The people of Haiti thank you for your donation!

DISASTER RELIEF IN HAITI

This article was adapted from the sample press release available through Rotary International's Public Relations Department. It shows some of the ways Rotary is helping the people of Haiti.

The Earthquake in Haiti has Rotarians all over the world finding ways to respond and help the country.

From raising funds to collecting relief supplies to distributing life-saving shelters in Port-au-Prince, Rotary clubs worldwide continue to ramp up efforts to help save lives.

And that includes members of the 17 Rotary clubs operating in Haiti, where pediatrician Claude Surena, a Rotary member in Port-au-Prince, has been tapped by President Rene Preval to coordinate the national government's emergency response. The chair of Rotary's Haiti Disaster Preparedness Committee, Dr. Surena and fellow Haitian Rotary members are helping to make sure incoming relief supplies are used effectively. He and his family also have been caring for injured quake victims on the grounds of their home since the disaster occurred.

Among the first international relief workers to reach Haiti were volunteers from ShelterBox (www.shelterbox.org) a U.K.-based disaster response organization supported by Rotary clubs worldwide. Each ShelterBox kit contains a 10-person tent, a water purification system and other survival necessities. About 2,000 ShelterBoxes -- enough to assist 20,000 people -- are in Haiti, and another 3,000 are due within a week, coordinated by logistics teams set up in Miami, Fla., and Santo Domingo, D.R. The ShelterBox team is first targeting pregnant women and families with newborns.

Nearly 1,500 of the walking wounded have been treated by 23 physicians volunteering with Comprehensive Disaster Response Services, assisted by six volunteers from two New York City Rotary clubs. Another 600 patients were admitted to the team's emergency hospital. The team worries that as time passes, the risk of disease will increase

Clubs throughout the regional Rotary district that includes Haiti quickly mobilized to send more than 55 planes carrying 50,000 pounds of medical equipment and supplies into the cities of Pignon and Port-de-Paix, bypassing the myriad of logistical problems in Port-au-Prince. Rotary clubs throughout the Caribbean have raised more than \$1 million for immediate relief and long-term rebuilding.

"Rotary had an incredible infrastructure established before the quake, which has made our relief efforts very effective," says Dick McCombe, a member of the Rotary Club of South-East Nassau, Bahamas, noting that Rotary was in good position to help in Haiti, with 33 projects already underway to provide water, sanitation, medical care, and education even before the earthquake.

The Rotary Foundation has set up a Haiti Earthquake Relief Fund to streamline the flow of contributions, primarily for U.S. club members. Fund managers will work with local Rotary clubs and relief agencies to meet the most pressing needs of communities in the affected area. Funds will be used in the relief effort, and for projects providing longer-term support and development.

Other examples of Rotary's worldwide response to the disaster in Haiti:

Rotary clubs in South Korea quickly raised \$100,000 to support a medical team sent to Haiti by the Korean Foundation for International Healthcare.

In Honduras, The Rotary Club of Tocoa collected more than 70,000 pounds of food and medicine and arranged for three cargo flights into Port-au-Prince, with more on the way. "We remember how the world helped us after Hurricane Mitch," said Rotary member Juan Gomez.



CELEBRATING ROTARY'S ANNIVERSARY

Rotary's Public Image Resource Group is encouraging Rotary clubs and districts to select a day and highlight Rotary's involvement in the local – and global – community.

The Public Image Resource Group recommends Rotary's "birthday" on February 23 as an ideal date for several reasons. First, as Rotary's anniversary, February 23 allows clubs and districts a natural day to recognize Rotary's past, present and future. Second, the more clubs and districts around the world that celebrate Rotary Day on the same day, the greater the positive impact on Rotary's public image.

Yet, while publicizing Rotary on its February 23 birthday is ideal, any day can be identified as "Rotary Day" in your community. What is key is to plan a high visibility community service project or event for Rotary Day that helps to communicate what Rotary is and does with your community.

To help Rotary clubs and districts organize a celebration, here are four resources that are available for you and your District and Club Public Relations Committees:

[105 Ways to celebrate Rotary Day](#) (PDF). Let your imaginations run wild! You may select one or many options and tailor your celebration to your community – or come up with your own creative Rotary Day activities. Remember, the idea is to share the Rotary story with the general community, so your celebration efforts should be directed to the community, the media and the general public.

[Rotary Day Proclamation](#) (.doc). A proclamation is an official recognition of a particular event or day. Often "proclaimed" by a government authority, the day is recorded in the public record and may be announced in such forums as a city council, provincial government or national parliament. This formal recognition also provides a good "news hook" for potential media attention. This proclamation sample can be tailored and sent to your local community, regional or national government decision-makers asking that a specific date – February 23 or another day – be named Rotary Day and declared an official day in your community.

[Rotary day poster: 18 x 24 inches](#) (PDF). [Rotary day poster: 11 x 17 inches](#) (PDF). To help promote the event in your community, two Rotary Day poster designs are available for districts and clubs to use. A graphic designer can modify the blank section or insert local photos. You can also print the poster out as is and write in local event information. The poster is designed so that it can stand alone, if needed.

[Rotary Day News Release Template](#) (Word). A news release that is meant to be localized and contains general information about the Rotary International organization.

The Rotary International Board of Directors adopted "enhance the internal and external recognition and public image of Rotary" as the No. 2 goal in its Strategic Plan. Think of the impact of everyone celebrating Rotary Day together! Best wishes as we Share Rotary to Make Dreams Real . . .

A GREAT YEAR IN LA MOSKITIA, HONDURAS

District 5790 has been doing great work in Honduras for almost five years now. Last year was our most productive yet. We successfully completed two Matching Grants that totaled \$95,000!

The first grant, MG65791, was sponsored by the Mansfield RC led by Bob Brown and consisted of the purchase and deployment of 400 Biosand filters. The problem of clean water has been confirmed in La Moskitia by Rotarians, Health Workers, and parents of small children who suffer the most from the affects of drinking surface water contaminated by fecal runoff.

Like our previous matching grant for 165 filters, the location to deploy these filters was recommended by the local Health Department and confirmed in person by Rotarians. All 400 filters were deployed in and around the village of Auca. There were a total of seven villages. On our recent trip to the La Mosquitia in Aug, 09, we heard directly from village representatives how effective the filters were and how grateful the villagers were to Rotarians for improving their lives. We personally visited eight homes to see the filters in use, to ensure that the villagers were comfortable maintaining them, and to verify that they

had reduced or eliminated the problem of dysentery/diarrhea. In all cases, the results were positive. We also heard the same feedback in a group meeting with the villagers.

The second grant, MG65791, was sponsored by the Wichita Falls North RC led by PDG Dr. Tom Sheriff and consisted of another 190 Biosand filters and the first semi-modern prototype farming activity in the history of La Moskitia. The Mosquito Indians still farm as they did hundreds of years ago. A field is burned, a stick is used to make a hole in the ground, and a seed is dropped in.

By partnering with a Honduran NGO (nongovernmental organization), RELATA, who has extensive experience training central Americans on farming technology, we were able to bring the village of Rondin forward several centuries in terms of agricultural technology. As usual, Rotarians in 2008 verified that the village was willing to take on the project and soil samples taken by RELATA confirmed the poor quality of the soil (high acidity and low level of organics).

RELATA placed an employee from La Moskitia who spoke the language in the

village for more than six months to train the villagers, make yokes for the animals, train the animals and prepare the soil. In Aug, 09, Rotarians saw the first plowed rows of corn and rice ever in La Mosquitia. Despite an encouraging start, excessive rains in the fall destroyed the corn and beans and reduced the yield of rice. There are two other plots being tended currently with fruits and vegetables and we are hopeful for a better outcome. Regardless of our initial results, the technology has been transferred. The plows, fences, training will continue in the village and should eventually help the villagers to grow and store additional crops for themselves or even to sell for income.

The 190 filters have been deployed in three other villages near Auca and also in the village of Mistruk. We visited Mistruk prior to filter deployment and saw children with distended stomachs, a sure sign of parasitic worm infestation.

All in all a very productive year in La Moskitia. Our filters now total 755 and our next grant which is approved and begins soon will take us over 1,000 and total of 8,000 people helped!

Our next targeted area is near the village of Tikiraya in the Kruta River Valley. We were by the mayor of the area and the Asst Director of the Health Department that small children were dying in this area due to contaminated water and the distance from medical care.

We will provide a picnic lunch for the participants as well as a meaningful experience that they will remember. Please come and join us for the District Conference April 8-11, 2010.







This year for the first time, the club has set aside funds to sponsor a RYLA student, has collected books for Books for the World and is working with Cisco High School to sponsor a 4-Way Test Speech Contest. Three years ago the club began participating in the dictionary project. Each fall members distribute dictionaries to approximately 75 third grade students in Cisco Elementary and ensure that fourth and fifth grade students who are new to the district also receive dictionaries. This year when members passed out the dictionaries, we encouraged them to look up polio and told them about the work that Rotary International has done to eradicate the disease worldwide.

"We use the dictionaries in our classrooms and incorporate them into our lesson plans to help the students learn how to use them," said one of the teachers. "Some of these children do not have dictionaries at home, so the Rotary Club makes a tremendous impact."

Of course when something works, we like to continue it and build upon that success. Throughout its history the club has provided support to other initiatives in our community through local grants and continues to do so today. Over the past year, the club assisted the Junior Chamber of Commerce with their park cleanup project, the Cisco Youth Baseball Association, Keep Cisco Beautiful and several other community organizations as well as continues to provide educational scholarships to students.

One project that has endured for 44 years has been the Citizenship Awards. Begun in 1966 by past club president, Eris Ritchie, the program honors a male and female graduating Cisco High School senior who has exhibited good citizenship throughout his and her high school career.

Several well-known speakers have been featured at the annual luncheon, including two congressmen, a lieutenant governor, the Texas Attorney General, state and county judges, several university presidents and various media persons. The 2009 speaker was USAF Col. Robert F. Gass. The 2010 speaker will be Dr. Charles Breithaupt, the new executive director of the University Interscholastic League.

Much has changed in 89 years, but the future of the Cisco Rotary Club looks bright indeed.

AMBASSADORIAL SCHOLAR FOLLOWUP—GRAHAM SOWA

Graham Sowa left for Botswana in early December to help with an African speech contest for students from 15 countries. This is a unique opportunity and demonstrates great leadership and success he had last year as an Ambassadorial scholar. His trip is being paid for by the SOROS Foundation in NY. You may have heard of George Soros. Jim Aneff worked with the SOROS foundation, Open Society to help place high school exchange students from all the NIS countries in the 90ties and early 2000s. have been in his office in NYC. It is remarkable that Graham is being sponsored financially by the Soros Foundation. - submitted by Jim Aneff

Graham provided the following recap:

After spending a year in Botswana as a Rotary Ambassadorial Scholar from May 2008 to May 2009 I am heading back there this December to help run the 2nd annual Pan-African Universities Debate Championships.

Debate in Africa is modeled mostly after the British Parliament, thus style and presentation are just as important as content. But my involvement was not so much actually debating, but helping to organize debates. My friend Justice Motlhabani invited me to be registration director for the Inaugural Pan African Universities Debate Championship. I had some experience doing this in the U.S. and came on board. My experience from the U.S. transferred; however dealing with delegates from 15 African countries was completely new and challenging.

The Pan African Universities Debate Championship is sponsored by the International Debate Education Agency, a subsidiary of the Soros Foundation Open Society Institute. The idea of a "Pan African" debate tournament was conceived, lobbied for, and administered almost exclusively by university students in Botswana. It was downright exciting to see young people in Africa take this kind of initiative for a home-grown project.

This debate tournament promotes continent wide, face-to-face networking for the 300 participants from 15 countries. And with social media like Facebook and LinkedIn everyone keeps in touch even after the tournament is over. The potential for African unity and solidarity is definitely greater due to the existence of competitive, critical thinking debate.

The opportunity that District 5790 and The Rotary Foundation gave me to go to Botswana put me in the middle of a very exciting time to be in developing Africa. And now I am going back again, proving that the Rotary Ambassadorial Scholarship is a true force for building bonds between people and places that would have otherwise never existed.

Additional update: Graham is currently helping out in the relief efforts in Haiti.
