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ROTARY FOUNDATION—WHAT A YEAR!

This is my fourth year as our District 5790 Rotary Foundation Chair. It seems the year came and went so quickly. It seems that we were just in the planning stage of the Rotary year, and now I look up and we are ready to begin a new chapter. We are not looking to the Future for a different Vision. But before we do that, let's examine what we have done and then examine how we have prepared ourselves.

This year we had 19 clubs participate in our District Simplified Grants program addressing literacy, health, and hunger. The dollar cost of the projects exceeded \$48,000, and that does not consider the volunteer hours our Rotarians contributed to the projects. Then we have our International Matching Grants projects. These projects requested the assistance of our District Designated Funds of \$41,146.00. We had 8 of the projects and the total dollar impact is \$246,402.00. What an international impact addressing mobility, health, hunger, and disease prevention. We are in Asia, South America, Europe, Africa, and the Caribbean.

We had a mutual Group Study Exchange with Brazil, District 4770. While I was not privileged to be introduced to our outbound team, I was given the opportunity to assist with the inbound team. They traveled our district and ended their experience in Arlington and Fort Worth. Marcelo, Andrea, Leticias, Thais, Leo, and Bruno made a great impression on our Rotarians. It was an exercise in building goodwill and better friendships.

And what about Ending Polio? The district is currently has funded this effort in the amount of \$174,943. We had End Polio at the Ballpark where our district contributed approximately \$30,000. Then we had the record breaking Polio Banquet in Abilene. Approximately \$80,000 was raised in one evening. It wasn't just about raising money, it was about building clubs. We really need to see more of their "You are the Face of Rotary" video. Then on their own, our area clubs contributed an additional \$64,943. Thank you District 5790 Rotarians. You know that every child deserves to walk and run Polio free.

We had Rotary Has Heart Foundation Banquet in February with Rotary International President-elect Ron Burton. It was a night of fellowship, inspiration and heart. We collected \$17,000 for the Annual Fund and \$170,000 for the Endowment. Again it was not just about the funds, it was about building Rotarians and club. Thank you again.

Now we are at the end of the Rotary year. It is not over. To date, we are at \$181,285 in contributions to the Annual Programs fund. This is where we will access assistance for our Global Grants, our Global Scholars, our Global Vocational Training Teams, and yes our new District Grants. With out all of you, we cannot fund our local and international projects; teaching people to read, treating disease, providing food, providing medical equipment, educating future leaders, teaching people to manage their own societies, and developing ways to address peace and conflict. Of all the effort around the world, Rotary has the ability to address these areas. But most importantly Rotary has you.

Participating in all these areas, District 5790 Rotarians have shown that they are ready to address what is next. We are ready for Future Vision.

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COMMUNITY SERVICE "At Work In Our Communities"

A wise Rotarian once said "A day in a Rotary Club is like a day on the farm. Every meal is a banquet; every dollar put to good use is a fortune". Clubs in our district certainly live by those words everyday to impact and improve the lives of others in their communities. We have several clubs that I would like to showcase for this article.

The first project I would like to highlight comes to us from Jane Foster of the Flower Mound club. They recently challenged the Lewisville Morning, Lewisville Noon and Highland Village Clubs to a blood drive challenge. Their efforts produced over 200 units of blood being donated during the challenge! This was all done with total membership of 190 Rotarians from those clubs which makes their efforts amazing. Please join me in congratulating these clubs with helping to replenish our blood supply!

The second project I would like to mention is from my own club, the Rotary Club of Arlington. Tim Britt, a member of the club, chaired this new project called the "Great Day of Service". The objective of the project was to serve a local homeowner by providing home improvements to help elevate their standard of living. After contacting the city for possible candidates and a detailed interview process, a local homeowner just down the street from where the club meets was selected.

The project entailed replacing wood siding, sealing and painting the entire house, and general yard clean-up. About 20 volunteers worked an average of 6 hours shifts. Even the homeowner put on their work gloves and helped with the clean-up and improvements. Keith Aholt with the Arlington Sunrise Club and owner of Nuts and Bolts Hardware store donated supplies, and Tom Ware with the Rotary Club of Arlington and owner of Mr. Handyman provided the technical expertise. The project was successfully completed in one day.

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PUBLIC RELATIONS "Great Progress Made"

After three years as District PR chair, it is to the credit of the District's Leadership during this time that we have in place:

- A crisis plan
- A social media policy, thanks to Dr. Susan Maben
- A photo permission form for adults and children, improved this year by Mike Pope
- Implementation of Rotary International's style sheet to give consistency to communications
- Newsletter format and content easier to navigate and read with more consistency in article size, readability, correct grammar and spelling due to the diligence and outstanding work of Chuck Chambers
- More clubs with public relations chairs to originate and circulate information about their activities internally and externally
- News releases about district events created and distributed.

My mantra during this time has been that publicity and promotions are not public relations. Promotions and publicity are "output" that may call attention to the organization, but not result in more understanding of what Rotary is and does.

Access to information about Rotary is the key. That is why access to Rotary communication sites is critical. Although to protect the privacy of our members some elements should be restricted, there is much to share. Because membership in Rotary is by invitation only, if invited potential members want to know more about a club they need to be able to find it electronically.

News media count on being able to go a website to find information about people, possible story ideas and contacts who can help them with information or access to events.

Internal relationships are critical too. How do members know what their club and other clubs in the district are doing?

Members have to know so they can tell non-Rotarians what Rotary is and what it is doing, locally and worldwide.

As a "test" ask some club members about content in the current Rotarian magazine, an outstanding publication, and see what you get. Do the same about the district newsletter, also an outstanding source of information. Some members are only aware of their own club's activities, and while that is good, it may not give a total picture of Rotary. Members, though, are the most credible source for information about Rotary.

For example, when speakers come to your clubs to give presentation, they often bring information about their organization, but how often do we tell them what Rotary is and does?

Many club members seldom, if ever, come to District events. Participation in District events exposes members to other clubs' activities through club displays and Rotary projects exhibits such as safe water, available blood supplies, disaster shelters, etc. Outreach and accessibility are critical in building relationships. That's public relations.









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ROTARY YOUTH EXCHANGE "WRAPPING UP GREAT YEARS"

This year our Rotary Youth Exchange Students have come from around the world representing countries as diverse as Japan and France, Brazil and The Czech Republic. Still, others are here from Italy, Austria, Chile and Switzerland. Two of our American students have returned from their year abroad in Brazil and Italy. Three others will return from Germany, Japan and Argentina soon.

Our host families have been extraordinary. They have provided the students with diverse opportunities. Some have experienced life on Texas ranches with all that suggests. A student went to San Francisco with his host family. Right now, one student is spending four days at the Grand Canyon with his American host father! All have traveled to many places in Texas. Others have gone out of state to be with their new extended family.

Our schools have been unbelievable in welcoming our students. One of our boys was liked so much by the entire senior class that he was voted to be King of the Prom. I asked what that meant. His host Father said the big deal is he gets to dance with the Queen! Some of our students have played all sports even though they never played some of them at home. One girl learned not only how to ride horses but also started to do barrel racing. We have had a golfer who loved being on the team. They all toured our Texas State Capitol in Austin and saw where our legislature hangs out some times. They received a good Texas history lesson from the pictures in both Chambers. In January all our students went to the multidistrict youth exchange meeting in Tulsa which included 200 exchanges students living in 16 states.

Some of our Clubs embraced our students and included them in many activities and some members provided tickets to numerous sporting events all over the metroplex. They helped add a real variety of opportunities for the students to participate in Rotary and Texas life! Some clubs helped with scholarships for our American students who went abroad. Not only that, but some clubs and districts in other countries provided scholarships and various other opportunities for ours American students so they could do extraordinary things.

Jane Foster, the President of the Flower Mound Rotary Club, will soon visit her son and his Rotary host family in Germany. He has been one of our great American exchanges students this year. She will also travel to the Czech Republic to personally meet the family and girl who her club will host this coming fall. Also they will visit the German short term student who was in their home two summers ago. The parents of our student in Argentina visited her and her host family this spring. I know of three exchange students whose families have traveled here this year. As you can see, youth exchange can be an entire family affair!

During my three and a half years as the YEO, we always say that the purpose of youth exchange is to create WORLD PEACE AND UNDERSTANDING . It is a fundamental core program of Rotary International. More money is spent on working each year with 8,000 Rotary Youth Exchange Students than any other program in Rotary except for the Foundation Programs. Rotary International, student's families, Districts, Clubs, host families, schools

and Rotarians spend large amounts to make this work. Some Rotarians wonder how we can make such a sweeping statement as to believe that high school exchange students can change the world.

If you know them, then you understand why the answer is True. Let me give you a few examples. Two years ago Jane Foster and her family hosted a short term exchange student from Germany. One of his first statements was that he did not believe anyone would like him. Astonished, she asked WHY. He calmly said because he was German. Then he said because of WW II. I asked another YEO in a different state about this remarkable thinking of a 16 year old today from German. She then told me she had a great German exchange student in a very good school. He told her how the kids in that American school called him by very derogatory words that only adults and old people would have used in this country 60 years ago. Today, the German Government still provides schol-arships for their students to participate on youth exchange programs to the US. Unless it has changed in the last several years, every member of the German Government "Congress" had been an exchange student to the US. The first Chancellor of West German, Konrad Adenaue, had a nephew who was a high school exchange student in South Richland Hills for TWO years! He is a doctor today in Germany. The Swiss government provides funds for Rotary in Switzerland and other exchange program to administer this program in their country.

In the last two years I have taken two Rotary youth exchange student to the United Nations in NYC and to visit their country's Mission. One of the boys lived in Nocona for a year where he played football. He plans to be a lawyer, businessman and politician. He was interested in economics and government. During my preparation for our trip I found out his Father is a consultant...to Kings, Presidents and Heads of State among other things. This boy speaks fluent, English, French, German, Russian, Italian and a lot of Spanish. Also one of our students last year plans to be in the European Parliament to represent his country and also be a businessman. His Grandparents witnessed the invasion of his country by the Soviets and lived under harsh communist rule. Later, his uncle was a student leader who helped organize the demonstrations that helped bring down the communist control of his country. His father is a successful businessman and is presently working with the government for the return of their family forests that the Communists confiscated. Past AG Sylvia Mahoney and I took him to Washington, D.C. when we were asked to be present for the presentation of the research that had been conducted to designate the Great Western Trail as a National Historic Trail. He was with us at this meeting as well as with Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison. He returned home to finish his high school and plans to study economics in Denmark next year. One of our students this year has traveled all over the world with his family and has visited more places and dived in more oceans than probably most of us have ever experienced in our lifetime. He is a natural leader who we will hear from in the future. One Rotary youth exchange student will enter law school in the Netherlands this fall at age 17. He plans to be in the European Parliament or the United Nations.

Past YEO Peggy McConnell who has worked with youth exchange for over 20 years enjoys seeing former students from all over the world return to visit their families multiple times and touch base with her when they come to the US on business. When you know these students you understand the great future and potential they each have to help change the world.

With all this good news you have to wonder why we have so few clubs participating each year in hosting our exchanges students? There are three reasons that we all have to consider.

1. Many Rotarians tell me youth exchange is not important at all. Why should we bother to be involved when any kid can go with their teacher on a short sightseeing trip to Paris or other places? The other comment I hear is

why bother, there are lots of other programs that place exchange students. Let them do this.

- 2. The most frequent comment is that the Rotarians in my club are too old. They don't want kids. They are glad they are free from their own who just left home. There is some truth to this. In fact, I had lots of fun with PDG Sharron Miles. As a past superintendent of schools with years of experience working with teenagers, I would tell her from time to time that what she and her husband needed was a nice 15 or 16 year old exchange student to live with them! I must say that her comments to me were printable. However, I got the feeling that what she was really thinking was that she would like to run over me with a Mack truck. Who knows, she may have tried! In reality we all know families with children who would be great host families. There are a lot of them out there or else our schools would not be filled with exchanges students placed by other programs
- 3. School placement is a problem because so many organizations try to place too many students in their schools. We have to work with each school. The best success of school involvement with our program is our new AG, Dr. Jim Chadwell. He is not only a school superintendent and club President of our new Eagle Mountain RC but he also helped us find host families. His club established the youth exchange program this year and hosted two students .He asked to be the Club Rotary counselor for one of our students. We need more our or school administrators who are Rotarians to become proactive in this program.

Most Rotarians do not realize that our District Committee this year has been involved in working with 36 student as well as host families, parents of outbound students, schools and Rotary Clubs. Only the Rotary Youth Exchange program spans part of the year for each of three District Governors.

Norman King is taking over my position July 1. He has been deeply involved for several years with our program and has served as the inbound coordinator this year. Phyllis Catton, Peggy McConnell, Jane Foster, Isaac Castro and RIPD Don Mebus have served as core people on our youth exchange committee. When people tell me they are too busy I just have to think of our RI Past Director Don Mebus. He came to ME asking to be a student Counselor. He was a great student counselor spending time with the student and taking him to a number of places. This spring he reminded me that he wants to be a counselor again.

This year R.I President Tanaka established what he called Rotary Global Peace Forums. They were held in Berlin, Honolulu and Hiroshima. The locations were not by accident. In Hawaii there were 600 young people coming from Mexico to Mongolia who participated in all sessions. In his speech he tells his story. He was 3 years old, a member of a rural Japanese family with many children when the Emperor surrendered. He grew up to because a successful businessman, a great Rotarian and then went on to lead our great organization this year. He ended his talk by saying Peace between countries is possible. I am in Honolulu today!

Wont' you consider this program...This year? We can use your help now. As always we need host families and have students to still place.

Thank you for all your support for the work so many of you have done during the last three and a half years to strengthen our program in this district's Youth Exchange Program. We have a great future.





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A few years ago, a team of Rotarians from District 5790 went on a Humanitarian trip to Haiti after the devastating earthquake. While there, it was noticed by PDG Tom Sheriff, who happens to be an Optometrist, that no one was wearing eyeglasses. Statistically, this is not accurate. He decided to take the initiative and start what is now called "Vision Clinic" at the Mission of Hope compound in Haiti. With the help and support of his club and several other Rotarians in the District, eyeglasses have been (and still are) being donated, prescription strengths are being checked, categorized, organized, boxed and taken down to the clinic. On several different trips, a room at the mission was designated, cleaned and set up with equipment donated by various companies.

The clinic is open two days a week and Tom has trained three young ladies to check the eyes of everyone that comes in. If it's determined that glasses are needed, the girls communicate with Tom at his office in Wichita Falls, Texas and he'll let them know which pair of glasses is needed and where they are located. If the person is in need of more help because of more medical issues, they are referred to a doctor on staff.

Mission of Hope now has the following in mind:

Optical Care:

Set up functioning optical care in Haiti - DONE

Medical Care:

 Upon securing eyeglasses and equipment, begin providing higher-level medical care for eye patients with regular operations in Haiti (via supplemental NA Dr's).

Surgical Care:

• Move to elective surgery operations on regular intervals.

We look forward to continuing the work down in Haiti.






PDG Dan Morales received the Prestigious Rotary International "Service Above Self" award from the RI Board of Directors for his work over the years.

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DECATUR ROTARY CLUB "It's About Serving the Community"

Earlier this year, one of the organizers of Decatur's summer feeding program came by my office to see me. As president of the Decatur Rotary Club, I was asked if our club could help him out with purchasing Crock Pots to be given away to families in need this summer. Our club was the first service organization he went to.

That's what I love about our club. When there is a need in the community, we reach out to help address it. And our community realizes that as well. Our club did, indeed, agree to help by providing funds for 10 Crock Pots.

Community service has always been at the heart of the Decatur Rotary Club. Each year, our club sponsors a free fishing derby at Black Creek Lake in the LBJ National Grasslands for area children and their families. We give away prizes in various age groups and categories including most fish caught, biggest fish, smallest fish and the winners of our casting contest. 
