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"CLUB / MEMBERSHIP EXTENSION"

Did your club induct 25 or more new members last year? How many expect to induct 25 or more new members this year? Do you think this idea might be a little far fetched?

When a new Rotary club charters, that's exactly what happens to the District . . . 25 or more new Rotarians join our ranks. Now imagine 2 or 3 or 4 new Rotary clubs being chartered in one year. Now you're doing the math, right?

In the past 10 years, Rotary in North America has depended on new club formations as a significant component to meet membership goals. Our district has had some very positive experience in this realm as well.

We can point to Highland Village, Kennedale, Burleson Area Midday and Eagle Mountain-Saginaw as new clubs that have chartered in our district in the past 5 years. Perhaps you know of others.

Imagine how those communities have benefitted from having a Rotary club in them. And imagine how those Rotarians have grown . . . as community business leaders united in Service Above Self. Now add to that the money those new clubs have raised for The Rotary Foundation, funds that are now benefitting those in need all around the world, and is it any wonder that District 5790 wants to start new clubs?

Now for the fun part . . . YOUR part. We need to know where YOU think we should consider starting a Rotary club. Is there an area that's experienced recent growth but doesn't have a Rotary club? How about a club that misses new member opportunities because of their meeting time? A noon club with a long history might want to consider sponsoring a morning club or an evening club.

Maybe we can appeal to more young business leaders with a "non-meal" club . . . in other words a club which holds down the cost of Rotary membership by meeting but not serving a meal. Highland Village is our district's poster child for just such a club. It was an experiment when they tried it but it's worked out quite well and the club is thriving.

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GROUP STUDY EXCHANGE "A Great Opportunity"

When you think about all of the great opportunities that Rotary offers, probably among the first things that come to mind are polio eradication, matching grants that assist people in need, ambassadorial scholars, etc. But what about a Rotary program that can directly impact and benefit individual Rotarians as well as non Rotarians? You answer that Rotarians cannot directly benefit from Rotary projects...so true...but there is an exception. It is called Group Study Exchange (GSE).

The object of the GSE program is to assemble a team consisting of a Rotarian team leader and three to five non Rotarian team members. This team becomes part of a GSE exchange with a foreign Rotary district to promote good will, develop leadership skills, expand vocational skills, and observe Rotary in action in the exchange Rotary district. As stated above, the team leader is a knowledgeable Rotarian and the team members are young professionals, age 25 to 40, and are not Rotarians. Team members also may not be relatives of Rotarians. The team travels to the exchange district and spends three to four weeks living with Rotarians, touring the district, speaking at Rotary meetings and observing how their vocation is practiced in a foreign country. Virtually all expenses are paid for by The Rotary Foundation (TRF) through the Annual Fund (your Paul Harris contributions at work!).



Our GSE exchange this year is with District 3770 in the Philippines. Currently it is planned that our team will depart on or about 15 March 2013 and return on or about 8 April 2013. Their team will visit our district from 28 April 2013 until 21 May 2013. So where do we stand in the process? It would appear that we have plenty of time to select our team, but that is not necessarily the case. The Rotary Foundation requires us to essentially have our team selected by October 2012, so we are soliciting nominations for the team right now. We are asking for your assistance in this. Please canvass your club members for likely candidates. This is truly a unique opportunity for a young person to travel to a foreign country, experience another culture, and not the least – experience Rotary in action in the Philippines. We are also looking for Rotarians who may be interested in serving as the team leader. Any Rotarian in good standing is eligible. 

The Rotary Club of Iowa Park has 12 "guality" members. The club raises funds from a flag program. Since the club is small, this past year the club enlisted the assistance of the local FFA students to help with the program of 500+ flags. For service to the local community, the club and the city of Iowa Park entered into a three year agreement to refurbish our local Rotary Park.

The Rotary Club encourages service to youth and honors two high school students each month during the school year, as "Rotary Students of the Month". As guests of the club, the students share their accomplishments and goals for their future with the membership each month. Their accomplishments are featured, along with their pictures, in the "Iowa Park Leader" newspaper.

In addition, two youths were sent to Rotary Youth Leadership Award (RYLA) program this summer. Two scholarships were given to graduating seniors. The club also honors a "Teacher of the Year" with a plaque and cash contribution. For the elementary students, the club provides "4 Way Test" coloring books and dictionaries.

GRAPEVINE ROTARY CLUB "Off to a Great Start"

We're off to a great start in the new Rotary year in Grapevine. Plans are underway for our annual "Golfing For Grads" tournament which benefits our scholarship program. We plan to install 24 additional computers during the 2012-13 school year. Perhaps the most interesting facet of the Cleburne club has been its implementation of its fish fry and Harley-Davidson raffle. In two years, the club has far exceeded its expectations in funds raised. Overall, the club has raised around \$50,000. Club members help sell \$50 raffle tickets for the Harley-Davidson motorcycle, as well as a side raffle item (a TV two years ago and an iPad2 this year). In addition, the club puts on a fish fry event with live music, face painting, laser tag, bouncehouses and more for the community.

This fundraiser has allowed the club to participate in many more projects than in the past, as well as put funds back in savings for future projects. A PowerPoint loop is displayed at the event Cleburne Rotary Club President Hidde showing all of the club's and Rotary International's projects. This allows community members to see what the club is doing and how they too can join Rotary and/or help with local, national and international projects.

Key projects the club participates in include purchasing multiple Shelter Boxes, a dictionary project that provided dictionaries to every third grader in Cleburne, Joshua, Alvarado, Keene, Venus, Godley, Grandview and Rio Vista ISDs, donating funds to the HOPE Medical and Dental Clinic, a free clinic in Cleburne started by club member Tony Torres several years go, and sending eight students to RYLA camp in Denton. And, of course, there are many cooks, from left, Gretchen Cruse, Sid others such as the Four-Way Speech Contest, multiple scholarship programs, the flag program, numerous educational programs

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LONG TALL TEXAN "How delegating a task develops club member"

The first time I ever met Janet Holland, she walked into our Rotary Club meeting here in Arlington, Texas. She had just been named District Governor; the first woman in Texas to be so named. I asked her what she did in "real" life, and when she told me she ran a Hardware store in Mineral Wells; I was sold immediately. Me, shopping in a hardware store is like a six year old going to Disneyworld!

But this long road to the Governors title was fraught with a lot of potholes along the way. Janet came from a long history of Rotary meetings dating back to her Father dragging her across Oklahoma and Texas as a child. Janet's father, W. Lee Woodward, was Rotary Governor of District 124 (now Districts 5750 and 5790) in Oklahoma. Fast forwarding to 1995, Janet was in the first class of eight female Governors that year.

In 1995, my travel company hosted a trip for District 5790 to Nice, France, to the International Convention. Our plan was to attend the meeting in Nice and my wife was bringing all the wives over when the meeting was over; then we would proceed to Spain and Portugal for a two week trip by bus. It was my plan to film the meeting with my trusty VHS camera. After all Janet Holland would be at the Governors Dinner and what better place to film history being made with our very excited newly minted Governor! As the Governors were being seated, Janet was told she would have to dine in another room with the wives? Explaining to the men that she was actually a Governor didn't play well to them. Being the lady she was, she dined with the ladies. Suffice it to say, she was paving the way once again and doing it with great dignity!

She was always pushing the envelope for Rotary and continues on her Rotary path full steam ahead... even today. I spoke to Janet by telephone recently on a Sunday night. She returned my call within seconds after I left a message for her. Know what she was doing? On a Sunday night, working on a budget for another Rotary committee she was supervising. I asked her this simple question. What would the "State of Rotary" be to-day if woman were not included in a leadership role? Her answer I think would be; a lot fewer projects with maybe one-fourth fewer members. Go girl...well done!
