Visit 54, October 19, 2017, Rotary Club of Estes Park


On October 19 Tracey and I drove to Estes Park to visit the **Rotary Club of Estes Park**. This long time Rotary Club meets every Thursday noon at the Rodeway Inn (now the Ridgeline Hotel as of May 24, 2018) and has a long, rich history of tradition and doing good in the Estes Park community. Established with Rotary International on May 6, 1926, the club now has 68 active members and 7 honorary members. The town has provided three District Governors as far back as 1963 with impressive leaders including:

- PDG Ernest Altice, 1963-64
- PDG Robert Hamblin, 1998-99
- PDG Julie Phares, 2103-14

The first stop on this visit was to meet with the club's Board. This club is led by **President Kathy Groesbeck**, an enthusiastic and positive leader who has great ideas for this Rotary year. Members of the board and AG attending with me included **President Kathy Groesbeck**, **Bill Solms**, **Scott Thompson**, **Karen Thompson**, **AG Linda Vomaske**,









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Roger Thorp, Thor Homme, DG Bill Emslie, Dave Evans and Karen McClure.

At this meeting, we learned that the Rotary Club of Estes Park has a strong tradition of supporting non-profits and other community needs through a grants process. They also provide 4-year scholarships to local students at \$2,000 per year.

This massive amount of community support is funded by the legendary Estes Park Duck Race, whose tradition goes back some 30 years with the distinction of being the second oldest Rotary Duck race in the United States.

The race has evolved into a major community event where ducks are "adopted," not only to the benefit of the Rotary Club, but to many community organizations who sell duck adoptions for a modest \$20 each. Of this total, \$19 goes to a cause of their choice. The remaining \$1.00 goes to Rotary to cover expenses.

As of the publication date of this article, the duck race raised net

proceeds of \$127,000 in 2018.

Following the board meeting, we had a tasty lunch and conducted our DG presentation, which is somewhat unique in that the DG and the DG spouse share the podium.

After the club meeting, we were invited to attend a special club service project.

This involved pulling on our jeans and assisting with cleaning of the highly popular Estes Park Welcome Rock, located at the entrance to the town off Highway 36 and modestly embellished with the Rotary gear. This turned into a fun social gathering with **President Kathy** providing Halloween treats on the tailgate of her SUV.

Thank you, **President Kathy Groesbeck**, for you energetic and inspiring leadership of this long-standing Rotary club.

Visit 55, November 1, 2017, Rotary Club of Cheyenne

On November 1 I drove to Cheyenne unaccompanied to visit the **Rotary Club of Cheyenne**. Most of the DG visits have been

with Tracey. This time, I was solo as Tracey was traveling to visit a college friend. The Rotary Club of Cheyenne, which meets every Wednesday noon at Little America, has a long, rich history of tradition and doing good in the Cheyenne community. Established on November 1, 1918, the club now has 179 active members, including five honorary members. The club turned 99 years old on the day of my visit. This makes the Rotary Club of Cheyenne the third oldest club in District 5440. 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meet with the club's Board. Members of the board attending included President Don Day, Anja Bendel, Dirk Miller, Jim Walter, Eric Todd, Danny Brownell, Lori Schoene, Mick Finnegan, John Auld, Robin Sims, Mary Schwem, Secretary Teresa Moore, and Treasurer Judy Marshall.

This club, due in part to its great size, performs many services within the Cheyenne community. For example, the day I visited the club recognized the November Students of the Month. Other projects and activities include Teacher of the Month, a dictionary project for third grade students, sponsoring an Interact Club at two high schools, recognition of National Honor Society students, a Read to Me program, sponsoring youth exchange students, sponsoring a Rotaract club, sponsoring RYLA and Young RYLA students.

Social activities include scheduled luncheons and Rotary Night at the Cheyenne Symphony. Fund raising activities include an annual Ice Melt Challenge, sale of peaches and a Cranium Cup Trivia contest. The club has established a 100th anniversary committee. District Grants in progress includes a Friendship Playground, the Food Bank Foundation and a dictionary project for third graders, Friday Food Bag Foundation & Rooted in Cheyenne Tree Planting (15 trees).

The club raised over \$1,000 in donations for Hurricane Harvey Relief and a special coin bank project to raise money for Polio Plus (\$3,000).

The club has applied for this year's local global grant with two other Rotary Clubs. The Rotary Club of Cheyenne was one of several

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Clubs in Cheyenne who worked together to provide the Chemo Care Packages, a high-profile health care project which involved all Rotary, Rotaract and Interact clubs in Cheyenne.

In the past year the club participated in a Rotary Leadership Institute Educational Grant and a Habitat for Humanity project. The club participates in a World Community Service projects in Guatemala. Rural recognition includes an equine project with Laramie County Community.

During the club meeting, the club recognized 60-year member **John Clay**. I also had the honor of presenting a Paul Harris Fellowship to **Rotarian Chad Craig**.

My most sincere congratulations to this very active community club lead by **President Don Day**.

This is a very active Community Interact Club with members from four Fort Collins area high school and four middle schools.



Some of the many projects for this club include Raising Readers, where books are delivered to Pediatricians and given to children at their well-child checkups. The

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Chemo Care Package project is a flagship project spearheaded by this club. This project was awarded a district grant and provides a chemo care package to new chemo patients at the local hospital. All three Cheyenne Rotary clubs along with the three Interact clubs and the Cheyenne Community Rotaract club are part of this project.

The club gives to ShelterBox and donates one ShelterBox tent per year. The Make a Wish Wyoming 5K race is supported each year. I was impressed by how well run this club is and the quality of the work they do for the Cheyenne community.

The concept of a young professional's satellite club to the Rotary club of Fort Collins was envisioned about three years ago by then Rotary District Membership Chair Bob Seymour and Current Satellite Chair Jon Land.

This is now a reality with the formation of a high performing group of young professionals who meet the first and third Wednesday of each month in a local pub or brewery in Fort Collins.

Each year this satellite submits a budget request to their sponsor-

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ing club and the club helps fund the satellite. Dues are reasonable and help fund the annual budget.

Currently there are about 35 members. Members are inducted with the sponsoring club.

This satellite has its own annual barbecue fund raiser. The event is a Kansas City Barbecue Society Sanctioned event with about 40 entries each year. The Satellite has raised over \$16,000 net proceeds the past two years and the event is conducted in July. Some of the proceeds go to a non-profit of the satellite's choice. The proceeds are split between the local university, the sponsoring rotary club and a local nonprofit of the satellite's choice.

The satellite has participated in a Centennial grant for the past two years.

Some of the hands-on projects the satellite club is engaged in include:

- A vehicle donation in partnership with the Larimer County workforce Center
- Hands on community service projects including painting, such as a project currently in progress at The La Familia Center in Fort Collins.
- Support the Rotary Clubs of Fort Collins annual Peach Festival fund raiser.
- Participation in the annual Fort Collins Purple Pins for Polio fund raiser
- Participation in the Four Way test program in schools.
- As an International project, the satellite is also involved with a Global Grant to South Africa.






Global **Grants** to India

With 15 Global Grants in the past five years, Rotary is making a significant impact

Recent Global Grants in India and unexpected partners with financial support. 2017-2018

The Rotary Club of Fort Collins, Breakfast has been involved in 15 Global Grants in the last five years and the total funding is near one million dollars. I would like to share two recent grants that received unexpected support. Networking and spreading the word about humanitarian Rotary projects helps.

Global grant 1866061- Happy school with e-learning, smart classrooms and WASH program-Host Rotary District 3182-Shimoga, India and 38 local clubs and RC of Fort Collins Breakfast and RI District 5440.

The project is to help provide facilities for e-education, namely smart classes including organization of teacher training programs on e-education and Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) in school facilities by installing multi-tap stainless steel wash basins with a continuous water facility and drainage in 38 government public schools in Rotary District 3182.

The schools are lacking in basic amenities for e-learning and e-learning is an integral part of modern education. The managements are unable to provide these facilities and infrastructure due to financial constraints. As such these students complete their basic education but continue to be e-illiterate.

Poor sanitation, water scarcity, inferior water quality and inappropriate hygiene behavior are disastrous for young children. WASH in School is a first step towards ensuring a healthy physical learning environment. The purpose and scope of WASH in schools aims to improve the health and learning performance of school-aged children and, by extension, that of their families by reducing the incidence of water borne and sanitation-related diseases.

Objectives: RI District 3182 is planning to provide complete e-Learning facilities and WASH in school facilities to 38 selected schools. The Rotary Clubs in each community will adopt one Government School within its jurisdiction and make it a model e-education and hygienic school by providing one smart classroom and WASH facility in each school.

Funding: This is a \$69,529 proj-

ect to provide 38 schools with e-learning computers, projectors and WASH equipment for better learning and hygiene. The funding was provided by various clubs in district 3182, India and the Rotary Club of Fort Collins Breakfast, La Mesa club in California, friends of Rotary and RI District 5440 and 3182.

Since the project was published on the www.MatchingGrants.org website. Mike Mascari, a Rotarian from the La Mesa Rotary Club in San Diego contacted me and was able to get a grant from the Caster Family Trust for \$6,300. With friends of Rotary, Dr. Bhoopalam from Chicago supported the project with a grant for \$2,000. The remainder of the club funds were supported by the Rotary Club of Fort Collins, Breakfast and RI district funds of \$10,000 from District

Designated Funds (DDF).

Global Grant 1865450 Rotary Eye Hospital - Sangamner, near Pune, India equipment project

Project Background: This Rotary eye hospital is functioning for more than 25 years in the community of Sangamner, India and providing eye care, especially cataract and squint eye surgeries. Now they want to equip this hospital with more modern equipment and improve the care and expand the services This Global project should help in equipping the facility to improve, outpatient facility to diagnose and treat many preventable blindness eye problems like cataract, glaucoma and diabetes. They also treat pediatric eye problems.

Sustainability: Approximately 30% of the patient populations pay for their services according to their affordability and 70% of the eye care is for the poor who receive free eye care. It is also supported by other NGO's, and public donations.

Project Description: This global grant is a \$37,741 project to provide various eye care equipment at the Rotary Eye Hospital in Sangamner, near Pune India. The project is funded by the Rotary

Club of Sangamner, Pune Pride, a Donor Advised fund at The Rotary Foundation for prevention of Blindness, Rotary District 3131 and 3132, India and the Rotary Club of Fort Collins, Breakfast along with Rotary District 5440.

Since this project is about prevention of blindness and other eye care, the donor advised fund at The Rotary Foundation for prevention of blindness contacted us and provided \$2,000 and matched by The Rotary Foundation with \$1,000. This grant had a very unique funding structure with two clubs and two districts in India and the Rotary Club of Fort Collins,

Breakfast and our District 5440.

As you can see support comes from various sources if the project is worthwhile and sustainable.

This is what Rotary is all about in helping humanity where needed. I encourage clubs in our district who are not involved in international projects to join hands with other clubs in our district to support an international project. As demonstrated above, funding follows from unexpected sources and friends.

This may be another good reason to continue to contribute to The Rotary Foundation.


