"CALL FOR DISTRICT GOVERNOR **NOMINATIONS**"

Your assistance is needed in providing qualified District Governor candidates for 2015-2016.

In support of the orderly succession of district leadership, it is time to gather nominations for the 2015-2016 Governor of District 5790. After reviewing the "Guidelines for District Elections", clubs are encouraged to submit the name of a qualified candidate using the attached "Governor Nomination Data Form". These can be found on the district website at www.rotary5790.org.

The club is responsible for nominating the individual. The deadline for the submission of the paperwork is December 31, 2012. Please submit the completed application for the 2015-2016 Governor to:

All candidates must have successfully completed a term as club president. If selected, the individual must be available to attend all training sessions that are part of the Governor-Elect's training program. Interviews are planned for January, 2012.

A fundamental principle of Rotary is that the best qualified candidate should be selected for service in elective offices. The RI Bylaws prohibit any effort by a candidate, a candidate's supporter, or any Rotarian to influence the selection process in a positive or negative manner, including but not limited to campaigning or canvassing. The RI Board developed these guidelines to assist Rotarians in better understanding election procedures:

For All Rotarians

Review and comply with RI's election guidelines as explained in the following documents:

Rotary Code of Policies: 17.040, 19.030, 26.100

Avoid any actions designed to gain visibility, publicize candidate names and achievements, or give anyone an unfair advantage over another.

For Candidates

Immediately express disapproval in writing of any campaigning activities undertaken on your behalf, asking for actions to cease.

Do not respond in a similar manner to another candidate's improper activities.

Do not communicate with or visit clubs involved in the election, except to fulfill necessary functions. If there are any concerns that a current assignment or a new assignment may give an appearance of campaigning, consult with the district governor. Routine performance of assigned activities is not a violation of

FOUR WAY TEST SPEECH CONTEST

The Four Way Test . . . some clubs recite it at the beginning of their meeting, along with the prayer and pledge. Some recite it at the end, as the last thing they want members and guests to remember as they head out to their homes or places of business. Most clubs recite it during every meeting. And every Rotarian who has been in Rotary more than a couple of months can recite it from memory.

How important is the Four Way Test? Is it "yesterday's news?" Is it "passé?" Has it lost it's once held meaning? Or is it a timeless reminder?

When you get right down to it, the Four Way Test is really a road map for all people, regardless of age, gender, political or religious affiliation, occupation or profession, to remind us of a basic code of ethical conduct to guide our paths throughout life.

Each year District 5790 invites all clubs to coordinate a Four Way Test Speech Contest with a school or multiple schools in their community. This is more difficult for some clubs than for others but all who participate are rewarded with improved relationships with their schools and a sense of appreciation for the next generation of community leaders.

But that's only the benefits to us, as Rotarians and Rotary clubs. What about the benefits to others involved in the contests? Ask yourself how much better our society would be if every student in every classroom in every country was introduced to the Four Way Test and was encouraged to individually and collectively adopt its principles for their lives. We may not be able to help all of them but we can help some.

Through the Four Way Test Speech Contest, high school students, their parents and siblings, and teachers and administrators, are introduced to the Four Way Test that means so much to us. And as the kids work to develop their 5 minute timed speeches and practice them in front of other students and their families, they often adopt our "test" as their own. Everyone who learns about our little (24 words) Four Way Test is changed for the better.

Let's discuss the contest itself. If I was to put a timeline on the contest, I'd put it this way:

October Clubs determine if they are going to hold a contest

November Club Rotarians contact local high schools to find student participants

December Clubs work with schools to set a date for the club contest

January Clubs confirm school participation in contest

February Clubs hold local contest, awarding 1st, 2nd and 3rd place prizes
March Regional contests are held for all clubs' 1st place winners
May Top 2 from each Regional participate at District Conference

Now that's an over-simplification but I don't have room to get into a lot of details in this article. I'll be contacting all D5790 clubs in the near future to determine who will be participating this Rotary year. We had a great contest in 2011-2012 with 30 clubs holding contests. We want even more in 2012-2013. If you have any initial questions, please contact me.

Register online at www.Rotary.org or download registration form from same site. If you register by Dec. 15, 2012, cost is only \$265 each for Rotarians and guests.

Suggested hotels can be found on the website when you register and the venue for the convention will give you chooses and ideas for other activities.

For RYLA and Youth Exchange officers, there are receptions and meetings scheduled June 20 – 22, 2013 so be sure to plan accordingly.

ANNUAL GIVING

As Rotarians we hear about Annual Giving all the time. It seems like our club foundation chair or club president reminds us regularly (at least I hope they do) to donate to your Paul Harris Fellow (PHF). We hear terms like Every Rotarian Every year (EREY) and Sustaining Member – but does it all make sense? What follows is a brief summary of how your contributions to your Paul Harris Fellow end up in the Rotary Foundation (TRF) Annual Fund (AF) and why that is a good thing.

First let's establish the fact that the Annual Fund is vital to all of the great things that Rotary does. The AF is just that – a fund that turns over every year. It is the source for funding of grants, scholars, GSE, disaster relief, etc. The primary source for funding of the Annual Fund is you - through your PHF contributions. When you and your fellow District 5790 Rotarians contribute to your PHF, the funds go to TRF for safe keeping. At the end of the Rotary year, TRF notes the total amount of contributions made by district Rotarians and tells the district - "thank you very much. We will return 50% of these funds to you (district) in three years." Why must the district wait three years? Because TRF will invest these funds for three years and use the dividends and interest to pay overhead at the headquarters. By doing this, TRF insures that every dollar you contribute to your PHF goes to meaningful projects. Why return only 50% of the funds? The "agreement" between TRF and the districts is that TRF returns 50% to the district with the other 50% going into the World Fund which is available to be used by all Rotary districts. So all funds that we contribute this Rotary year will be returned to the district in Rotary year 2015-2016. Clearly if our district has a down year of annual fund giving, the return to the district three years later will be down and projects will be affected. That will also impact the contribution to the World Fund.

TRF asks both Rotarians AND clubs to "be EREY." Clubs can achieve the EREY distinction by having all members of the club contribute something during the rotary year to their individual PHF and have a club per capita giving of \$100. Ideally we would like to have every club Rotarian contribute at least \$100 to their PHF during the rotary year. If all club Rotarians do that then the club is classified as a Sustaining Member Club. It is the same for individuals. If you contribute some amount during the year to your PHF then you are EREY. If you contribute at least \$100 to your PHF during the year then you have reached Sustaining Member status.

Certainly this has been a very brief overview of Annual Giving. I hope you have gained something from the article. If you have questions, I am sure that your club foundation chair can provide the answers. If you like, you can send me an email or give me a call and I will try to answer your questions. Please be aware that some of the mechanics of TRF distribution of annual funds may change with Future Vision, but the manner in which you make your PHF contributions will not change.



We have the ability to expand the knowledge and skills of young individuals when they participate in our scholar programs and our Group Study Exchange programs. We have the ability to build peace when we open up the world to our Peace Fellows. And finally we have the ability to make history when we create a polio free world for all children.

As Rotarians, we should take advantage of our participation in the programs of the Rotary Foundation. When we do this, we learn. We learn how to develop a humanitarian project; we learn how to find a scholar, we learn to how to find a Group Exchange Study team member; we learn how to find a Peace Fellow; and we learn how to develop innovative ways to fundraise for the eradication of Polio. In doing so, we challenge ourselves, we evolve ourselves, we involve others and thus, we grow stronger as individuals and as clubs.

We do have one other way to participate, and without this, we cannot perform all the aforementioned programs and projects. Our financial commitment is needed. When we contribute to the Rotary Foundation, eventually all the funds contributed come back to our district for these programs and projects. So think about it this way. Whenever you see a 3rd grade child with a Rotary dictionary, whenever you travel abroad and see a water and sanitation project, whenever you meet a Group Study Exchange team member or scholar, and whenever you hear about the decreased incidence of polio around the world, you can say "I have a part changing lives."





ROSE BOWL PARADE ROTARY FLOAT "District 5790 will be represented by Paul Geisel"

Paul Geisel grew up in the southern desert area of California. He graduated high school early and started college at 15 years old. Soon after, became a Rotary Ambassadorial Scholar and trekked off to New Zealand. When his term was completed, his funds from RI did not arrive on time so Paul had to work is way back to California by way of ship. As he has said, it was an adventure.

Paul has been in Rotary for over 35 years. In 1993-1994, he served as Rotary International District Governor for District 5790 in Texas. He has led Group Study Exchange teams to Argentina and Mexico. He has had the opportunity to share international projects in 20 countries. Paul is a Major Donor, Paul Harris Society Member, and an Arch Klumph member.

When asked about what Paul cares about, here are just a few items: Each Rotarian's active participation; Human efforts to enhance the lives of others; Fellowship as a means to Service; and, Humor to make Rotary Fun.

One of Paul's mentees, Rotarian Mary Ann McDuff, says it best, "At the head of my Rotary family is my dear friend, PDG Paul Geisel. Paul is the Rotary Wizard of Oz in our district. He started me on my Rotary career and way of life. Paul I love you dearly for taking me to the Rotary curb and pushing me off — even if it is into traffic sometimes."

Paul's career as a sociologist has allowed him to hold positions in the United States and Canada. He is Professor Emeritus from the School of Urban and Public Affairs at The University of Texas at Arlington. He was professor of Urban Affairs, City and Regional Planning and Urban Sociology there for 37 years and was founder of the graduate program. Previous experience included positions at Vanderbilt, Tuskegee, Rollins, University of Pittsburgh, Southern Methodist, and Arizona State. He also had an assignment for two years as the Research Project Director of the Canadian Welfare council. While on leave from UT Arlington, he served as the first director of the Dallas Alliance. He has an MA and PhD in Sociology from Vanderbilt University and his BA from Willamette.

Over the years Paul has consulted and worked with numerous local, national, and international organizations on issues of race, housing, city management, education, demographic trends, and social economics. He completed over 200 grants that cover a broad spectrum of topics from population characteristics, land use, long range planning, desegregation, and future trends. He is widely published with over 190 articles, monographs, special reports, and books.

As a citizen of the region, he has chaired a number of agencies and boards including the Fort Worth Transportation Authority, Area on Aging, Senior Services of Tarrant County, and the Tarrant AIDS Interfaith Network. Past and present board memberships include: American Red Cross, Dispute Resolution Services, Fort Worth Sister Cities International, Regional Transportation Council, Youth Orchestra, Fort Worth Men's Chorus, Neighborhood Housing Services, United Way, Southwest Metroplex Alliance, Arlington Museum of Art, Arlington Arts Council, Samaritan House, AIDs Outreach Center, Liberation Community and the Black Genealogical and Historical Society.

MID-CITIES PACESETTERS ROTARY CLUB "Serving Our Community & Building Relationships"

The Mid-Cities Pacesetters Rotary Club is an active club and we have a busy year planned from raising money to support our endeavors to various service projects. We also partner with the HEB Rotary Club to further extend our reach to help with in our community. Our members are focused on helping children and families of our communities as well as aboard.

Let me tell you about a few of these local community projects that we have been involved in. We assisted the Community Enrichment Center by improving the living conditions for their residents at Emerald Run in North Richland Hills, Texas.





Our members rolled up their sleeves, pulled out the hammers, saws, paint brushes and rebuilt many of the balconies and patios for many of the units at the complex.

We also participated with the Community Enrichment Center's annual Back to School Carnival, in which school supplies such as clothes; shoes etc... were given to disadvantaged students in the community. Our club prepared the lunch which is served to the children and their families. The day is full of activities and a warm meal. At Christmas we support two families through the Community Enrichment Center's Adopt-A-Family Program. Our club will prepare and serve a meal at this event as well. Our club members volunteer in the Meals On Wheels Program; tutor students at Mission Central in Hurst and provide monetary support for books and computer technologies for its library; volunteer for the Angel Tree located at NE Mall and other Christmas time activities just to mention a few.

The Club is very active in Rotary District 5790 programs. Each spring we conduct the Four Way Test Speech Contest, in which students from several high schools in our area participate. The Rangers Baseball Game for Polio Plus in August was a lot of fun; with many of our members attending plus we donated tickets to the Airport Area YMCA so some of the disadvantaged children could attend a Rangers game that would never have the opportunity otherwise. All of our members are Foundation Donors, and most are, or are working towards becoming, Paul Harris Fellows.

Each year, the Mid-Cities Pacesetters Rotary Club provides Scholarships funds to needy students in the area, in partnership with the Tarrant County Community College. In addition to the college scholarship with TCC, we partnered with the Duvall School of Cosmetology awarded 2 students vocational scholarships.

We are partnering with the HEB Rotary on various other projects such as, the dictionary project (provide a dictionary for every 3rd child in the HEB ISDs); exchange student from Italy and we are working on forming an Interact Club at one of the local High Schools in the Mid-Cities area. We look forward to this as a new opportunity to teach young peo-

WISDOM OF ROTARY

Each month, as space permits, we'll include excerpts from "Honoring Our Past: The Words and Wisdom of Paul Harris. This month's excerpt is from Page 29, in the section on Rotary History.

"Even before there was a second club, realizing the importance of community service, I persuaded the Chicago Rotary Club to initiate the establishment of public comfort station in the city of Chicago, inviting the city administration and every civic organization in the city to join our club in the undertaking. It is possible that some more attractive objective might have been chosen for our first venture, bit it would be difficult to have found one which would have stirred up more agitation. Two formidable forces rose up against us; on was the Chicago Association of Brewers which contended that every one of Chicago's six thousand saloons offered public comfort conveniences for men. The other opponent was the Association of Department Stores on State Street which contended that free accommodations in the stores were available for women. The proponents of the measure nevertheless persisted that men ought not to have to buy a glass of beer nor women have to buy merchandise to make use of toilet facilities. The stations were established.

WICHITA FALLS NORTH ROTARY CLUB "Aggressive Goals for 2012-2013"

The Rotary Club of Wichita Falls North has established an aggressive set of goals for the 2012-2013 Rotary year. Internationally, we are participating in a wheelchair grant in the Dominican Republic with the Rotary Club of the Arlington Great Southwest and other clubs in the district. We are also supporting our Past District Governor Tom Sheriff on his efforts in Haiti for vision care and Paul Geisel's trip to the Rose Bowl Parade.

In our Community Service we are providing dictionaries for the third-graders in Wichita Falls Independent School District, providing funds for the food bank and other nonprofit organizations within our community, providing hot dogs at blood drives, supporting the bike safety program, and other activities supporting our community and adopted squadron.

New Generations, we are lucky to be supporting a youth exchange student from Austria, and budgeted two participants to RYLA. Our vision for this club is to offer less stringent membership criteria to serve young professionals from the ages of 21 to 35. Over the years, I have looked at many profit and loss statements as a small business owner. When I look at my own Rotary Club statement, I can't help but peruse it with a certain feeling of ownership. I have taught myself to take a very sharp and long look to justify each line item. As a business owner, many times you have to make hard decisions to continue to justify certain items; it's only natural. It is a practice to keep your business on a profitable level.

Sometimes, when we are busy with our day to day routine, we tend to take a quick look, and then another six months or a year comes and goes. If your club is doing that, maybe you should take it upon yourself to revisit some of those line items. Perhaps the needs of the recipient have changed, maybe they need less; maybe they need more! Management changes from time to time, no matter if they are non-profit or profit. Items such as local schools, food banks and such, routinely come to mind. Rotary International always has an array on their list with Polio plus at the top, of course.

Let's make sure that the end-user of the funds is using those dollars as they were intended! Is the need today as critical as it was yesterday? Are you communicating with the organization? Have they changed management? Requests for funds for the needy are immense around the world and here at home, as well. Rotary international maintains a long list of such needs. I would suggest taking a new look at your giving and see if you are "covering the bases". Look for that certain line item; it might open up some new vistas for your club.

"LOOKING FOR AN INTERNATIONAL PROJECT?"

Fort Worth International & Lewisville Morning Rotary Clubs are looking for Rotary Partners in an Exciting International Project.

We are in the process of preparing a TRF Matching Grant using district DDF funds and Club funds to purchase and install an Emergency Generator for the Immaculate Heart Hospital & Maternity in Urualla, Imo Province, Nigeria.

Can you imagine a hospital in which birthing center is forced to deliver babies to the light of a kerosene lamp? Or where evening rounds are done by staff members carrying torches (flash lights)? Because of an unreliable power grid, that is exactly what happens at Immaculate Hospital & Maternity in rural Nigeria. Their power goes off frequently and for long periods of time (sometimes months). The pictures on the link below will break your heart as you realize that this is the only health care these folks have available to them.

When:

We are preparing grant materials now. We should be hearing from TRF if our matching funds are approved by March 2013. So, we want to get our grant paperwork submitted as quickly as possible to make sure funds are available for the project. We have identified a host club (Owerri RC of District 9140). Both the Owerri RC & District 9140 have committed to participating both financially and in coordinating with us.

How Much?

With matching funds from TRF, Districts 9140 & 5790 and Club funds we are raising \$30,000 to purchase and install an Emergency Generator at this Rural Nigerian Hospital. The partnering Rotary Clubs will need to commit to the project a total of \$8100 as the clubs contribution. Partnering clubs can contribute as little or as much as they can afford. No money is needed until the project starts after TRF approves the matching grant.
