look forward to seeing many of you at the Membership Summit or at other upcoming Rotary functions. Thank you all for your support and work last year. Don and I wish you all the best in the new year.




Schedule for Outgoing Rotarians from Dist. 5440 to Dist. 9650 (March 16 – 26, 2017)

- ARRIVE Sydney.
- Arrive Coffs Harbour Thursday 16th March, PM preferably – by air. At home in evening with hosts.
- Friday 17th, Sat 18th, Sun 19th. March.
 Coffs Harbour Hosting local stuff to
 include, including sightseeing, including
 a yacht cruise to the Solitary Islands, up
 close encounters with (wild) kangaroos
 guaranteed, pristine beaches and much
 more., social functions and a combined
 Rotary function. Local transport by
 members and members' perks.
- Depart Coffs for Dorrigo Monday 20th March AM (earlyish). Transport by Rotary volunteers.
- Arrive Dorrigo well before lunch Monday
- Balance of Monday 20th, all day Tuesday 21st March, host program by RC Dorrigo, with all the famous Dorrigo Plateau has to offer, World Heritage Sub Tropical Forests of Gondwanaland, and driving to and from Dorrigo on the renowned Waterfall Way, an Australian classic drive.
 - Depart Dorrigo Wednesday 22nd March, AM for Walcha, Point Lookout on the way, likely lunch with Armidale Rotarians. Transport appropriate rental vehicle with volunteer, Coffs(most likely) to arrive Dorrigo in good time to transport the group from Dorrigo to Wau-

- **chope**. (The rental bus naturally will be at your cost.)
- Arrive Walcha Wednesday PM, mid afternoon.
- Balance Wednesday, 22nd, all day Thursday 23rd March, host program by Walcha local transport by rental vehicle, if required, but more likely that locals would do their legendary 4WD tour.
- Depart Walcha Friday 24th March AM after all heads are clear, travel, most likely fairly directly to Wauchope.
- Arrive Wauchope as early as practicable to allow time for initial settling in with local hosts and good time to depart for the evening function at Laurieton
 Rotary District Conference. Once group is delivered to Wauchope hosts, the Coffs volunteer driver should return the rental vehicle to Coffs. Or, if it is Thrifty, perhaps the vehicle can be returned to Thrifty at Port, if the driver is planning to attend the conference.
- Balance Friday 24th, all day Saturday 25th and Sunday morning 26th March D9650 Conference and time with Wauchope hosts.
- Depart Wauchope Sunday 26th March PM for Sydney or other destinations.
 For some, or all, Monday morning might be better. By air from Port Macquarie, or maybe by train from Wauchope.
