

Action Requested: Reminder to clubs to report their 2012-13 Presidential Citation

The 2012-13 Presidential Citation report will recognize Rotary clubs that achieve an array of accomplishments that help them become stronger, deliver more effective service, and enhance their public image. To qualify for a citation, clubs must achieve RI President Tanaka's challenge to conduct a local peace forum or peace project, along with three required activities and at least nine optional activities* listed in the 2012-13 Presidential Citation Brochure (900A-EN). Club presidents must fill out and sign a copy of the brochure and send it to their district governor's attention by 31 March 2013. The brochure is available in a writeable PDF format, which can be saved and e-mailed as an attachment.


Please note: one of the activity options in the category "Increase Our Service" challenges clubs to "attain a minimum US\$100 contribution to the Rotary Foundation Annual Programs Fund from each club member." To clarify, clubs must achieve an *average* (per capita) contribution of US\$100 from its members in order to meet this goal, and not necessarily US\$100 per member; in other words, some members may give more than \$100 and some less.

Rotaract and Interact clubs may also qualify for a Presidential Citation by participating in a

Electricity is 220 AC and the 2-pin plug and you'll need a converter


Most people speak English but Portuguese is the official language and the word "Please" is greatly appreciated.

Register online at www.Rotary.org or download registration form from same site. If you register by Dec. 15, 2012, cost is only \$265 each for Rotarians and guests.

Phyllis Catton, Our District Committee Chair for the American Outbound Programs along with our great District team just finished the first Student- Family orientation for the 8 American student who will spend a summer or year overseas.

Our 9 international inbound students we have this year are having a blast! That is the only way to explain it. The host families could not be better. I hope in the next two months to get reports from each club as to what activities and opportunities you have provided to your student during this year so that they have we can include this in our District conference program. We will want their counselors to be prepared to share the good news about the fun Rotarians have had with their students.


Reports from our students in Japan, Italy, Germany, Argentina, and Brazil keep coming in every month. They are having wonderful experiences. A sad note... One of our student's Mothers has recently been diagnosed with cancer and she had to return home early from Italy. Please keep her Mother in your prayers and hopefully after treatment, our student will be able to return to compete her year. We have a health insurance policy which includes emergency travel back home in situations such as this. The company provides a round trip ticket to the student. This was arranged in just a few days. We hope she may be able to return later after her Mother completes her treatment.

We need your help. This year we must get all our students placed this spring due to the difficulties of getting all the government paperwork completed. It is also taking more time for the students to make appointments at the American Embassy in their country for personal interview for their US Visa. We cannot commit to receive students unless your clubs will decide they want to be involved in the program. Now is the time for you to decide about this program and let us know if you can participate. If so, we can still obtain students from various countries. However, if we do not place a student, this generally means that they cannot be an exchange student. Countries assign them to us and if they are not placed, it is usually too late for other clubs to work with them. Norman King, our Inbound Chair and I are working closely together. Please help us to continue to build a strong youth exchange program in our district and become involved. Make a decision and let us know so that we can help you.

Three years ago this February I became the District Youth Exchange Officer again. I had started our program in 1985 and was YEO for 3 years at that time.

Now, this summer I will turn over my job as YEO to Norman King. He currently is our Inbound Chairman working with our international students but frankly like all of us, he works with all of them. He was born in Central Africa of Baptist missionary parents. lived in Ethiopia, and was raised in Spain. He speaks a number of languages. He has owned minor emergency clinics, practiced law in Texas and currently takes various church groups all over the world from time to time to do medical clinics, dig water wells and hold summer camp for children suffering with AIDS in Africa. In some ways, he is like a one man Rotary Foundation. All of our exchange students like him very much. I think they

are the ones who have helped entice him to gradually become more and more involved in youth exchange. Phyllis, Peggy and I have gradually lured him in. And now he is caught!

For two years he has been involved in trying to develop our computer processing system being implemented by SCRYE. Remember, with his background, if you don't do youth exchange with him you might just end up in India, China Paraguay or Brazil digging water wells or other exotic intense labor jobs. Take this comment seriously,

Remember, Rotarians like PDG Joi Burton go to Kenya to build water wells and outdoor toilets and we all buy buying chickens, pigs and who knows what else at her encouragement.. All he wants from you is to give you kids... from anywhere...Brazil, Chile, France, Italy, Finland, Germany, Spain, New Zealand, Taiwan, Japan...he is not picky. Any will do!



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AREA 14 UPDATE

The four clubs that make up Area 14 have had an extremely productive 2012-2013. The presidents have met together to discuss ways that the four clubs can unite their services for projects in both Denton and Cooke Counties.


The Gainesville club has used its flag fundraising project to provide over \$12,000 to groups in Gainesville and Cooke County. They gave \$5000 to Abigail's Arms, a family crisis assistance program in Gainesville, \$5000 to Volunteers in Service to Others, and \$2200 to the Boy's and Girl's Club of Cooke County. In addition to financial assistance, the group reads to the students at an elementary school in Gainesville and helps with food delivery in the DASH Food Program for the elderly.

The Lake Ray Roberts club also has used its flag project funds to support projects in the Pilot Point area. They provided immunizations for needy students in the schools in Pilot Point as the school year began. They also provided school supplies for those students and volunteered to help at the distribution of those supplies. The club helped repair and modernize a home with Hearts for Homes. In addition, they give two scholarships to two outstanding Pilot Point seniors for \$1500 each

The Denton club collaborated with the Denton South club to donate \$50,000 to the Rotary House to be built by Serve Denton, a social services clearinghouse organized to help service providers have better access to their clients in the Denton area. In addition to that donation, the club funds scholarships in both the academic and vocational areas for students in the Denton ISD. The club also helped re-established a Rotaract club at the University of North Texas this year. They also have worked to establish a presence on social media with the creation of a Facebook page for the club this year. They also have been the host club of a Youth Exchange student from Brazil this year and contributed \$500 to the Wheelchair Foundation.

As mentioned above, the Denton South club has united with the Denton club to donate an additional \$25,000 to support the Rotary House project of the Serve Denton organization. The collaborative effort has yielded additional funding from community members because of the joint participation of the Rotary Clubs and their community credibility that will help bring the project to fruition. In addition to that contribution, the group has contributed funds to purchase water filters in Guatemala and distributed 2200 dictionaries to all third grade students in the Denton ISD. They also are hosting the GSE team in May and have stepped up to help house a student from Nicaragua who is studying at UNT this semester. In addition, the club also volunteered to help with the Salvation Army bell ringing for three Saturday's in December. Both Denton clubs have purchased a shelter box during the year.

What is mentioned here is only the top contributions and activities of each of the four very active clubs in the Denton, Lake Ray Roberts, and Gainesville area. The area is teeming with very dedicated and hard-working Rotarians.






Rotary Incoming President Ron Burton with PDG Janet Holland






Cody is thrilled to have recently accepted a position as Information Analyst and Reporting Officer with the United Nations Mission in Liberia (UNMIL), based in the capital Monrovia. From there, he works with a team to report on the many complex elements of the UN's ongoing peacekeeping operation, which is working to consolidate peace and stability in the country in the wake of over a decade of civil war.

This includes monitoring and analyzing ongoing political developments and the security environment in the country, the human rights situation, and the continued strengthening of the Liberian national police force and security sector.

After 11 years of living in Southeast Asia, and coming up on a year after completing his term as a Rotary Peace Fellow at the University of Queensland in 2011–2012, Cody is excited to be experiencing a new continent and witnessing firsthand the resilience and energy of a country rebuilding itself after war.

Since completing his fellowship, Cody was featured as a lead author in the publication *From Clause to Effect: Including Women's Rights and Gender in Peace Agreements*, published by the Geneva-based Centre for Humanitarian Dialogue, for work done during the Applied Field Experience term of his Rotary Peace Fellowship.

He has also completed consulting projects to document indigenous forms of conflict resolution in the Solomon Islands for the University of Queensland and United Nations Development Programme's Pacific Regional Office, as well as contributing to a report on the rights situation of Iranian political refugees in Turkey.

Arlington West Club Theme: Beginning the 2012-2013 year, Arlington West developed an ambitious plan to serve others and to have some fun along the way. Last July, our club plan began with the theme: "Learn Do Grow." This slogan has helped our club to learn about local and global needs, take action, and achieve personal growth. Rotarians elevate their vision to see the needs of others and develop ideas that help resolve individual conflict with peace related humanitarian efforts. March Rotary Adoption Peace Picnic: On Saturday, March 23, all seven Arlington Rotary Clubs pool resources to help children who are in great need....boys and girls who have been court appointed to Child Protective Services (CPS) foster care until they are adopted. With funding from a matching District grant and additional financial support from local clubs, volunteers from all seven clubs work as a team to provide an "Adoption Picnic." 

learned this humanitarian peace project helps with the adoption of many of these children, providing them with peace and security found within the family environment.

About Arlington West: Our 36 member club has steadily grown with 11 new members in the last three years, with all members supporting the R.I. Foundation \$100 EREY objective. While our club engages in local activities and functions, the Arlington West Rotary Clubs' central area of focus is education. In addition to funding six scholarships to Martin High School (4) and the Venture School (2), we provide two RYLA sponsorships....and support our "adoptive school," Morton Elementary, with their library books, student dictionaries, and annual participation of students at Camp Grady. We also are active with an Interact Club at Martin High School, and are involved through them with the Four Way Speech Contest and, this year, their Japanese Dinner/Polio Plus fundraiser. Currently our club has three members who tutor 3rd-8th grade students through H.O.P.E. (Help Our Pupils Excel), with one member on the Board of Directors and another serving on the Advisory Board.

As Rotarians, we all are exposed to the needs of individuals in our community, country, and across continents. The landscape seemingly changes daily, with increasing complexity, increasing the need and the responsibility of Rotarians to act. Fortunately, we are part of a well oiled efficient organization, Rotary International.
