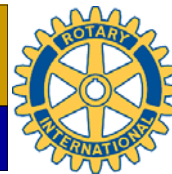

Oct 6th – The Rotary Foundation Celebration Banquet in Fort Worth

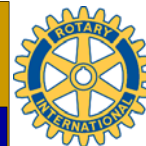
Oct 9th - Polio Picnic in Arlington

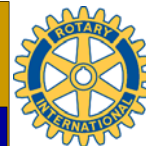

Dear Rotarians of District 5790,

TESTING ONE, TWO, THREE...THE IMPORTANCE OF HOLDING A FOUR-WAY TEST SPEECH CONTEST

Past District Governor Wilkes Berry recruited me in 1994 to become a member of the Rotary Club of Denton. As my club sponsor, PDG Wilkes not only spoke highly about the merits of joining his Rotary Club, but he repeatedly mentioned The Four-Way Test and his strong belief in its tenets to develop and maintain high ethical standards in human relations. PDG Wilkes convinced me that if I simply followed The Four-Way Test in all of the things I think, say or do, that I would never veer from the path of being a true Rotarian and a good citizen of my community. I was inducted into the Rotary Club of Denton on November 1, 1994 by PDG Don Mebus.

When District Governor Paul Lucas called 16 years later and asked me in what capacity I was willing to serve the Rotary District 5790, I immediately thought about PDG Wilkes. I told DG Paul that I would be honored to serve as the Chair of the Four-Way Test Speech Contest as means to convince our local Rotary club presidents about the importance of holding a local contest in their community.

The impact of holding a Four-Way Test Speech contest is advantageous in numerous ways, but especially as it:

- Promotes Rotary and its values
- Provides exposure not only for the contestants, but for local Rotary Club when it utilizes social networking media to highlight the contest
- Demonstrates how Rotary supports community youth.

The goals of the Four-Way Test Speech Contest are to:

- Acquaint a large number of youth with Rotary and the Four-Way Test Speech Contest
- Demonstrate and enhance Rotary's commitment to youth
- Heighten awareness of Rotary among youth, parents, schools, and community
- Recognize, encourage, and reward hard work and accomplishment among youth.

AMBASSADORIAL SCHOLARSHIPS

The Ambassadorial Scholarships program supports the vision of The Rotary Foundation to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace by increasing cultural awareness and respect for differences. Scholars also appreciate the need for international service projects to address humanitarian needs, and bring that awareness to their home communities too.

With the scholarships, Rotary can have a worldwide impact through the geographical distribution of scholars and also by encouraging more educational opportunities for scholars in low-income parts of the world.

Finally, these scholarships foster a lifelong association between Rotary and its scholars.

During the study period, scholars are expected to be outstanding ambassadors of goodwill to the people of the host country through appearances before Rotary clubs and districts, schools, civic organizations, and other forums. On completion, scholars are expected share their experiences with their home countries and Rotarians who sponsored their scholarships.

ROTARIAN COUNSELORS

Rotary scholars develop an association with Rotary clubs and Rotarians. Each scholar is assigned a sponsor and host Rotarian counselor who provide orientation and advice in preparing for and completing a successful study period in another country.

GENERAL ELIGIBILITY

Applicants must have completed at least two years of university or college course work, or must have a secondary school education and have been employed in a recognized vocation for at least two years when the scholarship begins. All applicants must be citizens of a country in which there is a Rotary club. Applicants must initially apply through a Rotary club located in the area of their legal or permanent residence, or place of fulltime study or employment. Persons with disabilities and members of Rotaract clubs are eligible and encouraged to apply.

ACADEMIC-YEAR AMBASSADORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

The scholarship is for one regular academic year (usually nine months) of full-time study at an institution assigned by The Rotary Foundation Trustees. Because the scholarship is limited to one academic year, recipients may not be able to earn degrees or diplomas during the study period. The scholarship may also be used for vocational training.

What does the scholarship cover?

The scholarship provides a flat grant of US\$26,000. Funding is intended to defray costs associated with round-trip transportation, one month of intensive language training (if assigned by the Foundation), required fees for a normal course load, room and board, and educational supplies. The Foundation will not pay additional costs resulting from personal living preferences. Refer to the RI Web site, www.rotary.org, to confirm the award amount for a specific program year. Applicants who request and are assigned to an institution where costs exceed the flat grant amount must pay all additional costs.

As you know the District Awards are very well defined with points awarded for different activities. The Clubs with the greatest number of points will earn the First, Second, and Third Place Awards for the category according to their Club size.

HOWEVER, sometimes a Club launches a really unique campaign that deserves special recognition. Or perhaps a Club's ongoing program leads to another community need which might otherwise have been undiscovered. A perfect example helped earn the Granbury Club an award in 2009. The Granbury Club initiated a very innovative program when they began providing dog food to seniors who are recipients of Meals on Wheels. When Granbury members realized some of the seniors were feeding their Meals on Wheels to their pets, in many cases their only companions for whom they had no extra money to buy pet food. This sparked an entire new program for that Club. One of the major pet stores in the area became involved by donating food for this effort, and a whole new initiative was born.

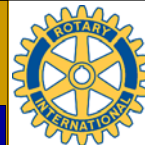
Ending Polio is Rotary's number one project. What has your club pledged toward the project this year? Have you, personally, given to end polio lately? There is a way your club can generate donations to end polio and give your community a chance to help, too. Since people give to people, the process we suggest involves asking your friends, family, business associates, and area foundations and charitable funds to give to end polio. Almost every family in our country was affected by polio in the '40 and 50's so when you ask others to help end polio they will know how important it is to stamp out this dreaded disease. They will know the crippling effect and even death polio brought to their family and friends. Who would not want to donate to rid the world of polio?

Rotary has almost eliminated polio all over the world, but we are not quite there. We need just a few thousand dollars more. It is our job as Rotarians to "get 'er done". We can raise the money but we need to ask others to assist us. District Governor J. Paul Lucas has provided the leadership for each of our 65 clubs to ask for and generate donations for the District Polio Fund. Materials that will make it convenient for you to ask for donations are included in this newsletter and on the district website. They will also be available at the Membership /Foundation Seminar in Mineral Wells on August 14. However, if you need materials before then please contact Sharron Miles. The color form titled "World Polio Fund" has a place for any donor to indicate the level of giving comfortable for them. In the middle of the form is a place for donor information and at the bottom a place for them to use Master Card or Visa for their donated amount. Please ask the donor to make checks to The Rotary Foundation and note that it is for the World Polio Fund. You should collect the checks you receive and send them to Sid Johnston as indicated on the line in the middle of the form. You will want your club to receive the credit with Rotary so be sure your club is identified with the checks you send to Sid. If you need current information about Rotary's efforts to End Polio see the "Talking Points" at the end of this newsletter.

Time is important in raising funds to End Polio. Rotary International has a goal of next spring. However District Governor Lucas says to be recognized at the World Polio Day Dinner on October 5th and the Foundation Banquet on October 6th checks need to be received before October 1, 2010. For recognition at the District Conference checks need to be received by March 31, 2011. To count in the yearly totals you will have until June, 2011.

You... raise money? Yes, you can. The most important thing is to donate yourself and then ask others to join you in riding the world of Polio.

(You might want to consider sending this donation request to everyone on your e-mail list and ask them to send it to everyone on their list. The last person that I know that did this hoped for \$2,500 but received over \$25,000.)

We call this program "Rotary International District 5790 Institute for Leadership", or simply I f L – designed to develop the skills that help individuals become great leaders in Rotary and our communities; it now is an official Rotary International emphasis. Some people are describing it as a RYLA program for Rotarians,

The program is a highly interactive two day session about the dynamic process of leading. This is not material that can be learned through texts or by attending PETS nor does it duplicate any training previously offered in our district.

The next program will be held at the DFW Marriott (near Texas Motors Speedway), for leaders at all levels from all Rotary Clubs in District 5790.

Saturday, October 16 9:30 am - evening
Sunday, October 17 8:30 am – 5:00 pm

We accept only 24 participants, so enroll now! The tuition fee per student is \$299.00 which includes everything: books, materials, food, hotel, etc. There will be two students per room, but we can make provisions for single occupancy for an additional fee of \$50.00 per person. Even if a student lives locally, he/she needs to stay in the hotel as part of the learning experience. The logistics of the course are detailed in the enclosed Registration Form.

Each Rotary Club will be given the opportunity to send members, please encourage registration as soon as possible using the enclosed Rotary District 5790 I f L Application. We suggest that the club pay for the tuition. Should you have any additional questions, please contact any of the I f L Committee Members.

Many People ask: where is and what is Pilot Point? Well, we're on the far east boundary of District 5790. We are located on the west side of Lake Ray Roberts, and we're the home of, for the third time, the State Football Champions. Population is about 5000. We're a small, but very busy club. We're a young club, less than ten years old. We're a friendly group and welcome you to come visit us anytime.

This year, we are considering two new events: starting an Interact Club and doing a Four Way Test Contest at our local high school.

Those would be in addition to what we are now doing. Fundraisers in addition to the flag program, now in its fourth year, are our circus, an every other year event, and the Fish On.

With the Fish On, every year we work with the State Parks and Wildlife to train more than 500 young people how to fish.

Other activities include sending two students from the junior high school class to RYLA, giving a \$1,500 scholarship each year to a senior boy and a senior girl we select. We also have a Bringing Up Grades (BUG) club, as well as an Adopt-a-Highway program.

We budget more than \$4,570 for local charities, which includes the Angel Tree, Goodfellows, local fire and police departments and Shepard Storehouse. Also in the Club's budget is \$1,000 for Polio Plus and \$350 for other international projects.

Rotary North, as we are known in Wichita Falls, has always believed in Rotary's motto "Service Above Self". We believe that if a person is going to regularly attend club meetings, then we must have good programs every week. We also understand that if our Rotary Club is going to attract new members, and retain old members, then we must be an active club involved in various service projects.

The project that Rotary North club has been famous for is our participation in the Governor's Blood Challenge. For years we have worked hand in hand with our adopted squadron at Sheppard Air Force Base to collect blood for those in need. The combined efforts of Rotary North, and the 364th Training Squadron at SAFB, have not only saved lives, but the cooperation has strengthened the relationship between Wichita Falls and Sheppard Air Force Base. Our relationship with the 364th has been the premier relationship of the local squadron adoption program.

Our Flag program has been the primary fundraiser for our club raising nearly \$24,000, which, benefits our community or other service projects.

Rotary North has committed to several new local service projects this year, in addition to continuing a number of the old ones as well. We will provide a dictionary to each of nearly 1100 3rd graders in the WFISD. Each dictionary has a Rotary label with the 4 way test and personally presented to the students. This allows us to spend a few minutes discussing the accomplishments and benefits of Rotary with the students.

Another program that Rotary North takes pride in is the program where our club names an Employee of the Quarter for the City of Wichita Falls. We present a very nice plaque and a gift certificate to the outstanding employee of Wichita Falls once every three months. Pictures are taken and published in the local newspaper.

We continue to participate in several international service projects; both monetarily and by travelling to the project and interact with our international partner Rotary Club and the people that are the target of the project.

For 5 years, we've been active in the wheel chair distribution trip to Leon, Mexico to distribute wheelchairs to the needy people in the Leon area. The wheelchairs have been for both children and adults.

Rotary North is very active in Honduras, with a matching grant with the Nueva Tegucigalpa Rotary Club in Honduras, provided aid in increasing agriculture capabilities in the Gracias A Dios area of Honduras. It has also provided water filters for the same area. One members has made 4 trips to Honduras to observe and research the projects.

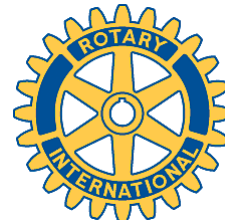
Our club has been involved in both receiving and sending GSE teams. This year we have a candidate from Wichita Falls that was selected for the GSE program to the South Pacific.

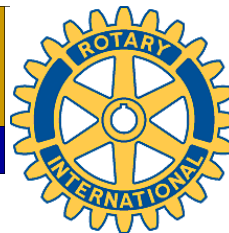
