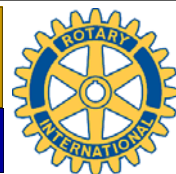

As soon as "Oh, the places you'll go!" was announced as the theme for the 2013 Rose Bowl Parade, the Dr. Seuss theme inspired Janet Holland, past district governor (PDG) of Rotary District 5790 to think of another 5790 PDG, Paul N. Geisel of Fort Worth, a nephew of the late Theodor Seuss Geisel.

PDG Holland, now Rotary Foundation Alumni Coordinator of Zones 21B-27, began considering ways to get PDG Dr. Geisel selected by the Rotary Rose Parade Float Committee, Inc. to participate in the parade.

Although Dr. Geisel would pay his own way to Pasadena and cover his expenses while there, the district has to make a substantial contribution to the building of the float.

Just one dollar from every 5790 Rotarian will make Dr. Geisel eligible to be selected, but the money must be collected by July or early August.

Some money was collected at the 5790 Assembly, and a special table will be set up for the District Conference, May 18-19 in Fort Worth, to collect more.

If you don't know Paul Geisel, he is professor emeritus of the University of Texas in Arlington where he taught urban affairs, having founded with Dr. Del Taebe, the Institute of Urban Studies in 1970, which became UTA's School of Urban and Public Affairs. Dr. Geisel has served as president of Sister Cities, and on the boards of the Fort Worth Independent School District as well as on the Transportation Authority's Executive Committee. In 2008, Rotary International inducted him into its prestigious Arch C. Klumph Society for his contributions to Rotary.

The traveler/narrator in *Oh the Places You'll Go* children's book reached "The Waiting Place," where everyone was waiting for something to happen. Dr. Seuss's nephew has never been one to tarry in such a place, according to 5790 Rotarians who don't want to wait either to get enough funds to make him eligible to be chosen to participate in the Rotary's 2013 Rose Bowl float.

The Literacy Program – Darhyl Ramsey, Chair

Rotarian Darhyl Ramsey understands and explains to Clubs the full scope of literacy.

The literacy programs supported by the Rotary clubs of District 5790 have made many contributions to the literacy challenges of children and adults in the district. There are several ways that one can view literacy and see problems created by the lack of the ability to read. There is academic literacy where students in school are learning to read and comprehend the meaning of words. But another level is practical literacy. In this type of literacy, non-readers are stymied in many of their activities because of their inability to grasp the meaning of things like road signs or understand cooking directions. One of the alarming areas of this practical illiteracy is the inability to read prescription labels to administer medications correctly to themselves or their family members.

There are numerous ways that clubs can help fight illiteracy through service activities. Many clubs help by distributing dictionaries to third graders in their area. Reading coaches are needed who can help non-reading adults and children learn words and apply the correct meanings to those words. Practice in reading, comprehending, writing and structuring thoughts requires someone who can take the time to develop the student's trust and help those who need assistance in learning to read. Much has been accomplished by the Rotary Clubs of District 5790, but the task is great and appears to be growing in spite of the best efforts of Rotary Clubs.

Disaster Relief Program – Clint Ishmael, Chair

Rotarian Clint Ishmael, Fire Chief of Cleburne, was quick to offer help to cities in South-east Tarrant County after tornadoes ravaged their communities.

When tornadoes hit the Southeast region of Tarrant County, Clint Ishmael immediately contacted Rotarians Mike McMurray of the Kennedale Rotary Club and Barry Bondurant of the Mansfield Rotary Club, both Fire Chiefs of Fire Chiefs of their respective communities. Also contacted was the director of the Emergency Operations Center in Arlington to offer the aid of Rotarians in District 5790. Initially they asked for chain saws and heavy equipment to move trees and large objects. However, more than enough help was available so help from Rotarians in our District was not needed.

Blood Challenge Program – Walter Ott, Chair

The Governors' Challenge Blood Drive is a tradition that started in District 5790 way back in 1998 when Governor –elect Sid Pruitt adopted the Rotary Club of Fort Worth South's area challenge and made it district-wide. Since then the Challenge has grown. The Challenge has spread throughout the central US as Governor Sharron Miles

"SPEAKERS BUREAU" "Making the Most of your Programs"

The Speakers Bureau is designed to be a resource for the District to provide speakers to and by its membership. It is our objective to make the Bureau more valuable and accessible to each club. Each speaker listed on the District site has been recommended by a fellow Rotarian or club. Speakers may be people who have had life experiences that relate to that month's focus, Rotary, or your community. Or, they may be people who are particularly educated or knowledgeable about the subject you hope to bring to your members.

Why do we need a Speakers Bureau? There are a variety of reasons to use the Speakers Bureau. Since it's made up of volunteers through recommendations from you, it is a great resource to your club. They can be used for a variety of purposes, such as:

Increasing Rotary's visibility: Speakers that might bring visibility to Rotary are always encouraged. Fresh, new programs will help recruit members. We hope that certain topics would be of interest to others in the community and provide an opportunity to outreach and invite potential members.

Raising public awareness about local issues: Many issues that can be confusing, scary, or unclear to people can be explained best by those who have personal experience with them. Why not utilize someone who has a moving, personal story about an issue you and your club may be interested in? And, if you have heard someone tell their story, please recommend them, as well.

Providing positive role models: People who have experienced a particular problem or condition can serve as an inspiration to others who hear them speak. There are many role models and leaders in each of clubs. Recommend them to become a speaker on their area of expertise!

Who would I recommend to the Speakers Bureau? *Identify a speaker:* You probably already know of people in Rotary and/or your community who are articulate, well-informed, and appealing when talking about issues in public. These are the kind of people to recommend—that person might be YOU! Be aware too that different people may have different ideas about what makes a good speaker. For example, a professor may be an interesting speaker for a group of people with graduate degrees, but he may put a less educated audience to sleep. Do give some thought to what kind of presentation is appropriate for Rotary, as a whole.

Recommending a speaker: Word-of-mouth and personal invitations are the best recommendations. In general, people who are already involved in some way with Rotary or have some knowledge of the organization are the best recommendations. Please make any speakers aware that our District is large, and find out if and how far they are willing to travel. Once you have decided that someone is a good candidate, please forward their name, contact information, topic of presentation(s), and any reference information they might have to the Speaker Bureau Chair or someone on the Public Relations team.

We want your feedback! The Speakers Bureau is a tool designed for You and the membership. We would like this to be something that each club takes advantage of, as well as help us grow our list of speakers to be shared. We encourage your feedback and recommendations. 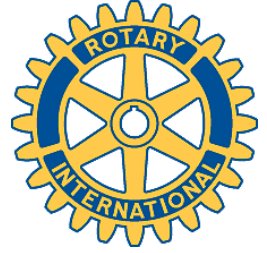

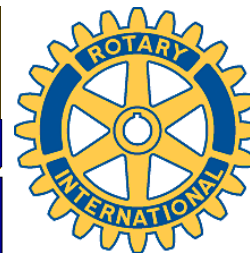
