A great sharing and learning experience was had by everyone in attendance!

September is New Generations Month

Continuing in the tradition of having a different theme each month, we concentrate on "New Generations" in September. New Generations helps us to focus on the younger members of Rotary and our programs.

Interact, a program begun back in the 1962 at Melbourne High School in Melbourne, Florida. Interact stands for "International Action". Interact is for 14-18 year olds, and is traditionally a High School based organization with a local Rotary club as sponsor. Today, there are more than 11,400 clubs in over 125 countries, with an estimated 250,000 youth members worldwide. District 5790 has 18 Interact Clubs. On the next-page, Lee Ancona, Interact Chair talks about Interact.

In the late 1960s, noting the success of the recently formed Interact program, the RI Board realized the need for a program of service, activity, and fellowship for young adults no longer of Interact age (14-18). The name **Rotaract** (Rotary in Action) was selected to show the program's close affiliation with both Rotary and Interact clubs. The first Rotaract Club was at the University of North Carolina-Charlotte. The club received its charter on March 13, 1968 and had 21 members. Rotaract clubs were originally open to young men and women ages 17-24. Since 1971, young adults ages 18-30 have been welcomed. On page 4, you see an article about the Rotaract Club at Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls. There are two other Rotaract Clubs in our District—University of North Texas and the University of Texas—Arlington.

RYLA, "Rotary Youth Leadership Awards" has been teaching select high school students about leadership over an intense 3 day weekend. District 5790 holds RYLA in June each year). The roots of RYLA date back to 1959, in Australia. By 1998, nearly half of the 521 Rotary districts had a RYLA program. In 2001, the first International RYLA program began at the RI Convention in San Antonio. Bridgett Williams, RYLA Chair, talks about our district program on Page 5.

Friendship Exchange allows Rotarians to visit other parts of the world and stay with fellow Rotarians. More details are on Page 6 with an article written by Chris McLucas and an open invitation to visit India on Page 7.

And last but not least is **Youth Exchange**— our district has a fantastic person working with clubs to promote both inbound and outbound students. Kathy Bauer works with short and long term students. On Page 8 and 9 you will find what is going on with some of the various students in the district.

INTERACT CLUB UPDATE

Lee Ancona, District 5790 Interact

Interact Clubs are the high school version of Rotary Club. There are a number of Interact Clubs in District # 5790. Some of these clubs are associated with high schools in the area, while others are free standing. All are connected to a local Rotary Club.

The Interact Clubs have a variety of undertakings that they actively pursue during a given school year and each club is encouraged to have a least one local and one international project. Interact Clubs elect officers and many are involved in their local Rotary Club's activities. Interact provides a great opportunity to introduce and showcase Rotary and perhaps recruit future members. It also gives individual members a chance to demonstrate, in real life ways, our Rotarian motto - "Service Above Self".

At Lamar High School, Arlington, Texas our Interact Club has been challenged for members because our students are really busy, competition exists from other clubs and organizations and athletics. In spite of those challenges, the Lamar Interact Club hosted the most recent District # 5790 conference November '08, coordinated a campus beautification project with other clubs on campus, and was active with Wheelchairs, International, Inc. and Water is Basic. North Arlington Rotary is the sponsor club organization for Lamar Interact.

There are many other projects with which other Interact Clubs are involved. Food drives, helping at a homeless shelter, visiting local nursing home residents, volunteering with Rotary Club projects and fundraisers, are all part of the effort and community involvement of Interact. As a prime example the Interact Club in Argyle, thought to be the largest club in Texas with over 100 members, sponsored a fund raiser for a local student who was battling cancer. Please help support your local Interact Club and if you don't have one, consider starting a group through your Rotary Club or local school.

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ROTARACT—MIDWESTERN STATE UNIVERSITY

The Midwestern State University Rotaract Club was first established on the MSU campus in 1985 but only lasted until 1986. The current Rotaract Club was established by Ms. Yana Shamis on September 1, 2005 with 5 members, and Dr. Fukasawa and Dr. Preda have served as faculty advisers since that time. The club however was not officially chartered until March 19, 2007 as at least 15 members were required to qualify as a nationally-chartered chapter. Ms. Nichole Phillip was the president of the club during the charter year. During this year the club printed the official MSU Rotaract Club t-shirts. The colors on the shirt were not hard to marry as both the Rotary colors and the MSU colors are maroon & gold, and the back of the shirt has "service" in the seven different languages spoken by the club members. The club participated in a few activities but by the end of the year had to become inactive due to a dwindling number of members.

Towards the end of the 2008 academic year Ms. Adewonuola Adebiyi, a club member during the charter year, approached Dr. Preda about reviving the club to which he readily agreed. She organized an interest meeting about the club and got a number of people interested in becoming a part of the club; at the beginning of the 2008-09 academic year she was elected as president.

Since then the club has been very active both on campus and in the community, participating in such activities as Habitat for Humanity, MSU Great Day of Service, park clean-ups, and clothing drives. The club has also developed a close relationship with River Oaks Care Center which is a seniors' home in downtown Wichita Falls, visiting the residents at least once a month with snacks and hand-made cards. In honor of the 2009 World Rotaract Week the club had booths in the Student Center of the Midwestern campus, handing out flyers and raising interest about the group on campus. The club also stays in touch with their sponsoring Rotary Club, the Rotary Club of Wichita Falls (North). The Rotaract Club attends the Rotary meetings at least once a month, and the Rotary North Club is always present at the Rotaract pinning ceremony, which is the official welcome of new recruits.

There are currently about 50 active members, and the club continues to grow and expand with the help of a few people. Ms. Yana Shamis though no longer in the Wichita Falls area continues to be a great treasure to the club, attending general meetings and frequently participating in organized events. The Rotary North Club also lends support to the activities of the club both in person and financially. Several club members have provided valuable advice and counsel, and donated a large amount of personal funds to keep the Rotaract treasury afloat during hard times. Dr Preda remains quite active as faculty adviser, attending general meetings and participating in club events. He is a vital element to the success of the club. As the club prepares for the 2009-10 executive elections, the club looks forward to continued growth and success with the help of these people.



One event was a Food Drive in March 2009, where Rotaract participated in a "MSU Great Day of Service" Food Drive.

There were 700 students involved from around campus including the Midwestern State Rotaractors.

September is "New Generations" month where we, as Rotarians, focus on Rotary's youth programs. Anyone of these programs would be good reading for our District newsletter, but perhaps RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Awards) is the one program that will help grow Rotary for generations to come. It is here that we strive to "grow Rotarians"!

District 5790's RYLA program has grown from 42 "campers" to 108 "youth leaders" in just over 8

years. Each year we receive comments from RYLA attendees like this one from Angell Kim of Flower Mound, Texas.

"My experience at RYLA was very memorable. If everyone in the world attended RYLA, there would be no such thing as "awkwardness" or "arrogance". RYLA is the main reason I became hooked onto Rotary!

"Hooked on Rotary" is the goal! It is at this leadership experience training that these youth learn about Ethical Decision Making, how our government REALLY works, Diversity, Etiquette and the Principles of Rotary, including community service. These are things they don't teach in school, but things that can make an impact when our youth move into society and make their contributions in whatever form. 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FRIENDSHIP EXCHANGE

"One of the key principles of Rotary is to foster fellowship among Rotarians around the world. The Rotary Friendship Exchange program gives Rotarians and their families the opportunity to experience other cultures first-hand, by participating in reciprocal visits with Rotarians from other countries and their families. Introduced in 1984, this program aims to advance international understanding among Rotarians. It provides Rotarians with the opportunity to form personal contacts and make long-lasting friendships while exploring different areas of the world.

There are two main types of Friendship Exchanges, the visitor exchange and the team exchange. The number of people or couples participating and the length of stay are flexible in either exchange. However, both are to be determined and agreed upon by the two districts involved.

Rotary Friendship Exchanges are expected to be reciprocal. The visitor exchange gives individual Rotarians, who may be accompanied by family members, the opportunity to spend a few days in the home of a Rotarian in another country. The typical visitor exchange ranges from three to seven days. The team exchange provides the opportunity for several Rotarians or Rotary couples to travel to different communities in a host district for a period of up to one month. The exchange participates are limited to only Rotarians and immediate family members (partner and children) are eligible for the visitor exchange. For the team exchange, only Rotarians and their partners are eligible. For either type of exchange, both districts should agree on the participants in advance.

All Friendship Exchanges are arranged through the district chair, appointed each year by the district governor to oversee all of the Friendship Exchange activity within the district. The recommended minimum term for a district chair is two years.

Rotary Friendship Exchange is funded entirely by the program participants, and exchanges are carried out at no expense to Rotary International. Generally, guests are responsible for their travel expenses and personal spending (for example, souvenirs, snacks, toiletries, camera film, etc.), while hosts are expected to provide housing, meals, and sightseeing opportunities—the same courtesies that would be extended to a visiting friend. In establishing the program, the district Friendship Exchange chair may wish to develop a modest funding plan within the district to cover implementation costs. District chairs should expect to cover communication costs, such as mail, fax, and telephone.

Fundraising--For every ticket sold as part of End Polio Now Night, the Texas Rangers will make a donation to Rotary's End Polio campaign. You can post the flyer and link on your club website to promote the event.

Make It Your Own--Rotarians could wear club shirts/hats and Rotary pins, or make special End Polio Now t-shirts. You could have a contest to see who can sell the most tickets. You could make signs to hold up during the game. Make it a family event and have the kids help. You could decorate your cars to provide a free polio billboard in the parking lot. Your club could make extra contributions for every homerun hit. (Note: Solicitations at the Ballpark are prohibited.) Your creativity can help make this evening a fun night that spreads Rotary's message about fighting polio.

Seeing two individuals sitting outside a restaurant on the street in Salt Lake City at the 2007 International Convention, we Texans just had to invite ourselves at their table. Ok we had about twelve of us and we needed the table space. Nothing like being assertive, but we had Paul Geisel to <u>lead the way</u>. Yes I know that was the Rotary theme for 2006-2007.

Back to the story, the couple was Peter Denooy and his wife Debbie for Alberta, Canada. Peter was the incoming president of the Edmonton Strathcona Rotary Club. Long story short, we became instant friends, and we talked about developing a relationship between Rotarians from the US, Canada, and Mexico – our version of NAFTA.





It was not long after returning that our district planned a wheelchair distribution in Leon, Mexico. PDG Tom Sheriff had started this relationship, and we still continue now. By the way, Tom has been on four of the distributions in Leon. Well anyway, I invited Peter to this wheelchair project. He was amazed that I had remembered to call him. Needless to say, Peter had his Rotary moment in Leon. It is priceless to see him when he talks about being part of the wheelchair project. He can bring you to

tears. Since that time in Leon, we have been to Panama City, Panama for a Wheel-chair Foundation distribution and with our combined efforts we have funded one distribution in Panama, and will be distributing more wheelchairs in there in very near future. Our district leadership will be informing you how you can be a part of this one very soon.

After Panama, Peter started working on a wheelchair distribution to where it all began, Leon Mexico. Here is where the power of the Rotary Foundation Matching Grant program came into play. Peter was able to acquire funding from area Rotary clubs and the Canadian Government. Then with our District Designated Funds of \$6,000 and the support of the Rotary Foundation, Peter had turned the project into a \$46,000 grant. On August 8th, five hundred wheelchairs later, people in



the Leon were given the gift of mobility. Young and old came that day with smiles and tears, and that was just the Rotarians. Seriously, the impact made on all is powerful. It not only changed the lives of the individuals receiving the wheelchairs, but it also changed the lives of the eight Canadians, the twelve Rotarians from District 5790, and the many Rotarians in Leon, spouses and friends. Viva la Rotary!

Who would have known that this moment of fate in Salt Lake City would have led to all this? Indeed, who would have known?

In 2007, Rotarians from District 5790 participated in a wheelchair project with the Rotarians of District 4160. During that trip lifelong friendships were forged and bonds as Rotarians became unbreakable. The next year, 2008, the Rotarians from both countries met once again for the sole purpose of helping others in Leon, Mexico. It was during this 2008 trip that a need was observed to have more medical transportation, i.e. ambulances for the Red Cross in Leon Mexico. With more than 1.8 million people living and working in and around Leon, Mexico it became apparent that something needed to be done to provide help. After a brief discussion between the Rotarians, prior to leaving Mexico, the Rotarians of Arlington Sunrise Rotary Club decided that a matching grant to provide an ambulance to the Red Cross would be a worthy cause to embark upon.

The Rotarians returned to their club and presented the idea to the Board of Directors. It was a unanimous decision to start the grant. All of the work that would be required to accomplish the goal could not be done by one club and therefore Arlington Sunrise sought a partner club. Arlington North Rotary Club stepped up to the plate and volunteered to participate in the grant. With everyone on board that meant that this one international cause to help others by 'providing an ambulance to the Red Cross in Leon, Mexico' now had the attention of three clubs, two districts and The Rotary Foundation. The grant was written and the money collected through The Rotary Foundation.

It has been said that there are Rotarians among us that are not members of a Rotary Club. This could not be truer than when the Rotarian's started seeking an ambulance to purchase for the Red Cross. The Rotarians found an ambulance in Comanche, Texas, USA for sale and upon contacting the owner with the intentions for purchasing the ambulance the owner decided to offer two ambulances for the price of the one the Rotarians were looking at purchasing.



This meant that the grant for an ambulance now became a grant that could provide two ambulances to the Red Cross. From that point the Rotarians in the United States and Mexico worked diligently to procure the necessary documentation to transport the ambulances to Leon Mexico through Nuevo Laredo, Texas, USA. On August 3, 2009, Rotarian Don Ferrell and Rotarian Christopher J. McLucas, with the donated assistance of Kelly McKnight of Arlington, Texas, loaded the ambulances on a trailer and left for the nine hour drive to the border.

Rotarian Jorge Solalinde, Past President of the Leon Mexico Rotary Club and Rotarian Brian Keathley of the Arlington North Rotary Club met Ferrell and McLucas in

Nuevo Laredo to officially transfer the ambulances to the Leon Rotary Club for importation into Mexico. The ambulances were then driven to Leon Mexico on August 5, 2009 for the dedication ceremony that took place on August 7, 2009 at the Red Cross during yet another wheelchair distribution in Leon, Mexico.

pened to them.

Noel Bajat, talked about the new Future Visions Plan of the Rotary Foundation. He explained how Matching Grants will work in the various districts. He helped us to really understand the difference between the Annual Fund ("our checking account") and the Permanent Fund ("our savings account).



Attendees then broke out into groups to discuss membership and foundation.



Membership attendees divided into 3 groups based on club size to talk about the issues of membership growth and retention. Scenarios were discussed on various problems and how to solve common issues that clubs run into on a regular basis.

Foundation attendees met in small groups to go over opportunities for Ambassadorial Scholars, Peace Fellowships, Matching Grants, Polio, Beguest & Major Donors, District Simplified Grants and Group Study Exchange.



PDG Jerry Parr recognized the clubs that attained over 10% growth in membership in 2008-2009. Mineral Wells and Mid Cities Pacesetters were up 25% and 33% respectively. Other clubs that were recognized: Breckenridge, Cisco, Decatur, Granbury, Hamlin, Haskell, and Metroport. New clubs were Highland Village and Kennedale.



Dan Morales was honored for his contributions to the Rotary Foundation—totaling \$100,000 over the years. He was recognized as a Major Donor.

The District Simplified Grants were awarded at the luncheon and all grants were approved. The grants were for up to \$1,500 for local projects.

Internationally, the Metroport Rotary supports a community of over 400 children who live in a squatter's community in **Chinandega**, **Nicaragua**. They are the poorest of the poor.

Our goal is to rebuild the feeding station located in their community. Today, this feeding station is very primitive with dirt floors, a wood burning stove, no tables and very few utensils. At the feeding station, these 400 children receive their only hot meal five times a week.

The **new feeding station** will include tables, storage, cooking pans and utensils plus a new wood burning stove with a chimney.

Our goal for this project is to raise \$5,000 by having a "virtual" garage sale through Easysale. Easysale is an Ebay store that will accept and sell donated items. Metroport Rotary Charities will receive 65% of the total sales.

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ROTARY CLUB OF WICHITA FALLS

The Rotary Club of Wichita Falls was organized in October 1915 and chartered on Jan. 1, 1916. The first recorded charitable donation was a \$25.00 gift to the Salvation Army Christmas Fund. Over 92 years since inception, the club has donated several hundred thousand dollars to many charities and projects both locally and internationally.

The Rotary Club of Wichita Falls has always been a great benefactor of youth. We have strong ties with our Boys & Girls clubs, Boy Scouts, Camp Fire, etc. We also support Midwestern State University in numerous ways, as well as such organizations as Hospice, Habitat for Humanity, Wheelchair Foundation, Heifer project, etc.

A number of years ago the relations between Sheppard AFB and the community were very poor. Past President Floyd Taylor started the squadron adoption program. This program used individuals, companies, organizations, etc. to relate with the military and conditions improved greatly. This program has been adopted by many other military and communities everywhere.

Through the years there have been many different methods of raising money to support these programs, such as garage sales, sponsoring Harlem Globe Trotters, various concerts, and currently our primary fund raiser is the flag program. This program provides the great majority of our fund raising efforts. We place over 1,000 flags in yards in our community six times a year. This also provides good camaraderie among our members as they participate together.

The club has had seven District Governors and one First Vice President of Rotary International, and organized nine clubs in the district.

There are 36 past presidents still living and 20 are still members of the club.

BROWNWOOD ROTARY—22 PEOPLE MAKING AN IMPACT

We're doing just that in Brownwood! Twenty-two Rotarians meet in a small town of 20,000 people. To some, that would make our possibilities even smaller. But the truth is that twenty-two Rotarians can and do have an impact on both our community and our world.

In our community we have taken on four service projects to help better our community. We hold a blood drive every quarter, and it is nearly always full, with people giving blood all day. How many people are helped in their time of need in the hospital?

The second thing we do is give 6 students scholarships to use at the college of their choice. The students are recognized from both Early and Brownwood High Schools each month as Rotarian Student of the month, and then compete for the scholarships in May.

Third, we donate dictionaries to all third grade students in Brown County. To many of them, it is the first book they have ever owned, and is that much more meaningful because of it.

My favorite thing we do to help make our community a better place is that we put flags out on every holiday at key places downtown. I can't help but feel proud to be both a Rotarian and an American when I drive down the street between two rows of

ARLINGTON SUNSET ROTARY— GOOD THINGS IN SMALL **PACKAGES**

Sometimes good things come in small packages! That's the way the Arlington Sunset Rotarians feel about our club. The group is few in numbers - eight members right now but constantly in search of new members. Sunset is one of the smallest and newest clubs in District 5790 and until recently it was the only evening club in the District. There is diversity in background and interest among the members but there are several bonds that hold this group together.

One common thread is the attraction to each member of the 6:00 p.m. time each Tuesday for Rotary because it fits the schedules and needs of the members. The group is also bound together by friendship: All but one have been members since the club was chartered back in June, 2002.

Without exception the members are motivated by the personal desire to serve. Soon after it was chartered the club adopted an Arlington elementary school as a special community partner. Sunset has used Rotary grant funds to provide uniforms and supplies to Katrina evacuees at that school. Due in part to the special literacy skills and interests of some of the members, the club regularly furnishes books to that school for its library. And the club has a standing offer to the school principal to help whenever needed with the various unmet needs of the school.

Also close to home, another early subject of Sunset services has been SafeHaven, a Tarrant County women's shelter program. The club annually funds Thanksgiving baskets and shops Christmas lists for SafeHaven families - both being "hands on" activities for members. And in the summer the club purchases food and supplies for Camp Heart, a retreat for children of SafeHaven families.

Sunset has demonstrated a strong and continuing interest in the international aspects of Rotary service, participating in the district's wheelchair and water filter programs and furnishing soccer uniforms for kids in Honduras.

Sunset Rotarians believe in the Rotary Foundation! The club hosts a GSE team at its meetings at every opportunity. Three members are Paul Harris Fellows and each year the club sustains a near perfect record of "Every Member Every Year" contributions.

In all its service activities, Sunset tries to demonstrate that a little can go a long way!

They joined with other organizations, like the United Way, and began the work to launch a Literacy Coalition. They hosted a Corporate Spelling Bee, and then watched as their members and colleagues came together to see who could "out-spell" one another for the coveted trophy at the end of the day.

As a result of that event, and the support of United Way and other donors, the Tarrant Literacy Coalition officially opened for business this summer and plans are underway for the next Spelling Bee, to be held in March 2010.

Providing opportunity? That's what members of the Rotary Club of Fort Worth are all about!



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MATCHING GRANT UPDATE

ABILENE SOUTHWEST HELPS WITH A MATCHING GRANT AT AN ORPHAN-AGE IN RUSSIA



June 17 was a special day for the children of the "Care" orphanage located in Korolev town – the orphanage got a school bus! 2,5 years ago Rotary club of Moscow-East (District 2220) started its first fundraising for a matching grant to meet the needs of the orphanage.

The Rotarians took the orphans poor lifestyle very close to the hearts. The inmates of the orphanage were scooped inside their home; they did not have a chance of seeing the world around them. All they knew were the walls of the orphanage "Care", with Korolev just within 20 minutes drive from the capital of Russia – Moscow city. The Rotarians wanted to give these orphans a chance to participate in sports events, musical and arts competitions, to see the sights of Moscow

and the suburbs, to go on different excursions, and to have a transport of their own to be able to get to their school.

The orphanage takes care of the children whose parents have recently lost their parental rights. "Care" is a temporary (for approximately 6 months) shelter for them serving as a rehabilitation center while they all go to the nearby school. During this period the children will be placed in different orphanages where they will stay till they are 18 years old. Important and not pleasant changes take place in these children's lives, and the staff of the "Care" does their best to help them in adapting to this situation.

KIYE CONTRACTOR OF THE PARTY OF

Support came from Clubs on three continents with this matching grant project. The Rotaract Club sponsored by Abilene Southwest did this with the help of the Moscow East RC. The now DG of 2010, Western Russia, is a member of this club and they are the sponsor of the Rotaract Club and helped them raise the money.
