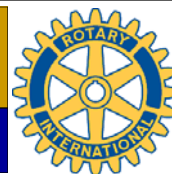

Welcome to Foundation Month!

Each November, clubs focus on strategies to carry out our mission of international humanitarian and educational service. Partnering with the Rotary Foundation (TRF) provides clubs with the leverage needed to make a real difference in the world.

Club programs will cover a variety of [TRF](#) opportunities including:

- Education experiences: Ambassadorial Scholarships, Fellowships for Peace and Conflict Studies, and Group Study Exchange.
- Matching Grants, which relieve suffering, improve living conditions, and provide educational opportunities for youth all over the world
- Plus our number one goal of eradicating [Polio](#) throughout the world.

Each year Rotarians worldwide do over \$100M in international humanitarian projects. This is made possible by all Rotarians contributing to the [Annual Programs Fund](#) every year along with their contributions to the [Permanent Fund](#) and fund raising for Polio Plus and matching grants.

Recent weeks have provided a running start to Rotary Foundation Month with two of the very successful TRF events featuring internationally acclaimed Past Rotary International President Bill Boyd from Auckland, New Zealand.

- The [World Polio Day Dinner](#) sponsored by the Abilene Area Rotary Clubs raised over \$55,000 for the eradication of Polio with a crowd of 350 strong.
- The [Rotary Foundation Banquet](#) in Fort Worth also had a capacity crowd, which recognized and celebrated contributions to the Rotary Foundation.

Rotarians district wide are finding many creative ways to raise funds for Polio eradication with parties, picnics, purple pinkies, bike rides and banquets.

As the Rotary year is speeding by, it is a good time to consider the following reminders:

- File IRS 990 by Nov 15th to avoid taxes and penalties.
- Register by Dec 15th for best rates at the RI Convention in New Orleans.
- Review progress toward goals and recognition criteria to be met by March 30.

In addition to our focus on international service this month, all avenues of service are going strong and continuing to benefit our local communities.

ROTARY FOUNDATION *"Annual Giving"*

Every Rotarian in every country, District and club has one thing in common: The Rotary Foundation. The Rotary Foundation (TRF) is the base from which we are able to do the things around the world that makes us proud to be Rotarians.

The Annual Fund is one portion of TRF and it is the portion that receives our regular annual gifts to the Foundation. Among the many projects around the world that the Annual Fund supports are Group Study Exchange (GSE Teams), Rotary Peace Fellowships, 3-H Grants (Health, Hunger, Humanity), Volunteer Service Grants, and University Teachers. Also, this is the TRF portion that delivers back to our District in a variety of ways. The first and most obvious benefit is the money that is returned to the District based on the annual giving from three years ago. TRF returns 50% of that amount to allow us to do projects. In 2010-2011 the District received \$107,976. Fifty thousand is allocated for two Ambassadorial scholars, \$36,381 for Matching Grants where the District can supplement what a club contributes to a Matching Grant and helps increase the amount that the grant can secure from RI, and \$21,595 for District Simplified Grants where clubs can apply to the District for funds in order to match theirs to complete local community projects.

Every Rotarian Every Year (EREY) is the primary source of funding for Foundation projects. This program asks every Rotarian to give \$100 every year to the Annual Fund. One Hundred percent of what you give is used on projects and is tax deductible.

A few statistics gathered from around the world can put EREY in perspective. The top three Districts for giving from around the world for 2008-2009 were District 5280 (Ca, USA) with \$685.60 per Rotarian, District 3600 (Korea) with \$346.04 per Rotarian and District 3750 (Korea) with \$316.14 per Rotarian. How did District 5790 compare in 2009-2010? Per capita giving ranges from a high of \$281.20 per Rotarian in one club to 12 clubs who contributed \$0.00 per Rotarian. Twenty-eight percent of clubs in the District had a per capita giving of between \$0.00 - \$10.00. A Rotarian could give their \$100 per year for less than the cost of one coffee shop coffee per week.

Routine annual giving to The Rotary Foundation makes sense on a number of levels. First, as a Rotarian, it is your charitable Foundation. Second, TRF is a perfect example of the Power of Rotary. Our collective strength allows Rotary to complete numerous projects around the world and in our neighborhoods allowing us to make a difference in the world. Isn't making a positive difference in the world the reason we joined Rotary?



PERMANENT FUND *"A Matter of Trust"*

That is how it is for us. Years ago when my husband Chuck joined Rotary, I hadn't a clue what that meant other than a meeting where he had lunch on Tuesdays.

We didn't discuss Rotary as he joined (invited to do so by a dear friend and co-worker) nor for a long time after he made that decision.

Eventually he told me that he wanted to become a Paul Harris Fellow, which requires a donation to The Rotary Foundation.

I agreed. I have always trusted Chuck to make logical, sound decisions. He studied the situation and decided donating to The Rotary Foundation was the right thing to do.

"Donating to The Rotary Foundation makes it possible for projects created by Rotary Clubs to get done."

At that time in our marriage we didn't have a lot of money to donate, but he felt donating to The Rotary Foundation was the best use of our funds. He trusted The Rotary Foundation and I trusted him.

As time passed and Chuck moved up his level of donations to The Rotary Foundation and became a Major Donor. He felt that our money was helping to make a difference in the world.

Eventually he decided that we needed to make a substantial donation to the Permanent Fund of The Rotary Foundation and to include The Rotary Foundation in our long term financial planning including our wills. I learned that the income from the donations to the Permanent Fund give Rotary the money to support projects - on an ongoing basis.

Chuck learned about the projects supported by The Rotary Foundation. As is human nature he gravitated to some and didn't have much interest in others. In our travels to Rotary Conventions around the world, we took the time to hear presentations on projects and to visit the exhibits in our areas of interest.

Of many choices available for funding via The Rotary Foundation, we agreed that we had an interest in Rotary Peace Scholar activities, but other people might choose water projects, mother and child health or many others.

Many families never get around to discussing long range financial planning and wills. It can be a very touchy subject as it has to do with eventual death. No one wants to talk about the death of a spouse or one's own death, but we all need to overcome our shyness on this subject and talk it over with our legal and financial advisers.

It is a matter of trust. You need to trust what happens to your money. Don't leave it to chance.

Our district recently had our Foundation Celebration Dinner, and Past Rotary International President Bill Boyd was our keynote speaker. His presentation caused me to rethink our Rotary Foundation. It reminded me that the Foundation involves all clubs and Rotarians around the world.

District Simplified Grants

With our District Simplified Grants program we have the ability to address local projects as well as small scale international projects. With our Matching Grants program, we develop larger projects on an international level. PRIP Bill Boyd talked about this on October 6th. In his talk, he cited a German Rotary club working with a Brazilian club to enhance the educational and medical needs of young Brazilians in high densely populated urban area. These are our humanitarian programs and they give us the opportunity to be hands on, to participate, and to develop from within. And just think - they are happening all over our Rotary World.

Our educational programs involve young individuals from around the world. Imagine over five hundred Ambassadorial Scholars from our Rotary districts living in various places around the world, learning another culture, sharing their culture and serving as ambassadors of goodwill.

Group Study Exchange

Then we have our Group Study Exchange program for young professionals between the ages of 25 and 40 who travel to another country for Rotary. This is a learning experience for these individuals. They learn about the other culture, they learn about their vocation, and they learn about themselves. This is a growth experience and it is because of Rotarians and the Rotary Foundation that this is possible.

Fairly new is the Rotary World Peace Fellows program. Rotarians have always wanted to do more than just talk about world peace. In 2002, The Rotary Foundation established seven Rotary Centers for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution around the globe. Our Foundation contributions support the best and brightest scholars from a variety of nations as they develop skills and attitudes to prepare them for leadership positions in our increasingly complex world. Fifty Fellows are chosen every year.

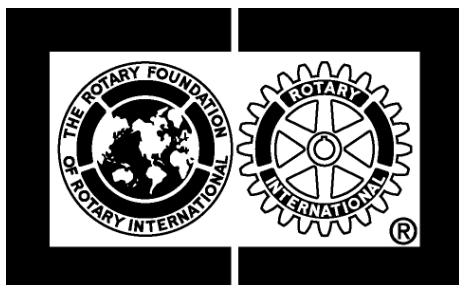
Then we have our ways to contribute to the Rotary Foundation. We make our contributions to The Annual Programs Fund knowing that 50 percent of that gift will come right back to our district in three years to be used for humanitarian and educational programs chosen by us. This includes Ambassadorial Scholars, Matching Grants, and District Simplified Grants that may be used for projects in our local community. The other 50 percent also benefits our district indirectly, because it is used to fund a variety of programs in which we can participate. Again this is happening around the world, so that clubs and districts can share in the educational and humanitarian programs of the Rotary Foundation.

Another way to support The Rotary Foundation is by including it in your estate plans. Many other Rotarians have, enabling our Permanent Fund to grow and providing long-term stability for Foundation programs. Arch C. Klumph, who conceived the idea of our Foundation in 1917, said it best: "We should look at the Foundation as being not something of today or tomorrow, but think of it in terms of the years and generations to come. Rotary is a movement for the centuries."



And finally we have our goal to Eradicate Polio. Again I am reminded that this is a global effort. Rotarians are all in this together – and we come together from various countries and cultures as a first step in human cooperation that will be history in the making.

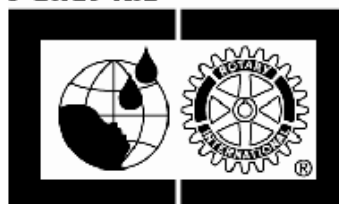

More than 1,600 Rotarians registered for Member Access for the first time. We seriously hope, now that they have seen how easy it is to give on-line, each will do it again and again.
- **October 24, 2010 World Polio Day**– The first two Milestones set by the Global Polio Eradication Initiative are now complete! 1. All 15 of the countries with imported outbreaks starting in 2009 are reporting no Polio cases as of June 2010. 2. All 7 countries with outbreaks starting in 2010 have zero cases six months after the start of their outbreaks.

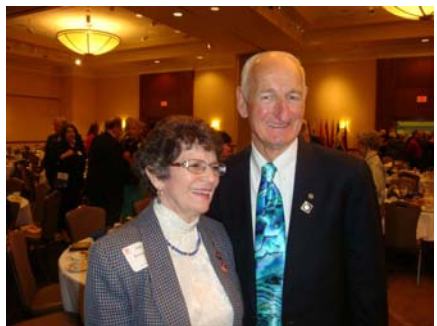

This fall, the Abilene Wednesday Rotary Club hopes to leave another group of Abilene students completely spellbound.

The club recently decided to honor its weekly guest speakers by making a donation in their name to a local non-profit organization. The three non-profits that will receive donations from the club this quarter are The Grace Museum, West Texas Rehabilitation Center and Disability Resources, Inc.

Also, Rex Nutt was honored by visiting District Governor J. Paul Lucas as the club's recipient of the Rotary Builder award during Lucas' visit to the club on Aug. 18. The award is given to a club member who is always there when needed for Rotary – a description that fits Nutt perfectly.

The Rotary Club of Azle has gotten involved in a community program that provides needy children in the community with a backpack full of food to take home each weekend.

The Food Backpack program is a collaborative effort involving the Community Caring Center, the Azle Police Department and several service clubs, churches and other organizations willing to pay for the meals that are sent home every weekend so that children do not go hungry when school is not in session.

It costs \$180 a year to feed one child. The Azle Rotary Club recently donated \$7,200 to the Community Caring Center – enough to take care of 40 children for the school year.

The way the program works is, every Thursday morning, volunteers pick up food packets at the Tarrant Area Food Bank, which custom-packs and prepares meals for the program. Azle police officers pick it up at the CCC and take it to the school district's seven elementary campuses, where it is placed in backpacks to be sent home with students on the weekend.

Each backpacks consist of at least two meals worth of food, plus snacks. They are designed so that the kids can walk out of school with them without identifying that they are getting food.

All five of Azle ISD's elementary school campuses participated in the program last year. CCC Director Joe Lieb said the district's two intermediate campuses – fifth and sixth graders – just got involved this year.

Currently about 400 students in Azle ISD are being fed through the program.

Lieb said is it almost staggering to consider the growing need.

"These are the poorest of the poor," he said. "These kids have absolutely nothing at home to eat – and this isn't the inner city, this is Azle."

The Azle Rotary Club raised the money through donations from its members and plans to continue supporting the program as long as the need exists.

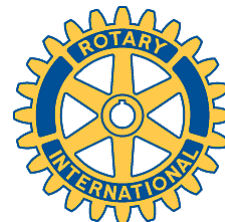

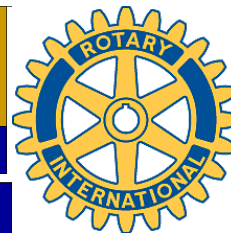
