

All of our District clubs are participating in Literacy related projects in one way or another. I encourage all clubs to continue with this most important aspect of your service to our communities, locally and across the world.

Those individuals are looking to improve themselves through edu-

cation, and we can help. The same version of the dictionary that we are providing to third graders is also the perfect tool for these adult students.

Another initiative that we have undertaken in our District is adult literacy. The initiative is being led by Rotarian Kathryn Thompson, who is using her expertise and contacts as the Executive Director of the Tarrant Literacy Coalition to develop a great program. IMPROVING LITERACY IN AFRICA

<u>kthomp-</u> <u>son@tarrantlit.org</u> I chaired our club's International Service committee last year, and we took a delegation to Mbabane, Swaziland (the capitol city of this south African country) to deliver 2,800 books to the children of Swaziland. The books were written and illustrated by the children of Fort Worth, to help children deal with the pain of a loved one who is suffering



or who has died from AIDS. As you may know, Swaziland has the highest per capita incidence of HIV/AIDS of any country in the world. Our club has been involved with Swaziland in the past, and because we have several club members who have some involvement with Fort Worth Sister Cities – and 2009 was the fifth anniversary of Sister Cities' involvement with Mbabane - this was a perfect opportunity to partner with them and take a delegation to Swaziland.

The trip was incredible – we were welcomed with open arms and we were able to visit an elementary school and share the books with the children and teachers and actually SHOW the teachers how to use the books to get the children to open up about their feelings. The children drew pictures of their favorite "angel" (the name of the book is *Angels at My Door*) and to talk about what it is like to have someone close who is sick.

Fort Worth Sister Cities received the Innovation: Humanitarian Assistance Award for the Angels At My Door initiative. Angels At My Door is a compilation book of interviews from Fort Worth students who have a family member or loved one affected by HIV/AIDS. This past year, Fort Worth Sister Cities partnered with the Downtown Fort Worth Rotary Club and More Life to distribute 2,800 of the books to Swaziland. This was done in an effort to increase literacy and provide health education.—Press Release from Sister Cities/Fort Worth Chapter, June 10, 2010, announcing their accomplishment.

DISTRICT 5790 PUBLICITY

Rotary's reputation is the responsibility of each individual member. Every Rotarian is a public relations representative because outsiders' experience with Rotary members and activities is what makes Rotary's reputation, locally, regionally, nationally and internationally. Your staying informed, personally, builds Rotary's credibility and enhances its reputation.

Formal public relations efforts are focused at the club level. Clubs are the major source for information about Rotary members and activities. Every club should have a fact sheet about who you are and what you do. Updating that information to keep it current is critical. Nothing is more dismaying to news media, donors to Rotary causes, invited speakers for your programs or potential members than vague or inaccurate information.

Some fact sheet content usually is found on the first page of your club's website with its names of club officers, date and place of meeting, projects list and chairs. It's useful to keep a printed copy handy for media calls and in case of crisis.

Communicate your club's events and activities in advance, and that means detailed planning. Rotarians are volunteers, but good ones—thorough, responsible and accurate.

You can't count on news media to handle your public relations. That is not going to occur. You need to have your public relations committee plan for news releases prior to events so you will be ready to post photos and the coverage immediately on your website, your Facebook page and to any special media that might be involved. Clubs need a public relations chair, photographers, website manager, newsletter editor, display experts. Draw on membership expertise. Keep records of projects/events.

Why do this? Speakers who find that what they said at a meeting is being talked about because it was on Facebook or twitter are likely to tell others who then will readily accept your invitations. Awards you give are much more impressive if you take the trouble to see that others know about the recognitions, especially since Rotary awards often go to modest, unassuming people who are not likely to brag. However, if their professional publications carry the information, that adds to their prestige and also improves Rotary's outreach to its communities.

People outside Rotary, in fact some members, are not aware of all of the ways that Rotary improves communities at home and abroad.

So, two points to remember are: 1) engage, cultivate and respond to external publics at every level; 2) be the "Go To" person for anything Rotary does. Social media and traditional media are fields of outreach for all of us.

The Internet has given symmetry to public relations. People will talk about Rotary among themselves. Keep in contact by initiating and responding.

GROUP STUDY EXCHANGE—TO FRENCH POLYNESIA & NEW ZEALAND

District 5790's Outbound Team will be going to Rotary District 9020 in April and May 2011. The majority of the time will be spent in the French Polynesian Islands and in Auckland New Zealand

Applications for Team Leader and Team Members due August 15th, with Interviews to take place end of August/early September

Team member selection will be finalized in September - One Rotarian Team Leader and four non-Rotarian team members. Team (non Rotarian) members must be young professionals between the ages of 25 and 40.

Team to report at the District Conference in April 2012.

BEST PRACTICES—E-MAIL COMMUNICATION

Today, one of the most common ways to communicate is through e-mail. Each of us gets lots of worthwhile e-mails as well as more "spam" e-mail than we care to count.

Consider this when you e-mail: Put the word "ROTARY" as the first word in any email you originate to others in your club or the district.

The word ROTARY (all caps) should be followed by a colon and then the subject matter (i.e. July Board Meeting, Upcoming seminar, etc.) to help the reader identify the subject matter.

This will help the recipient to recognize the importance of the e-mail. They can then respond back as appropriate.

If you are sending an e-mail back regarding another subject, and utilize an e-mail you received to start it off (which may have the recipients you need listed already) change the subject line to the new subject (and erase the other content that is not relevant).
